## **THEME OF THE WEEK – St Joseph**

Our theme for this week is St Joseph as we celebrate the feast day of our patron saint. St Joseph has two feast days, one in March and the other in May. We celebrate the feast of St Joseph the Worker. Joseph was an ordinary man, living and working as a carpenter. There is thought that Joseph was a widower, having been married before and his wife died, now lived alone until he was betrothed to Mary. We never hear the voice of Joseph, but we can take from the Gospel passages that he was a faithful and honest man, and loved Mary and Jesus. He took Jesus to be his own son, caring for Him and teaching Him how to be a carpenter. We can take inspiration from St Joseph in our everyday lives. We all work in some capacity, whether that is our studies at school or our work as teachers and staff within the school. Joseph is someone who cared, we can be caring and loving like him; he was faithful and honest, we too can be faithful and honest in our conversations and in proclaiming the faith.

#### What inspires you about St Joseph? How can you be caring, loving, faithful and honest?

The Gospel for the feast day is about Jesus' identity. The people He is teaching do not understand that Jesus is both divine and human. They know Him to be the carpenter's son, but they also know that he has worked miracles. Yes, He was God living on earth, He too lived an earthly life. We can take comfort knowing that Jesus experienced many things that we experience as human beings.

#### A reading from St Matthew's Gospel - St Joseph the Worker Matthew 13:54-58

Coming to his hometown, he began teaching the people in their synagogue, and they were anazed. "Where did this man get this wisdom and these miraculous powers?" they asked. "Isn't this the corpenter's son? Isn't his mother's name Mary, and aren't his brothers James, Joseph, Simon and Judas? Aren't all his sisters with us? Where then did this man get all these things?" And he did not do many miracles there because of their lack of faith.







#### Solution to last Week's Puzzler

Let the radius of the dashed circle be r cm. Then one of the equal areas is B bounded by circles of radii of 14 cm and r cm, whilst the other is bounded by circles of radii of r cm and 2 cm. So  $\pi \times 14^2 - \pi r^2 = \pi r^2 - \pi \times 2^2$ . Dividing throughout by  $\pi$  gives  $196 - r^2 = r^2 - 4$ . So  $2r^2 = 200$ , that is  $r^2 = 100$ . Therefore r = 10 (since r > 0).


#### Solution to the Break time Teaser:

E The sum of the interior angles of a quadrilateral is  $360^{\circ}$ , so x + 5x + 2x + 4x = 360, that is 12x = 360. Therefore x = 30 and the angles of 30° the quadrilateral, taken in order, are 30°, 150°, 60° and 120°. The diagram shows the shape of the quadrilateral. Since 30 + 150 = 180, we see that AB and DC are parallel. Since it has no equal angles, it is not a rhombus or a parallelogram so it is a trapezium.

#### **Problem of the week**

The diagram shows a heptagon with a line of three circles on each side. Each circle is to contain exactly one number. The numbers 8 to 14 are distributed as shown and the numbers 1 to 7 are to be distributed to the remaining circles. The total of the numbers in each of the lines of three circles is to be the same.
