"The glory of God is a

Theme of the week – Eternal Life

Towards the end of his Farewell Discourse, Jesus erupts in to a beautiful dialogue with God in which he prays for his disciples and commits them to His loving care. This is known as the "Priestly Prayer" of Jesus. Why priestly? We give for granted the word 'priest' in our everyday life, and often think that a priest is just one that leads liturgies, a professional of the sacred. Nevertheless, the idea of priest and priesthood is strictly linked with that of sacrifice and intercession. A priest, in every world religion, ancient or modern, is one who offers a sacrifice and intercedes for (prays for, functions as a mediator for) the people. Jesus is the High Priest of our religion, because he offered on the altar of the Cross the most precious sacrifice God could accept, HIMSELF, and having done this he went back to the Father in heaven, where he constantly intercedes and prays for us. This week's Gospel contains part of this Priestly Prayer, and as we approach this text we must not fall into the temptation of trying to understand each word, because this prayer is rather something that we meditate on in silence, savouring it slowly, twisting it over and over again in our mouth until we get to the soft core, just like a humbug.

The most striking thing about this prayer is the intimacy, trust, and confidence with which Jesus addresses His (and OUR) Father. It looks like a dialogue between lovers, not the typical prayers that we are used to mutter, and that more often than not look like a shopping list of all the things we want God to do for us. Sometimes we fail to understand that we have a loving Father looking after us and desiring to have a relationship with us, and treat God as a cash machine or a genie in the lamp ready to satisfy all our wishes. Sometimes we treat our own parents in the same way! Unless we grow in our faith we will never see the face of that loving father, but how does one grow in the faith? Jesus told us: He called a little child to him, and placed the child among them. And he said: "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:2-3). Become like little children, how? Does that mean that we should become gullible and naïve? Certainly not! What Jesus meant was that, rather than trying desperately to be in control of everything, we must learn to be children in the way we rely on our father or mother to look after us, feed us, protect us, console us when things go wrong. Jesus begins his prayer with the word FATHER, and invites us too to call God FATHER in the Lord's Prayer. In this Gospel Jesus is like a child whispering words of love in the ear of his father: All I have is yours...you have given me these people (the disciples and all of us), and now I ask you to sanctify them in your truth. That's what we are, a treasure in the hands of Jesus, a treasure he wants to save and preserve at all costs, including his life! Think for a moment that we are the principal subject of the conversations between God and Jesus, isn't that amazing!

Finally, Jesus prays that, once he has gone back to Him, the Father may protect us, and keep us at unity with Him and the Father. Why? Because we belong to them. This week's Gospel is a declaration that we belong to Christ and God, we are part of their family. This is what prompted St Paul to write these beautiful words in the letter to the Colossians (3:2-3): Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. Our life is hidden with Christ in God because by accepting Him we have died to the false promises of the world with all its traps, and we live as new creatures who know where they come from, and, most importantly, where they are going!

In this prayer Jesus wants to give each of us a sense of <u>BELONGING</u>, and that is the secret of all the men and women who love and follow Him; we belong with God!

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From the Gospel according to John (17:1-11)

Jesus raised his eyes to heaven and said:

'Father, the hour has come:

glorify your Son so that your Son may glorify you;

and, through the power over all mankind that you have given him, let him give eternal life to all those you have entrusted to him.

And eternal life is this: to know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent.

I have glorified you on earth and finished the work that you gave me to do. Now, Father, it is time for you to glorify me with that glory I had with you

before ever the world was. I have made your name known to the men you took from the world to give me. They were yours and you gave them to me,

and they have kept your word.

Now at last they know that all you have given me comes indeed from you;

for I have given them the teaching you gave to me, and they have truly accepted this, that I came from you, and have believed that it was you who sent me.

I pray for them; I am not praying for the world but for those you have given me, because they belong to you: all I have is yours

and all you have is mine, and in them I am glorified.
I am not in the world any longer, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you.' Holy Father, protect them by the power of your name, the name you gave me, so that they may be one as we are one.



Saint of the Week St Philip Neri, Priest (1515-1595)



Born in Florence, Philip went to Rome with the intention of becoming a Jesuit missionary in India. When he saw the huge number of hungry, homeless children in Rome, he started gathering them together in an abandoned church (where they also slept and ate), and came up with a brilliant idea to teach them the faith while having fun: the Oratory! Each day they would read the Bible or lives of the saints, listen to an address, and sing joyfully together. He soon became known in Rome as *Pippo Buono* (Kind *Pippo*) and his legacy lives in the order he founded, the Congregation of the Oratory, or *Oratorians*. He was

They have started their UCAS application process and are currently beginning the first draft of their personal statement. I am writing to give parents a bit of information as to what students should be doing in this summer term to ensure they are on track to making their next step. I have attached a recent, instructional PowerPoint that the students will have received with support in how to:

- Sign up to Oscar our platform for careers **and** university information and guidance and where students will begin writing their personal statement. - Sign up to UCAS hub the platform through which our students will need to apply to university but also the leading platform for searching for and applying to apprenticeships here is hot to set up your application https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=HOVIR8wwgRQ and here is the link to the website http://www.ucas.com/hub. When students begin their application, they will need to link their account to our school centre so that we can input their reference and give feedback on their applications. Solution to last Week's Puzzler

E The prime numbers which are the sums of pairs of numbers in touching circles are all odd as they are greater than 2. This means that any two adjacent circles in the diagram must be filled with one odd number and one even number. The number 10 may not be placed on either side of 5, since $10 + 5 = 15 = 3 \times 5$. So either side of the 5 must be 6 and 8. Below 6 and 8 must be 7 and 9 respectively leaving 10 to be placed in the shaded circle at the bottom.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

B The positive sums of cubes less than the largest option, 36, are $0^3 + 1^3 = 1$; $1^3 + 2^3 = 1 + 8 = 9$ and $2^3 + 3^3 = 8 + 27 = 35$. Hence the correct answer is 9.
