

FROM THE HEAD TEACHER

Dear Parents and Carers,

Important Information for all students undertaking public exams this summer

We received an update from the Department of Education's watchdog, Ofqual, this week concerning contingency plans for the summer examinations. Please find attached a letter from Mr Gibbons aimed primarily for parents and students of Years 11&13 but equally important for all those doing additional public exams this year in lower years. The letter outlines an embryonic plan in case the summer examinations cannot take place due to the pandemic.

It is the full expectation of the government that the summer exams will take place. Students should prepare and expect them to happen. However, if it is the case that they do not, then the school will issue Teacher Assessed Grades (TAGs) in, what appears at first sight, a similar way to which we did last year. This means that the PPE exams that the students sit over the year will now be used in part to help evidence the performance of the children. In line with the guidance offered, there will now be 3 PPE (mock exam) opportunities over the year including this one, but the criteria for determining the TAGs has yet to be published.

We've already structured the 3 PPE (mock exams) into the Year 11 and 13 timetable curriculum opportunities in anticipation of this – so please don't worry – we've always had a plan in hand and we've run this successfully over the last 2 years. What's important at this point is that the children focus on their studies, work hard and prepare for the public exams taking place in summer. We'll keep you up to date as information emerges from the OfQual and the Department of Education as and when it emerges.

Parent Forum

The Pandemic has thrown up a significant number of issues that need addressing in an educational context. For both children at both Primary and Secondary, 20 months out of school will have left an impact and legacy on the children's education that won't really be understood fully until the last child in an educational setting has left school. The Leadership in the School have been taking stock of the impact here at the school and taken this as an opportunity to review what we deliver and how we deliver the curriculum. We've come up with a number of ideas in how we should respond both in the short and long term for the best interests of the children we serve. We'd really appreciate some parental input and feedback whilst we're at the development stage. We'd like to set up a Parents Forum to this end. Student Survey

In the Summer Ofsted produced their national sexual abuse review. The results were shocking. The sheer number of children and young people across the country — especially girls — who said they put up with harassment and abuse day in day out is startling. This is entirely unacceptable behaviour, normalised to the point where children often didn't think it was worth reporting. Many schools said they were simply unaware it was happening. No-one wants that for our young people and it goes against everything we stand for as a Catholic School. We can't assume that it doesn't happen here even if it's not immediately obvious.

Young people face a difficult situation today where, with easy access to the internet on their mobile phones to undesirable websites, it has made it hard for young people to navigate growing up and to make the right choices. It's a larger cultural issue about attitudes and behaviours becoming normalised – and we can't solve it all by ourselves. There's a clear role for the government, us as schools and you as parents are obviously vital in this as well. We approach this issue through the daily reinforcement of the values we have in school, through the teaching of Religious Education and a well thought through curriculum of Personal Social and Health Education, which tackles these kinds of issues in which every Year group participates on a weekly basis. We always hope to see a culture where sexual harassment and abuse aren't tolerated, where issues are spotted and intervention happens earlier.

We already began to look at the issue with a quick snapshot survey in the summer. We'll be involving the students in a further and more detailed survey around this over the next few weeks to understand what their experiences are and we'll action any findings that emerge from there.

THEME OF THE WEEK

Christ the Universal King

We celebrate this week the Feast of Christ the Universal King. This is also the last week in the Church's year before we begin Advent next Sunday. Our Gospel comes from the end of John's Gospel, we are hearing a dialogue between Pilate and Jesus, with Pilate trying to understand who Jesus is. Jesus speaks of the Kingdom He belongs to being not of this world, to which Pilate calls Jesus a king. We have heard in previous weeks about the Kingdom of God, and we are reminded in the Gospel for this week that the Kingdom is not an earthly Kingdom, but a heavenly Kingdom. Jesus came to bring the heavenly Kingdom down to earth, to bring the truth.

What truth do you think Jesus is talking about?

Within this Gospel reading from St John, the last line says; "Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice". Listening can be really challenging for us at times. We are very used to hearing noise, our world being very noisy with music, TV, chatting with others, but how often do we give time to just stop and listen? When we allow ourselves to stop and listen, to find a quiet place, we can hear what's going on in our hearts and minds. That can feel a bit scary or difficult at times, but we need to be doing this, every day. If we stop and listen each day, directing our hearts and minds to God too, we may hear the voice of Jesus. You may not hear His voice as such, but a small prompting in your heart or mind, a thought, an image.

When was the last time you spent some time listening to what was is on your heart and mind?



Why do you think this was chosen?



They will join a sixth form tutor for registration, attend taster lessons and attend a PSHE assembly in their final period of the day. The day is an important part of the process of ensuring students are on the right courses for them that lead them to progression to university or employment in line with their career goals. Maths Challenge Questions of the Week:




Solution to last Week's Puzzler

A The diagrams show one of the twenty-five congruent right-angled triangles and the two such triangles at vertex R.

Let the two acute angles in each of the triangles be x° and y° .





Note that x + y + 90 = 180, as the interior angles of a triangle sum to 180° .

So x + y = 90. In the second diagram, the two angles which meet at R are x° and y° , so we can deduce that angle QRP is a right angle.

Let the length of the hypotenuse of each small triangle be $a \, \text{cm}$.

Note that angle QRP is a right angle, PR has length 4a cm and RQ has length 3a cm.

So the lengths of the sides in triangle PQR are in the ratio 3:4:5.

Therefore the length of PQ, in cm, is $5 \times \frac{2.4}{4} = 3$.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

C The values of the five options are 64, 243, 256, 125, 36 respectively. Of these 256 is the largest, so 4⁴ is the largest of the options.
