St Joseph's Book Day 2023 Thursday 17th of March

We will be holding St Joseph's book day on the 17th of March as a result of the school closure this week. All students will now have the opportunity to be involved in the dress up competition and activities throughout the day. Keep your eyes peeled for next week's newsletter for more information.

Theme of the Week – Jesus

Usually, in the gospel, events follow one another without mention of time, so when time \underline{is} mentioned, it means something. In our case, Matthew is inviting us to go back to what happened \underline{six} days earlier because it is the very key for the interpretation of the Transfiguration of Jesus.

Six days earlier Jesus and his disciples were in Caesarea Philippi, the city of the King, and he asked them who the people said that he was, and who they themselves thought he was. Peter answered correctly 'You are the messiah, the Son of the living God', but when Jesus moved on to say that he would go to Jerusalem and be humiliated and killed by the religious establishment, Peter was shocked and began to rebuke him. Peter, like all the others, would welcome a powerful messiah who would liberate them from the Romans and establish a new, splendid kingdom, but Jesus was speaking more like a loser! What kind of glorious king would agree to be tortured and killed by his enemies? Jesus then spoke to Peter those harsh words: Get behind me, Satan, for you don't think according to God but according to the world.

It is because of this misunderstanding about himself and the nature of God that Jesus after six days chooses the three more mature apostles and leads them up the mount to reveal himself more fully. Jesus is transformed before their eyes, and the Greek verb used is *metamorphóo* (from which comes 'metamorphosis'), which is translated 'to change form in keeping with inner reality'. Just like a caterpillar which is repugnant to the sight but inwardly is a beautiful butterfly, Jesus from the outside looked nothing special, a poor man surrounded by a bunch of scruffs, walking towards failure and rejection, but in reality he is GOD himself carrying out the work of redemption with the power of love.

Matthew uses a few biblical images to convey the divinity of Jesus: the face shining like the sun (a reference to Psalm 84), and the robes being white as light (Psalm 104). Then we see two major characters appearing beside Jesus: Moses and Elijah, symbolising the Old Covenant described in the Law (Moses) and Prophets (Elijah). Why them? Because both went up mount Horeb to see the Glory of God, but were unable to because it was too much for them to behold (Exodus 33:18-22, Moses says to God: Show me your glory! 1Kings 19).

Now they appear beside Jesus because God has finally revealed his true face in him, and he looks nothing like a vengeful, angry, legalistic God, but is all about LOVE. Jesus shows to all that the true glory of God is love. The Hebrew word which we translate 'glory', Tip literally means WEIGHT/SUBSTANCE, so the glory of something is what that thing is made of, its essence, and Jesus shows us that the essence of God is love, and that he has come to start a new world in which those who want to be great will make themselves servants of all.

Peter is raptured in contemplation of this glory, and suggests to prepare three tents for Jesus and his illustrious visitors. In Biblical language, pitching the tent means stability, settlement. Peter would like to settle for a permanent contemplation of the Glory of God, but that is not Jesus' plan. After having seen him, one must go back down to the plane and bring the light of that vision to their brothers and sisters. The unofficial motto of the Dominican Order sums this up beautifully: contemplare et contemplata aliis tradere' that is 'to contemplate, and then to bring the fruits of contemplation to others.'

As Peter is speaking, a luminous cloud came over them, and a voice from within it spoke. The cloud is a biblical image for the **PRESENCE** of God with his people. In the form of a cloud God appeared to his people in Exodus and guided them as they came out of Egypt. The voice itself is a rabbinic literary feature used to express the thoughts of God. In our case, **God expresses his approval for Jesus and confirms him as the one who shows his true face, the one in whom he recognizes himself, and urges the disciples (and all of us) to listen to his teaching and follow it if we want to avoid living as substandard human beings.** It is this invitation to follow Jesus's teaching – not the cloud or the voice that causes Peter, James and John to fall to the ground, i.e. to be terrified. Why?

Because Jesus proposes a new world in which the values of the plane (the old world) are completely subverted. We humans have a natural tendency to preserve ourselves and our life, and consequently use things and people to achieve this purpose. Jesus now asks us to be servants of the life of others, to forget about power, fame, reputation, wealth and praise, and rather allow ourselves to become means through which our brothers and sisters may have true life in abundance — and this is terrifying because it means giving up our egos!

Matthew decided to include this episode of Jesus' life not in order to add a fancy story to his Gospel, but <u>as a message for us</u>. Sometimes we too – like the disciples – have a wrong idea of God, sometimes we treat him as our life insurance, the one who must make sure that all our plans and desire go the right way. Sometimes we just allow him to be the icing on the cake of our life, a topping which stays on the surface without sinking deep.

As we move on in the journey of Lent, let us ask ourselves whether we have really understood what God is asking us. Is our faith comfortable? Have we settled for saying a few prayers here and there, and go to the odd Sunday Mass? If that is the case we might want to reconsider what it means to follow Christ, because it requires that we <u>deny ourselves</u>, and that's the most difficult thing to do for selfish people like us.

To conclude, we too experience the Transfiguration every Sunday at Mass, when Jesus leads us away from the noisy crowd, shows us the true face of God, and is transformed into bread for us, that we may assimilate him, and become in turn bread for the sustenance of our brothers and sisters around us in the world, at home, at work, at school.

A reading from the Gospel of St Matthew (17:1-9)

And after six days Jesus took with him Peter and James and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain apart. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his garments became white as light. And behold, there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him.

And Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, it is well that we are here; if you wish, I will make three booths here, one for you and one for Moses and one for Elijah."

