Theme of the Week – The Beloved

In the Gospel last week, we explored the temptations experienced by the very human nature of Jesus. In the Gospel on Sunday, we see the event of the Transfiguration, which affirmed the dual nature of Jesus as both man and God. Being both man and God can sometimes be difficult for us to understand. However, this is the foundation of our Church and our faith as a whole.

In Sunday's Gospel Jesus is beginning his journey towards Jerusalem and the fate that awaits him there. However, the start of this journey is delayed by this awesome moment of revelation that we know as the Transfiguration – the moment when Jesus is gloried and revealed as the Beloved Son of God, the Messiah. The voice from heaven echoes those words spoken at the baptism of Jesus. We see the appearance of Moses and Elijah with Jesus and we might ask ourselves, why out of all the people from the Old Testament, why these two? The first possible reason is that they encapsulate the Law (Moses) and the Prophets (Elijah) and all the times in the Old Testament where the Passion and the resurrection of Jesus is foretold, we hear of them. Here, Moses and Elijah signify to the Apostles that what is about to happen to Jesus has long been part of the plan of the promise of God whose love endures forever. However, the second significance of these two individuals is when we actually look back at their own encounters with God. Moses in the Old Testament protested to God that he was the wrong person to do the work of God and Elijah in the Old Testament felt overwhelmed in his ministry. But both always had the support and protection from God.

In our own lives, we are also confronted with these times of struggle. We strive to be faithful to the Gospels, but we can find many excuses that hold us back. Ultimately, though, our vocation is to always desire and at last attain the glory that belongs to Jesus by nature, and is offered to us by adoption. We have more reasons than Moses and Elijah to protest that we are not up to the challenge, but God's response is the same to them as it is to us. He does not dispute that we are weak, he knows it very well but he promises never to leave us, and to give us everything we need to do his will, no matter how big the obstacle is.

We must not repeat the reluctance of the disciples to believe and understand "They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean". We already have the whole picture. Just as Jesus was revealed as the beloved Son of God, we too can take our place as beloved children of God. What glimpses of the glory to you see in your daily life? Can you recall an event where you saw someone in a completely new light? This week, try as a follower of Jesus, to respond to people with greater generosity, forgiveness, acceptance and love.

A reading from the Gospel of St Mark (9:2-10)

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus: 'Rabbi,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.



St. Josephs High Pi Day 2024

The St-Joseph's Maths Department presents $Pi(\pi = 3.14...)$ Day which will be held on Tuesday, March 14th, 2024. It's the 3rd month and the 14th day (Kool, isn't it!).

The day will be celebrated with a competition called "Memorizing Pi" or (Memorizing digits of π)

This means, on Tuesday March 14th 2024, students will go to $\underline{M1/M6}$ at break or lunch time where they will get a chance to write-from memory as many digits of $Pi(\pi)$ they can remember. We hope to have a winner for each House, Year group as well as an overall St Joseph's Champion.

Pi Web Sites

Pi continues to be a fascination of many people around the world. If you are interested in learning more, there are many web sites devoted to the number Pi. There are sites that offer thousands, millions, or billions of digits, pi clubs, pi music, people who calculate digits, people who memorize digits, Pi experiments and more. Check this Yahoo Page for a complete listing.

Memorization of pi

Haraguchi holds the current <u>unofficial</u> world record (100,000 digits) in 16 hours, starting at 9:00 a.m. (16:28 GMT) on October 3, 2006. He equaled his previous record of 83,500 digits by nightfall and then continued until stopping with digit number 100,000 at 1:28 a.m. on October 4, 2006.

His previous world record of 83,431 was performed from July 1, 2005, to July 2, 2005.

In the endless pursuit of Pi's post-decimal values, most couldn't get farther than Rajveer Meena — who memorized and recited, officially, an unfathomable 70,000 digits in about 10 hours.13 Mar 2023

A Brief History of Pi

Ancient civilizations knew that there was a fixed ratio of circumference to diameter that was approximately equal to three. The Greeks refined the process and Archimedes is credited with the first theoretical calculation of Pi.

In 1761 Lambert proved that Pi was irrational, that is, that it can't be written as a ratio of integer numbers.

How many digits are there? Does it ever end?

Because Pi is known to be an irrational number it means that the digits never end or repeat in any known way. But calculating the digits of Pi has proven to be a fascination for mathematicians throughout history. Some spent their lives calculating the digits of Pi, but until computers, less than 1,000 digits had been calculated. In 1949, a computer calculated 2,000 digits and the race was on. Millions of digits have been calculated, with the record held (as of September 1999) by a supercomputer at the University of Tokyo that calculated 206,158,430,000 digits.




Year 9 Meningitis ACWY & Td/IPV Immunisations

Year 10 D&T





ADMINISTERING PARACETAMOL – CONSENT REQUIRED

With regard to paracetamol, the school office hold a supply to be administered for the relief of headaches, migraine, neuralgia, and rheumatic aches and pains.

We are asking parents to provide the school with written consent for the administering of paracetamol. Holding this information will enhance the current system we have in place for first aid, and will enable us to deliver a faster, more efficient provision.

The school will only administer with written consent from you giving us permission to do so. Pupils are **NOT** allowed to carry their own paracetamol. If paracetamol is administered at any time during the school day we will inform the parent/carer of the time of administration and dosage. We ask all students to only ask for or take paracetamol in a responsible way.

Paracetamol will only be administered as a last resort. A first aider will assess if paracetamol is required and will ensure it is administered in their presence. Students will be prompted to tell a member of staff if they have already taken any that day.

PROVIDE CONSENT ON PARENTPAY

Please can we ask you to login to your ParentPay account and provide consent, granting the school permission for your son or daughter to be given paracetamol when required.





Solution to last Week's Puzzler

E Let the area of the equilateral triangle of side 1 be A. If similar figures have sides which are in the ratio k: 1, then the ratio of their areas is k²: 1. So the areas of the triangles with sides 2, 3, 4 are 4A, 9A, 16A respectively.



So, as shown in the diagram, the total shaded area is 3A + 8A + 15A = 26A. Therefore n = 26.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

D Assume that a > b. Then a + b = 7 and a - b = 2. Adding these two equations together gives 2a = 9. So $a = \frac{9}{2}$ and hence $b = 7 - \frac{9}{2} = \frac{14 - 9}{2} = \frac{5}{2}$. Therefore $a \times b = \frac{9}{2} \times \frac{5}{2} = \frac{45}{4} = 11\frac{1}{4}$.
