THEME OF THE WEEK – Trinity

A reading from St John's Gospel John 16:12-15

Homework

Dear Parents and Carers

I wanted to draw your attention to a push we are having on homework this half term and explain the systems we currently use in order to help your son and daughter manage their own learning.

Homework benefits our students in a number of ways: increasing their independence, their ability to be self-regulating and develop opportunities for consolidating their knowledge on topics learned in class or prepare them for knowledge they are going to cover in class, to name just a few.

We are currently reviewing the quality, quantity and effectiveness of homework within the school with a view to making further improvements in the future. In the meantime, please be aware that there are things parents can do to help students manage their homework.

- Homework is set by staff on ClassCharts for the week ahead by Monday lunchtime and it should be released in line with the homework timetable. It is possible for parents and students to see the task and the deadlines and we encourage you to engage with the ClassCharts for Parents app as regularly as you can.

- Please talk to your son or daughter about their homework; you could ask them about the knowledge they have learned which they need to use or, especially with older students, the skills they need on how to apply this knowledge to, for example, an extended writing question.
- You can talk to them about the conditions in which they complete their homework eg. Is it best done in a private or shared space? As a father myself, I am aware that 'I'm doing my homework' might sound like a great response from behind a closed door, but doesn't account for how many screens, tunes or social media apps out of sight might be distracting from the task in hand!

We always seek to reward students for all their good work – both in class and homework - which we do using the usual ClassCharts positive points system and this is awarded by the individual teachers who set the homework. We do also award Xs for homework which I have had a few enquiries about recently and I'd also like to clarify:

- If a student doesn't complete or submit homework they are awarded an X for homework (an 'XH').
- 3 XHs in a whole term ie. Autumn, Spring and Summer means students will need to attend Homework detention the week following their 3rd XH being awarded, on a Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday for one hour each afternoon, in which they have a computer to complete their missing homework and any other additional work.
- Should students not attend without a legitimate reason then they will be awarded a Friday afternoon detention in addition to their homework detentions.
- If there are queries about this then students can message me on Teams directly up to 6pm.

Year 10 Geography Students:

I am pleased to be able to offer your child the opportunity to take part in a school trip to the Field Studies Centre (FSC) in Amersham on 7th / 8th November 2022. This course runs from 9:30 am and students will board the coach at school by 9:00am to arrive on time. It will end at 3:30 pm where students will then board the coach for their trip back to school and will need to be collected upon arrival. The trip will be led by Miss Boland (Head of Geography) and organised through FSC. This is a compulsory trip for all GCSE Geography students as their Paper 3: Geographical Applications exam will explicitly question them about their fieldwork findings and enquiry process.

What's it all about?

Students will carry out fieldwork to investigate changes in river channel characteristics along the course of the river including a quantitative measure of discharge and qualitative fieldwork methods to consider landforms such as meanders. Students will have an opportunity to develop understanding of the kinds of

questions that can be investigated through fieldwork in river environments and have an opportunity to develop a question(s) based on their location and the task.

The added value of this trip allows students to develop personal skills, have fun, be inspired by a passion for the subject and build friendships which is vital post-covid lockdowns.

What does it cost?

The cost per person is £33.00 to be paid prior on Parent Pay. There are no extras and there are no shops on site for purchasing anything extra.

During the visit students will be welcomed to the centre and given an appropriate health and safety briefing. Their session will start with an introduction to the day, aims and objectives. Throughout the day we will undertake fieldwork, collecting data appropriate to the topic. We will break for lunch, before continuing with our fieldwork. Please make sure that students are equipped with a packed lunch as there are no food services on site. We go out in all weathers and seasons and FSC will tailor the content of the day accordingly, but please make sure that students wear appropriate clothing and footwear.

What do I need to do next?

If you would like your child to go on the trip, please pay the amount of £33.00 via ParentPay and complete the consent and information required by Friday 10th June 2022. If there is an issue with payment, please contact Miss Boland to arrange alternatives.

Please note that once deposits have been paid to FSC they are not refundable and terms and conditions will apply. If you have any particular questions or concerns regarding your child's participation in the trip please don't hesitate to contact me.





Solution to last Week's Puzzler

- D** As $PQ = PR$, $\angle PRQ = \angle PQR = x^\circ$. Also, as $PR = PS$, $\angle PRS = \angle PSR = x^\circ$. Therefore, $\angle QRS = (2x)^\circ$. The sum of the interior angles of quadrilateral $PQRS$ is 360° . Therefore $x + x + 2x + x = 360$, so $5x = 360$. Hence $x = 72$.