He was still speaking, when lo, a bright cloud overshadowed them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." When the disciples heard this, they fell on their faces, and were filled with awe. But Jesus came and touched them, saying, "Rise, and have no fear." And when they lifted up their eyes, they saw no one but Jesus only. And as they were coming down the mountain, Jesus commanded them, "Tell no one the vision, until the Son of man is raised from the dead."

Saint of the Week St John of God (1495-1550)



John was a mercenary fighting for Emperor Charles V. At the age of 40 he had a strong conversion, and his fervor was so great that it was mistaken for madness, which landed him into an insane asylum. When he came out of the asylum through the intercession and guidance of St John of the cross, he built a hospital in Granada and looked after the sick and dying for the rest of his life. In St John shone the virtues of

Compassion & Love.

Day 2

Peter is overexcited to see the glory of God shining in Jesus and to see him talking to Moses and Elijah, the great Patriarch and the great Prophet. He suggests to build three tents for them.

 What do you think that building a tent means?

Day 4

This episode was not included by Matthew in the gospel as a simple story, but as a message for us, disciples of today.

- What do you think that message is?
- How do we experience Jesus' metamorphosis in our daily lives?

Applications for the free online London Med Schools Summer Programme 2023 are now open. This programme is for Year 12 students living in England (outside of Greater London), who have only attended non-selective state schools since age 11 and are currently studying A-level biology and chemistry. For more details on student eligibility, you can visit our website or access the application form here.

Funded by Health Education England, the London Med Schools Summer Programme brings together four of London's medical schools (King's College London, Queen Mary University of London, St George's University of London, and University College London) to give 75 Year 12 students from across England an opportunity to find out what it is like to study medicine in London. Working with patients and student ambassadors, participants will gain a greater understanding of the realities of being a doctor and the skills needed to succeed.

The main summer school programme takes place from Monday 17th July to Friday 21st July on Zoom. There will also be additional events delivered in conjunction with the summer school which are detailed on the application form.



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

A In the diagram shown, T is the foot of the perpendicular from R to PQ produced. Consider triangle QTR. Angle $QTR = 90^{\circ}$ and, because the sum of angles on a straight line = 180° , angle $RQT = (180 - 2 \times 60)^{\circ} = 60^{\circ}$. So $\sin 60^{\circ} = \frac{RT}{QR}$ and hence

$$P = \sum_{Q \in T}^{R} R$$

$$RT = QR \times \sin 60^\circ = 2 \times \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} = \sqrt{3}$$
. Also $\cos 60^\circ = \frac{QT}{QR}$, so $QT = QR \times \cos 60^\circ = 2 \times \frac{1}{2} = 1$. Therefore $PT = 7$.

By Pythagoras' Theorem,
$$PR^2 = PT^2 + TR^2 = 7^2 + (\sqrt{3})^2 = 49 + 3 = 52$$
. So $PR = \sqrt{52} = \sqrt{4} \times \sqrt{13} = 2\sqrt{13}$.



The St-Joseph's Maths Department presents $Pi(\pi=3.14...)$ Day which will be held on Tuesday, March 14th, 2023. It's the 3rd month and the 14th day (Kool, isn't it!).

The day will be celebrated with a competition called "Memorizing Pi" or (Memorizing digits of π)

This means, on Tuesday March 14th 2023, students will come to M6 where they will get a chance to write-from memory as many digits of $Pi(\pi)$ they can remember. We hope to have a winner for each House, Year group as well as an overall St Joseph's Champion.

Pi Web Sites

Pi continues to be a fascination of many people around the world. If you are interested in learning more, there are many web sites devoted to the number Pi. There are sites that offer thousands, millions, or billions of digits, pi clubs, pi music, people who calculate digits, people who memorize digits, Pi experiments and more. Check this <u>Yahoo</u> page for a complete listing.

Memorization of pi

He holds the current unofficial <u>world record</u> (100,000 digits) in 16 hours, starting at 9 a.m. (16:28 GMT) on October 3, 2006. He equaled his previous record of 83,500 digits by nightfall and then continued until stopping with digit number 100,000 at 1:28 a.m. on October 4, 2006. The event was filmed in a public hall in <u>Kisarazu</u>, east of <u>Tokyo</u>, where he had five-minute breaks every two hours to eat <u>onigiri</u> to keep up his energy levels. Even his trips to the toilet were filmed to prove that the exercise was legitimate.

His previous world record of 83,431 was performed from July 1, 2005, to July 2, 2005.

On Pi Day, 2015, he claimed to be able to recite 111,701 digits. 4

Despite Haraguchi's efforts and detailed documentation, the <u>Guinness World Records</u> have not yet accepted any of his records set.

Haraguchi views the memorization of pi as "the religion of the universe", [2] and as an expression of his lifelong quest for eternal truth

A Brief History of Pi

Ancient civilizations knew that there was a fixed ratio of circumference to diameter that was approximately equal to three. The Greeks refined the process and Archimedes is credited with the first theoretical calculation of Pi.

In 1761 Lambert proved that Pi was irrational, that is, that it can't be written as a ratio of integer numbers.

How many digits are there? Does it ever end?

Because Pi is known to be an irrational number it means that the digits never end or repeat in any known way. But calculating the digits of Pi has proven to be an fascination for mathematicians throughout history. Some spent their lives calculating the digits of Pi, but until computers, less than 1,000 digits had been calculated. In 1949, a computer calculated 2,000 digits and the race was on. Millions of digits have been calculated, with the record held (as of September 1999) by a supercomputer at the University of Tokyo that calculated 206,158,430,000 digits.
