FROM THE HEAD TEACHER

THEME OF THE WEEK — Steadfast in Faith

This week Jesus tells another story to explain the importance of keeping prayer going in order not to lose heart. Sometimes, when we look at all the violence, injustice, corruption, financial struggle, poverty and war around us we are tempted to become discouraged. As soon as we switch on the television all we hear is that nothing will ever change, and things will only get worse. Jesus gives us a remedy to avoid going with the flow of resignation and pessimism: PRAYER. **Are you ever tempted to lose heart? Why?**

In order to use this remedy, we have to understand it first. **What is prayer?** Some people think it's the repetition of formulas like the Our Father, Hail Mary, etc. These established texts may well be <u>used in prayer</u>, but they are not PRAYER in themselves. Other people think that prayer is only a way of endearing God to obtain something from him; a tit-for-tat where we pay Him some lip service and then expect Him function as our life insurance. This is not prayer either.

So what is prayer? **A DIALOGUE**. Prayer happens when, in a moment of stillness, we open our hearts to God in a conversation. In this conversation we tell God about our worries and hopes, we express our love for Him and we get to know Him better just as we would a friend or a spouse. How does God speak to us in this dialogue? Through his word: Holy Scripture. Through the <u>prayerful reading</u> of the Bible we understand what God thinks, what his dreams on us are, and how we can align our choices with his project and live lives that build the kingdom of God here on earth.

Prayer only happens within a **relationship** with God. Without a relationship there cannot be authentic prayer, and without prayer we get sucked into the mentality of the world, its fashions, its false promises, and its pessimism. What is your prayer life like? Are your prayers just words or do you have a dialogue with the Father?

Going back to our parable, we see two characters: The judge and the widow. The judge does not represent God, and the message is not that we must annoy an unjust God until he hears our prayers out of tiredness. The judge is the incarnation of all those established institutions which promote injustice rather than justice, oppression rather than liberation, corruption rather than equity. The widow represents those who are weakest and often are the victims of injustice, those who are deprived of the little they have by the greed of others. The widow could have just said "What can I do, this is how the world goes" and go away in resignation, or turn herself to injustice like the others. Instead she cries day and night, takes an active part in the promotion of her right until justice is restored. The widow teaches us that getting involved in restoring justice is worthwhile.

God gave us various gifts so that WE can make a difference in the world rather than expect a miracle from above. It is God's desire to see justice back in our world, but he want us to be the agents of his kingdom and keep trying to build the world he wants by staying in touch with him in prayer. This is the meaning of the last questions Jesus asks: when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?, that is, when Jesus will return in glory to judge all the world, will he find people who love God, remain faithful in a dialogue with him and work for justice, or will he just find automata who repeat prayers while lamenting how miserable a place the world is and hoping in a miracle? In which group will you be?

Weekly Reflections 17th October 2022





A reading from St Luke's Gospel Luke 18:1-8

And he told them a parable to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected man. And there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him and saying, 'Give me justice against my adversary.' For a while he refused, but afterward he said to himself, 'Though I neither fear God nor respect man, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will give her justice, so that she will not beat me down by her continual coming.'" And the Lord said, "Hear what the unrighteous judge says. And will not God give justice to his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will give justice to them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Day 1

In our Gospel Jesus tells a parable to teach us that to avoid becoming discouraged, we must always give space to prayer. Discouragement seems to be very popular in our times, with new wars, financial struggles, climate issues etc.

- Why do you think human beings have a tendency to become discouraged?
- Is there something in particular that makes you lose hope?

Day 4

Jesus asks: when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?, that is, when He will return in glory to judge all the world, will he find people who love God, remain faithful in a dialogue with him and work for justice, or will he just find human robots who repeat prayers while lamenting how miserable a place the world is and hoping in a miracle?

- In which group will you be?
- Where do you think we should turn to find out what God thinks and how He wants us to live?

Day 2

Prayer is the remedy for discouragement. But what is prayer? Is it a mere repetition of formulas (Our Father, Hail Mary etc.)? Is it paying lip service to God so that he may miraculously solve our problems in return?

- Do you have a prayer life?
- If so, how would you describe it?

Day 5

A beautiful prayer to say before going to bed, particularly when you are worried about something: Be present, O merciful God, and protect us through the silent hours of this night, so that we, who are wearied by the changes and chances of this fleeting world, may repose upon your eternal changelessness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Prayer for the Week

Heavenly Father, keep us steadfast in our faith in you. We know that you want to build your Kingdom in this world through our hands; make us hopeful and willing to work in your presence for healing and reconciliation in a troubled world. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen

Day 3

The wicked judge in the parable represents established institutions of power which promote injustice rather than justice, oppression rather than liberation, corruption rather than equity. The widow is a metaphor for those who are weak and helpless, and often at the receiving end of injustice.



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

C The smallest possible range of four positive integers is 3. Let these integers be n, n+1, n+2, n+3. For the mean of these four integers to equal 2017, we have $\frac{n+n+1+n+2+n+3}{4}$ = 2017, that is $n = 2015\frac{1}{2}$. So the smallest possible range is not 3. However, note that the integers 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019 have mean 2017 and range 4. So the smallest possible range of the integers is 4.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

B When one third of the circle is shaded, the angle at the centre of the shaded sector is $360^{\circ} \div 3 = 120^{\circ}$. In diagram A, the sector angle is 90° . In diagram C, the sector angle is $90^{\circ} + 90^{\circ} + 2 = 135^{\circ}$. So the correct diagram has a sector angle greater than that shown in A, but smaller than that shown in C. The only such sector angle is that in B.
