From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Thank you for the support in getting the children back to school. It's been a great start to the term and the children have settled far better than we'd anticipated given the circumstances.

Wednesday proved to be exciting when we began filming a video for the virtual Open Evening. This included the use of a Drone taking birds-eye shots of the school and impromptu lessons on technology and filming by the production company, Aerial Film and Photo. The company will be back on Monday to complete the basic footage before the editing happens and we aim to launch our new website on the 28th September with it.

We're a Nut Free School

Particularly for the new students joining us this year, can I gently remind all students that we've several students who have potentially fatal allergic reactions to nuts. We have to be a nut free school. Please do check the contents of the food you bring in and check that traces of nuts are not in the ingredients of the delicious lunches I've jealously eyed on the playground.

Life under CV19 and Supporting those at home

With a *safety first* mantra, parents are quite rightly being cautious when the inevitable colds and coughs manifest themselves. I'm delighted to say that although attendance is inevitable lower than previous years, it is the strongest in the Trust and very high when compared to the national current figures. So far there have been no positive cases of CV in the school.

We're trying to ensure that despite the unusual circumstances, no one is left behind so we're doing 3 things to help to this end:

- Work that is completed in class will be uploaded onto each class' Microsoft Team on line. Typically this will be a PowerPoint but other resources and homework may be placed there. That means students can pick up their work if they aren't in school for reasons such as being tested or in quarantine.
- 2. We've equipped students in Year 11 with text/workbooks from the appropriate exam boards in a number of subjects including Science, Maths and English where they are available so that, in the event of a lockdown they have the syllabus and the correct sequence of the course to work from at home. If your son/daughter has one of these please ensure they look after it it's theirs to keep and work in but they aren't cheap and we won't be able to replace them.
- 3. Children that *have to be* at home can still remain in contact with us with a specific individual to help them get everything they need to continue learning should they be at home. Miss Euden is one of our Learning Support Assistants (LSA) who will act as a contact for those students who are having to isolate and/or await results, and hopefully help to ease any anxieties around continuing learning whilst at home. Miss Euden will contact those children via Microsoft Teams to check that they are getting the work set for their timetabled lessons so they can stay on track alongside their peers. More specifically, she'll act as a link between your child and specific teachers if there is an issue about a certain lesson they are doing where they are struggling she'll be able to ensure that the tutors get back to you. If there are any technical issues she will her best to help sort those out as quickly as possible.

Pre-Public Exams from 5th October (for those students preparing for public exams this school year)

It's earlier than usual but we're preparing those students who are undertaking public exams (Years 11-13) for the first set of PPE (Mocks) assessments. The reason why we do any assessment is primarily to capture a sense of; where the students are in terms of what they have learned, diagnose any gaps in learning and lastly set up a personalised learning plan (PLC) for them in each of their subjects.

There are 2 driving factors in our decision to move these earlier. Firstly, with the last 6 months of disrupted learning there is the need to get more than just anecdotal evidence to assess students' current state of knowledge in each subject. Additionally we need to think wisely about potential future disruption. Although summer exams are being finalised by the Exam Boards as you read

this, there's still every possibility centre assessed grades (CAGs) or some kind of accreditation based on the school evidence might be required if national or *repeated localised* lockdowns present a situation where summer exams become unfair or simply inoperable. If that does happen we'll most likely be required to offer proof of grades or a trail of evidence upon which we might predict a final outcome. To that end we'll prepare the students with ample opportunity to do their best and we've built revision time into the schedule so they can show themselves in the best light with material they've already covered up to this point.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

If the first number was a 1 then you could have 1, 3, 3, 3, 10. Then, working systematically, I added one to the penultimate number and subtracted one from the final number. Using this way, I know that the average will always be 4 and that the mode and median will stay the same as long as I keep at least two 3s.

1, 3, 3, 3, 10
1, 3, 3, 4, 9
1, 3, 3, 5, 8
1, 3, 3, 6, 7
Then, continuing with this method, I replaced the 1 at the beginning with a 2. I got these answers...
2, 3, 3, 3, 9
2, 3, 3, 4, 8
2, 3, 3, 5, 7
2, 3, 3, 6, 6 is not included because it isn't clear whether the mode is 3 or 6.
Once again, I replaced the first digit and made it into a 3. I got the answers...
3, 3, 3, 3, 8
3, 3, 3, 4, 7
3, 3, 3, 5, 6

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

B Since 2 + 0 + 1 + 9 = 12 and by inserting brackets only $+ \text{ or } - \text{ signs are possible between the numbers, no value greater than 12 may be obtained. Also, <math>2 - (0 - 1 - 9) = 2 - 0 + 1 + 9 = 12$ and hence a result of 12 is possible. Therefore the largest possible value that can be obtained is 12.
