Weekly Reflections 6th November 2023





A reading from the Gospel of St Matthew (23:1-12)

Then Jesus said to the crowds and to his disciples: "The teachers of the law and the Pharisees sit in Moses' seat. So you must be careful to do everything they tell you. But do not do what they do, for they do not practice what they preach. They tie up heavy, cumbersome loads and put them on other people's shoulders, but they themselves are not willing to lift a finger to move them.

"Everything they do is done for people to see: They make their phylacteries wide and the tassels on their garments long; they love the place of honour at banquets and the most important seats in the synagogues; they love to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces and to be called 'Rabbi' by others.

"But you are not to be called 'Rabbi,' for you have one Teacher, and you are all brothers. And do not call anyone on earth 'father,' for you have one Father, and he is in heaven. Nor are you to be called instructors, for you have one Instructor, the Messiah. The greatest among you will be your servant. For those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.

Day 1

The phylacteries were small leather boxes that contained scripture from the Torah (the law of God). They were strapped around the body showing the closeness of God's commandments to the person - it might be similar to tattooing the words of God to you in that the words became part of who you were forever - it was a very physical and personal thing. If required, what scripture would you want to have strapped to you to carry around on a daily basis? Take time to choose perhaps 2 or 3 lines of scripture that speak to you at this moment in time and use them for your prayer this week.

Day 2

Lord God, Source of all wisdom, in Duns Scotus you gave us a master of life and thought. Grant that, enlightened by his thought we may remain faithful followers of Christ who lives and reigns with you for ever and ever. Amen. St Joseph, Pray for us

Day 3 Humility

Jesus 'called out' hypocrites who said that they were prayerful and loving people but didn't do it in practice.

Being humble means being 'of the earth' - honest, and putting others before ourselves. Today - what act can I do that puts someone first over my needs.


Remembrance Service – 10th November 2023

- Income Support
- Income based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit

- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

EAL NEWS

(English as an Additional Language)

The Importance of Mother Tongue Language in Education



Research indicates that having a strong mother tongue foundation leads to a much better understanding of the curriculum as well as a more positive attitude towards school, so it is vital that children maintain their first language when they begin schooling in a different language.

Developing the mother tongue is very important because when children develop their mother tongue, they are simultaneously fostering a whole host of other essential skills, such as **critical thinking and literacy skills**. It is this skill-set that they take with them into formal education, and research tells us that any skills and concepts gained in the learner's home language do not need to be re-taught when they transfer to a second language. For example, if a child has developed the ability to guess the meaning of a word through its context or to infer meaning by reading between the lines, these skills are easily transferred when they begin studying in a second language.

It is much harder, however, to teach these abstract skills directly through a second language.

Language and mother tongue also play a huge role in the development of personal, social and cultural identity. Children with a strong foundation in their first language often display a deeper understanding of themselves and their place within society, along with an increased sense of wellbeing and confidence. Certainly, this flows down into every aspect of their lives, including their academic achievement.

It is crucial to note that it is through language we learn about culture, whether it is someone else's language or our own. To deprive children of their mother language literacy is to deprive them of understanding his or her cultural identity, and for children growing up in UK society understanding one's cultural identity can become compromised or changed inevitably. Children who become balanced bilinguals and develop mother language proficiency (ideally from an early age), in addition to acquire languages such as English, are equipped to become global citizens. In conclusion, Languages, with their complex implications for identity, communication, social integration, education development, are of strategic importance for both people and the planet.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

D In the diagram, O is the centre of the lower semicircle, A and C are the points of intersection of the two semicircles and B is the point at the centre of the rectangle and also of the overlap. Now OA is a radius of the semicircle so OA has length 5 cm. Also OB is half the height of the rectangle so has length 4 cm. Angle ABO is a right angle. So triangle ABO is a (3, 4, 5) triangle and hence AC = 2 × 3 cm = 6 cm.



Solution to the Break time Teaser:

B From the information given, there are at least two 9s in the list, since 9 is the mode, and at least one number greater than 10, since 10 is the mean. So there are at least three numbers greater than 8 in the list. Therefore the list must contain at least six numbers, as the median of the numbers is 8. Moreover, it is possible to find suitable lists of six numbers with sum 60 (as the mean is 10), for example 1, 2, 7, 9, 9, 32.

Triangle PQR has been divided into twenty-five congruent right-angled triangles, as shown. The length of RP is 2.4 cm.


