THEME OF THE WEEK – Listening

This week's and last week's Gospels are a diptych, a painting in two panels. Last week we met a clever manager who ensured for himself security and abundance by investing his goods in relationships. This week we see a man investing all his energy in his goods and ending up with nothing. The scene is a banquet where a luxuriously robed rich man feasts sumptuously. At the feet of the table is a poor man named Lazarus. He is covered with sores and dogs go and lick them, a really pitiful state. In those days napkins were not used and rich people instead cleaned their mouths with bread, which was then thrown to the dogs. Lazarus shares these leftovers with the dogs, his only companions. He is in a state below humanity.

Why does the poor man have a name while the rich man doesn't?

In the ancient world the name was everything, and not having one meant being nobody. In the book of Isaiah (43:1) God comforts his discouraged people saying: Fear not, for I have redeemed you; <u>I have called you by</u> <u>name</u>, you are mine. The rich man thinks he is important, but in the eyes of God, underneath his nice clothes, he is nobody. On the contrary God knows the poor man by name (Lazarus means "God has helped"). Many times in the Bible we read that God looks down to the poor and rescues them, as in **1 Samuel 2:8** He raises the poor from the dust, He lifts the needy from the ash heap to make them sit with nobles, and inherit a seat of honour. **God has a passion for the poor!**

When Lazarus dies he is taken into the bosom of Abraham, who symbolises God. On the contrary, when the rich man dies, he is taken into hell. At this point we witness a dialogue between the rich man and Abraham (God). The former asks for a gesture of pity. He is burning and asks for some relief, but Abraham denies it and mentions a big chasm.

What does that mean? God gives us many chances to repent and change during our lifetime, but there will come a point in which it will not be possible to revert and we will be in the place we have prepared for ourselves.

The second part of the dialogue is the most important. The desperate nameless rich man asks Abraham to send Lazarus' spirit to warn his relatives of what awaits those who live in abundance and don't' care about the needs of others. **Why send a dead person?** The implication is that money and material goods are so seductive that once they cast their spell on our soul, we become blind and only a miracle can save us. This is why Jesus last week said that it is impossible to serve God and money at the same time.

Abraham's reply is short and clear: **No, they have Moses and the Prophets; let them listen to them**. Moses and the prophets means the first five books of the Bible (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers Deuteronomy), plus the Books of the Prophets. These together formed the TORAH, or Hebrew Bible.

What is Jesus trying to teach us?

He is not making a moral judgment between the poor and the rich man. Lazarus may well have been a scoundrel and the rich man an honest man who worked hard and was simply enjoying the fruit of his labour. Jesus' point is that a world in which 10% of people own 90% of all the resources is not the world God envisaged when he created it. As Ghandi famously said, "The world has enough for everyone's need, but not enough for everyone's greed!"

What are we Christians to do?

We must open our hearts to the message of the Gospel and LISTEN. The rich man lost everything because in his lifetime he failed to listen to the words of God, busy as he was enjoying all comforts.

What would the world look like if we listened to what Jesus taught us in Scripture? Luke gives us a good idea in Acts (2:44-45):

And all who believed were together and had all things in common. And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need.

Weekly Reflections 26th September 2022



A reading from St Luke's Gospel Luke 16:19-31

"There was a rich man who was clothed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate was laid a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who desired to be fed with what fell from the rich man's table. Moreover, even the dogs came and licked his sores. The poor man died and was carried by the angels to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried, and in Hades, being in torment, he lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. And he called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the end of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in anguish in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that you in your lifetime received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner bad things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in anguish. And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, in order that those who would pass from here to you may not be able, and none may cross from there to us.' And he said, 'Then I beg you, father, to send him to my father's house— for I have five brothers—so that he may warn them, lest they also come into this place of torment.' But Abraham said, 'They have Moses and the Prophets; let them hear them.' And he said, 'No, father Abraham, but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' He said to him, 'If they do not hear Moses and the Prophets, neither will they be convinced if someone should rise from the dead.'

- Where should we go to understand God's mind-set and find guidance?

St Jerome, Priest & Doctor O God, who gave Saint Jerome a living and tender love for Sacred Scripture, grant that your people may be fruitfully nourished by your Word and find in it the fount of life. Amen

- Income based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

B Let the squares on the border of the large square have side-length 1. Then the large square has side-length 5 and area 25. Note that 8 of the 16 squares on the border of the large square are shaded. The area of the central region of the large square is 25 - 16 = 9. Three-quarters of this area is shaded.

Therefore, the fraction of the large square which is shaded is $\frac{8 + \frac{3}{4} \times 9}{25} = \frac{32 + 27}{100} = \frac{59}{100}$. So 59% of the large square is shaded.


