Theme of the Week – Holy Week

On Palm Sunday, we marked Jesus entering Jerusalem on a Donkey with hundreds if not thousands of people coming out celebrating his arrival. Here the Jews at the time celebrated a King who would lead them up against the Romans and set them free again. However, in Jesus's ministry, where he has been preaching the Good News of God, he illustrates to us that he is not a King of war, or violence, or hurt. He is indeed a King of Peace. Jesus arriving on a Donkey (not a horse that would traditionally be used in war) shows us that he is no earthly King or soldier, he comes as a King of peace, of love and of forgiveness.

On Palm Sunday, we also heard the Passion of our Lord (we have commemorated this over the last half term when reflecting and contemplating the Stations of the Cross). How things can change in the matter of only a few days! Remember it is only five days earlier where the crowd celebrated Jesus. At the start of the Passion, it begins with a conspired plan and then the arrest of Jesus leading to his death.

Throughout Holy Week (the week between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday), it is important to remember and focus on the agony and desolation of the Passion. Jesus, our Lord, suffers terribly at the hands of Pilate who throughout is encouraged by the Pharisees to do this. We do not just learn of the awful physical pain Jesus went through in being beaten by soldiers and the burden of the heavy cross being carried on his shoulders to His death. We also learn of other events through the scripture Stations of the Cross; the mental anguish he suffered, Jesus in agony in the garden, praying to God for an alternative way rather than His death. The agony of seeing a friend state to others that he did not know Him; the pain of having His own mother witnessing His death. However, we must remember the fact that His death led to His Resurrection for our salvation, for His mercy and forgiveness, for His love for us.

As we start Holy Week let us put aside our anger, hurt and possibly hate towards others. Let us truly live our lives as Christ intended us to live, through the Good News, by loving and forgiving one another, but supporting those most in need and by ensuring any Cross one is burdened with and has to carry, can be relieved by us in our friendship and kindness. Christ died for us, so our sins are forgiven, so we can be saved and so we too can believe in the eternal glory that is the Kingdom of God. Let this death not be in vain. Jesus is the light, the light we follow for redemption – let us follow this light in everything we do. Amen

A reading from the Gospel of St Mark (11:1-10)

When they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples, and said to them, 'Go into the village opposite you, and immediately as you enter it you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat; untie it and bring it. If any one says to you, "Why are you doing this?" say, "The Lord has need of it and will send it back here immediately."' And they went away, and found a colt tied at the door out in the open street; and they untied it. And those who stood there said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' And they told them what Jesus had said; and they let them go. And they brought the colt to Jesus, and threw their garments on it; and he sat upon it. And many spread their garments on the road, and others spread leafy branches which they had cut from the fields. And those who went before and those who followed cried out, 'Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is coming! Hosanna in the highest!'






#IcandoMaths

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

- A The diagrams show one of the twenty-five congruent right-angled triangles and the two such triangles at vertex R. Let the two acute angles in each of the triangles be x° and y° .



Note that $x + y + 90 = 180$, as the interior angles of a triangle sum to 180° .

So $x + y = 90$. In the second diagram, the two angles which meet at R are x° and y° , so we can deduce that angle QRP is a right angle.

Let the length of the hypotenuse of each small triangle be a cm.

Note that angle QRP is a right angle, PR has length $4a$ cm and RQ has length $3a$ cm.

So the lengths of the sides in triangle PQR are in the ratio $3 : 4 : 5$.

Therefore the length of PQ , in cm, is $5 \times \frac{24}{5} = 24$.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

- D The sum of the interior angles of a quadrilateral is 360° . So the smallest angle in the quadrilateral is $3 \times \frac{360^\circ}{3+4+5+6} = 60^\circ$ and the largest angle is $6 \times \frac{360^\circ}{3+4+5+6} = 120^\circ$. Hence the required difference is 60° .





English as Additional Language

Tips to Support Reading at Home

Shared reading is a great way to develop children's language and communication and to boost their reading skills. Regular reading routines can offer many opportunities for learning. Use the following tips to support reading at home:

<p>Questions</p> <p>Fill free to use your home language when talking about the book.</p>	<p>All reading matters. Shared reading is about 'reading with', not just 'reading to'. Ask questions before, during, and after reading aloud. This can help your child focus attention on the ideas in the story. So, ask lots of 'Wh' questions, such as Who? What? When? Where? Why? Try them when talking about books: for example:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is happening? • Where is this? • Who is that? • When might this be happening?
<p>Ask your child to summarise what they have read</p>	<p>Model how to summarise the key events/facts in the book. Encourage your child to have a go using a proper sentence and relate the book to what he/she already knows or has experienced.</p>
<p>Maintain the motivation to read</p>	<p>Talk about the joy of reading whenever you can. Engage in conversations; offer a literacy-rich environment, even talk about school, magazines, or current events. Ask them what they are reading and discuss the books. Also, ask them about their reading age and appreciate their efforts.</p>
