Theme of the Week – Water of Life

John's Gospel is commonly called the theological gospel, because every episode he records has a deeper theological meaning. In this episode Jesus is on a journey from Jericho to Galilee, and the normal route would have been on the eastern side of the river Jordan, but he decides to go through Samaria. Why? **Because he has an important encounter awaiting him**. Samaria was a piece of land between Judea and Galilee which was considered contaminated by infidelity and idolatry, because when Assyria conquered it in 722 BC, most of the Jews were deported, and 5 pagan peoples resettled in their place. These pagan settlers married the remaining Jews and gave origin an ethnically and religiously mixed race which retained the basics of Jewish religion, but contaminated it with foreign Gods and pagan practices. <u>Samaritans were hated passionately by the Jews and considered utter rubbish.</u>

As Jesus reaches Sychar, he is tired and stops at the well of Jacob. In the bible the WELL IS OFTEN THE MEETING PLACE OF LOVERS. At a well a servant of Abraham found a wife for his son Isaac (Genesis 24), Jacob met his beloved Rachel (Genesis 29) and Moses his wife Sephora (Exodus 2). Jesus too is waiting for his lover at the well, a lover who has gone astray, left her legitimate husband and went away with five strangers.

As this woman approaches the well, Jesus asks her for a drink. We are used to using (and wasting!) water easily turning on the tap, but in the ancient world water was a very precious good and procuring it was not as easy as it is today. In the Jewish culture, asking for water equals asking to be welcomed. Jesus' first words to his unfaithful lover are "will you welcome me? I have something important to tell you". The woman is surprised that a Jewish man would even speak to a Samaritan, and a woman at that! Jesus goes straight to the point and refuses to enter into these petty guarrels because what he really wants to talk about is THE GIFT OF GOD. This is what the Christian faith is all about, the FREE GIFT OF GOD in Jesus Christ. The starting point of our Christian faith is not commandments, rules, prayers, liturgies etc., but the simple understanding that we are loved people and that Jesus chose the long, tiring way just for the sake of having a chance to meet us at the well! What does he want from us? He wants to offer us the LIVING WATER, the only water that quenches the thirst of the human heart. As humans we have many needs, most of which are good, but these needs are satisfied for a time and then leave us thirsty again: food, drink, money, relationships, sexuality, and career. These are all good things, but we must acknowledge that they do not suffice by themselves to make us really happy. Only Jesus can offer the true contentment of our hearts, the water that will not only make us happy, but also overflow on others spreading life all around us.

Jesus out of the blue asks the woman to go and fetch her husband, thus provoking the embarrassed admission that she is an immoral woman who has left her righteous husband and run after five other men. Their names? The first is **Mr Bank Account**, the second **Master Pleasure**, the third **Sir Power**, the fourth **Dr Career**, and the last one **Lord Self**. The Samaritan woman has no name. Why? John left the space blank <u>so that we could write our name in it</u>. We are that nameless woman, because we have abandoned our husband, *GOD*, the only one that can make us happy, fulfilled and fruitful, the only one worth donating our life to. We daily despise all those blessings and run after things that <u>promise happiness but never deliver it</u>.

Christians do this too, and this is why John chose the image of a Samaritan woman rather than a pure pagan, because Samaritans had retained a worship of God, but put him on the same level of other inferior idols. When we Christians proclaim ourselves followers of Christ, but then are driven by earthly interests seeking happiness in them, we are nothing more than Samaritans who have betrayed our husband for an inferior kind of love.

Lent is the precious occasion that God gives us to be met at the well by Jesus Christ, the Lover who comes to reclaim what belongs to him, to re-purchase his unfaithful wife. In this holy time let us look at ourselves, our lives and our priorities. How many 'lovers' have we allowed to come between us and God? How many false promises of happiness have we believed? How many occasions have we lost to be truly fulfilled?

Water of life

A reading from the Gospel of St John (4:5-25)

So he came to a city of Samaria, called Sychar, near the field that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and so Jesus, wearied as he was with his journey, sat down beside the well. It was about the sixth hour.

There came a woman of Samaria to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." For his disciples had gone away into the city to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" For Jews have no dealings with Samaritans. Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you have nothing to draw with, and the well is deep; where do you get that living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us the well, and drank from it himself, and his sons, and his cattle?" Jesus said to her, "Every one who drinks of this water will thirst again, but whoever drinks of the water that I shall give him will never thirst; the water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, that I may not thirst, nor come here to draw."

Jesus said to her, "Go, call your husband, and come here." The woman answered him, "I have no husband." Jesus said to her, "You are right in saying, 'I have no husband'; for you have had five husbands, and he whom you now have is not your husband; this you said truly." The woman said to him, "Sir, I perceive that you are a prophet. Our fathers worshiped on this mountain; and you say that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship." Jesus said to her, "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and now is, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for such the Father seeks to worship him. God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth." The woman said to him, "I know that Messiah is coming (he who is called Christ); when he comes, he will show us all things." Jesus said to her, "I who speak to you am he."


