We are a Listening Community

Over the last half term, we have spoken to a large number of the children, and looked into where they were at with their learning. We read a lot of research and analysed the trends...

We are a Learning Community

What we learnt most significantly was that some of our children were not getting involved in lessons as much as they should be when it came to thinking aloud and responding to questions. All our Heads of Department and Heads of Year have come into school on Wednesdays at the break of dawn, purely to work at a strategic level around issues of assessment, the curriculum and, of course, teaching and learning. A number of Heads of Departments researched proactive methods of engagement and presented their findings and collectively arrived at an Oracy strategy actioned through a hands down method when asking questions (Assessment for Learning) for addressing the issues we have uncovered around learning. What this means is that we will be trialing a method where teachers will ask students directly (even strategically), in class rather than being reliant on just those that offer a response with their hands up in class. All of this sums up a more research led and data driven approach to improving the student experience of learning. We have already seen some notable gains through the literacy strategy we introduced at the beginning of the year, where each Form Group reads a challenging text before lessons start. First impressions appear to be that the students are reading faster, confidently and more fluently than they were in September.

Some other exciting news concerning our school. The Diocese and St Michael's Catholic School (High Wycombe) approached The Trust for assistance in running their school as they are in need of a Head Teacher. I am pleased to say that The Trust turned to St Joseph's, and Mr Sindall has taken on the challenge on as a *secondment* and will be starting there in January 2022 whilst still being employed by us here in Slough – he is, needless to say, one of us! We wish him the best of luck for this future venture in advance.

Actions in place to mitigate the spread of Covid: Face masks

Following on from the Newsletter last week – the safety of the children is paramount; the last thing we wish to do is to end up with a situation where students have to isolate as they approach their PPE exams or the public Examinations in the summer.

Can I ask that parents please, with the exception of those medically exempt, ensure the students bring in facemasks with them to school. From now, until a review of the practice at Christmas by The Health Security Agency we will consider them as an essential part of the uniform.

Additionally, please do continue to use the home testing LAT flow tests. If you do contract Covid please let us know either by phone or via cv19@st-josephs.slough.sch.uk . Students were provided with 2 weeks of home tests last week.

A GOD WHO SPEAKS

In our Gospel reading this week, Jesus uses the image of a fig tree that shows the summer is near when it's leaves come out, such a simple image, and one we can relate to. We can see in nature the seasons changing. Jesus is teaching us that there will be signs for us to see when He comes again in His second coming. We must be aware, to keep a look out, to be ready for Christ to come but not just in His second coming, but in His coming to us in our lives each and every day. Dear Parents and Carers,

I wanted to alert you to a new approach to questioning which we are bringing into all of our lessons, as of Monday, consistently across the school.

In response to research and student voice, from next week we will be introducing a consistent 'no hands up' answering approach to questions within our lessons. This means, in practice, that staff will be questioning all students during the course of every lesson with a clear purpose of raising student participation, developing their oracy skills and ensuring that all students are following - and able to demonstrate their understanding of - the content of each lesson.

Whilst this is already practised across the school in several subjects, we are pushing for consistency in all areas so that students are given even greater opportunities to develop their confidence in each of their subject areas.

For the sake of clarity this does not mean that students can't put their hands up to ask questions, instead it simply means that the number of students who are answering questions will increase. Oracy and developing students' skills in clearly articulating responses are a big focus for us this academic year in order to boost our students' confidence and abilities in articulating their learning clearly and concisely.

For many of our magnificent St Joseph's students this won't be hugely different from some of their existing day-to-day experiences in class and for some it may simply mean that they are being asked more questions and being required to provide more answers than they have previously been used to. In the long run it means their understanding, learning and ability to express themselves more clearly will become even more secure.

Whilst this information will be shared with students via their tutor time on Monday, it would be greatly appreciated if you would take a moment over the weekend to explain this development to them.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

E First note that the triangular numbers less than 20 are 1, 3, 6, 10, 15. As we are looking for a sequence of consecutive integers which are respectively prime, even, and triangular, the required triangular number is odd. So it is 3 or 15. It is not 3 as 1 is not prime, but it is 15 as 13 is prime. So the required product = 13 × 14 × 15 = 2730.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

A From the given information, the sum of Megan's first three numbers is −9, the sum of her first four numbers is 16, and the sum of her first five numbers is −25.

Therefore the fourth number is 16 - (-9) = 25, and the fifth number is -25 - 16 = -41. The difference between them is 25 - (-41) = 66.