Support at St Joseph's

Idiom of the Week

"Like a cat on a hot tin roof."

Meaning: To be anxious and unable to sit still or relax.

Origin: Skittish, nervous, ill at ease. A similar analogy—"like a cat on a hot bake-stone"—appeared in John Ray's Proverbs of 1678. It was later replaced by "like a cat on hot bricks," still used in the mid-twentieth century, but Tennessee Williams preferred the more picturesque "hot tin roof" for the title of his 1955 play, Cat on a Hot Tin Roof. Example: "Why is Carrie pacing?" B: "She's waiting for the doctor to call with her test results, so she's been like a cat on a hot tin roof all day."

Examples: "The coach acted like a cat on a hot tin roof throughout the game."

"When she realized she had little time left to finish the work she behaved like a cat on a hot tin roof."

In Spanish: « Como una gata en un techo de hojalata caliente. »

In French: « Comme un chat sur un toit de tôle chaude. »

Y12 Biology & Chemistry Students

Applications for the free online London Med Schools Summer Programme 2023 are now open. This programme is for Year 12 students living in England (outside of Greater London), who have only attended non-selective state schools since age 11 and are currently studying A-level biology and chemistry. Funded by Health Education England, the London Med Schools Summer Programme brings together four of London's medical schools (King's College London, Queen Mary University of London, St George's University of London, and University College London) to give 75 Year 12 students from across England an opportunity to find out what it is like to study medicine in London. Working with patients and student ambassadors, participants will gain a greater understanding of the realities of being a doctor and the skills needed to succeed.

The main summer school programme takes place from Monday 17th July to Friday 21st July on Zoom. There will also be additional events delivered in conjunction with the summer school which are detailed on the application form.




Solution to last Week's Puzzler

E There is exactly one route from "1" to "2", but two routes from "1" to "3" - one route directly from "1" to "3" and one route which moves from "1" to "2" to "3".
To move from "1" to "4", it is necessary to move from "2" directly to "4" or to move from "3" to "4". So the number of routes from "1" to "4" is 1 + 2 = 3.
By a similar method, the number of routes from "1" to "5" is 2 + 3 = 5 and from "1" to "6" is 3 + 5 = 8. Finally, the number of routes from "1" to "7" is 5 + 8 = 13.
(Note that the numbers of routes to each of the squares is a term in the Fibonacci sequence.)

St. Josephs High Pi Day 2023

The St-Joseph's Maths Department presents $Pi(\pi = 3.14...)$ Day which will be held on Tuesday, March 14th, 2023. It's the 3rd month and the 14th day (Kool, isn't it!).

The day will be celebrated with a competition called "Memorizing Pi" or (Memorizing digits of π)

This means, on Tuesday March 14th 2023, students will come to M6 where they will get a chance to writefrom memory as many digits of Pi(π) they can remember. We hope to have a winner for each House, Year group as well as an overall St Joseph's Champion.

Pi Web Sites

Pi continues to be a fascination of many people around the world. If you are interested in learning more, there are many web sites devoted to the number Pi. There are sites that offer thousands, millions, or billions of digits, pi clubs, pi music, people who calculate digits, people who memorize digits, Pi experiments and more. Check this <u>Yahoo</u> <u>page</u> for a complete listing.

Memorization of pi

He holds the current unofficial <u>world record</u> (100,000 digits) in 16 hours, starting at 9 a.m. (16:28 GMT) on October 3, 2006. He equaled his previous record of 83,500 digits by nightfall and then continued until stopping with digit number 100,000 at 1:28 a.m. on October 4, 2006. The event was filmed in a public hall in <u>Kisarazu</u>, east of <u>Tokyo</u>, where he had five-minute breaks every two hours to eat <u>onigiri</u> to keep up his energy levels. Even his trips to the toilet were filmed to prove that the exercise was legitimate.

His previous world record of 83,431 was performed from July 1, 2005, to July 2, 2005.

On Pi Day, 2015, he claimed to be able to recite 111,701 digits.^[1]

Despite Haraguchi's efforts and detailed documentation, the <u>Guinness World Records</u> have not yet accepted any of his records set.

Haraguchi views the memorization of pi as "the religion of the universe", 2 and as an expression of his lifelong quest for eternal truth

A Brief History of Pi

Ancient civilizations knew that there was a fixed ratio of circumference to diameter that was approximately equal to three. The Greeks refined the process and Archimedes is credited with the first theoretical calculation of Pi.

In 1761 Lambert proved that Pi was irrational, that is, that it can't be written as a ratio of integer numbers.

How many digits are there? Does it ever end?

Because Pi is known to be an irrational number it means that the digits never end or repeat in any known way. But calculating the digits of Pi has proven to be an fascination for mathematicians throughout history. Some spent their lives calculating the digits of Pi, but until computers, less than 1,000 digits had been calculated. In 1949, a computer calculated 2,000 digits and the race was on. Millions of digits have been calculated, with the record held (as of September 1999) by a supercomputer at the University of Tokyo that calculated 206,158,430,000 digits.
