# Theme of the Week – Worthy of Me

Our gospel is the last part of the discourse through which Jesus prepares his followers for ministry in a world that will not understand them. For a start he says that those who prefer father/mother, son/daughter to him, are not worthy of Him. What does this mean? Up to a certain point Christians continued to consider themselves Jews in every respect, to attend the synagogue and do all that Jews did. By the time Matthew wrote his Gospel though, a synod of Jewish authorities gathered in Jamnia to discuss the problem, and deliberated that the followers of Christ were to be considered heretics, cast out of the synagogues, excluded from family inheritance and socially isolated. We can imagine the impact this had on families, where children fell apart from parents and vice versa. Some, for the sake of peace in the family (and material gain) left the newly born Christian movement and went back to the Jewish tradition. JESUS HERE IS NOT SAYING THAT ONE MUST HATE THE FAMILY TO BE HIS FOLLOWER, but that those who accept his proposal of a New World must be prepared to leave behind all those things that hinder this adhesion to Him. Let's take the example of Holy Matrimony; when a man and a woman get married, they LEAVE THE HOUSE OF THEIR PARENTS and become something new, they constitute a **NEW FAMILY**. This doesn't mean that they hate their parents, but on the other hand they must protect the freedom of this newly created family. Many divorces happen because some men and women get married but are incapable of separating from their families of origin, with disastrous consequences. When Jesus started his public ministry, some members of his enlarged family thought he was mad and went to take him back. When someone told him "Your mother and brothers are here to see you", he replied "My mother and brothers are those who hear God's word and put it into practice" (Luke 8:21). Jesus had a NEW FAMILY, his followers, and he could not look back.

Those who are unable to cut with their past in order to follow him, ARE NOT WORTHY OF HIM in the sense that they will never be able to give their entire life for the sake of the Good News of the Gospel. Freedom from attachments of all kind is the necessary requirement for those who follow Jesus.

Then Jesus also says that unless one is willing to **TAKE HIS CROSS AND FOLLOW HIM**, they are not worthy of Him. Too often in Christian piety "taking up the cross" has been associated with <u>embracing the physical or moral suffering that</u> <u>come to all of us</u>. This is not what Jesus meant. Crucifixion was the most ignominious method of execution, reserved for criminals and traitors. After judgment and condemnation, the person was loaded with the horizontal part of the cross (called *patibulum*), and then did the walk of shame up to the place of execution. During this journey they were exhibited to the public scorn, abused, spat upon, insulted, stricken with stones and sticks. The person was considered a subhuman being, a slave, a cursed man. So, when Jesus invites us to pick up the cross, he is calling us to **BE THE LAST, THE SERVANT OF ALL, THE MOCKED ONE, THE ONE WHO MAKES OF HIS/HER LIFE A GIFT**, just like He did.

#### Only those who are prepared to give their life for the sake of others, will find TRUE LIFE.

In the second part of the Gospel Jesus talks about **PEOPLE TO BE WELCOMED**, starting from those who are worthy of him, those who have left behind everything to follow him, those who, like Jesus, chose to make of their life a GIFT for others. Jesus says: *anyone who welcomes you, welcomes me and the one who sent me*. What are the implications of this? Jesus wants to be welcomed by all people, but THROUGH US. He considers us worthy of Him and therefore makes us his representatives to the world. Christianity is not a set of rules, going to Mass on Sundays, saying a few prayers (which are all good things!), but **CARRYING CHRIST WITHIN OURSELVES**, imitate him in living not for ourselves but for others, so that His light may shine through us, and attract all people to him.

Jesus also says that those who welcome **PROPHETS** and **HOLY PEOPLE** will have the same reward. A prophet is a person who is in harmony with the thinking of God. God does not speak from heaven, but through those servants of His who, through meditation of the scriptures, prayer and service of their brethren understand what God thinks and boldly proclaim it in the face of a hostile world, often paying the price of unpopularity and ridicule. Holy people are all those who speak of God through the example of a holy life. Those who welcome prophets and holy people, will be considered an integral part of their work of construction of the Kingdom of God. The last verse says that even a little gesture of love such as a glass of water given to a little one (a poor, helpless person), will make a difference in the History of God and in the establishment of His **NEW WORLD**.

# From the Gospel of Matthew (10:37-42)

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Anyone who prefers father or mother to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who prefers son or daughter to me is not worthy of me. Anyone who does not take his cross and follow in my footsteps is not worthy of me. Anyone who finds his life will lose it; anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it.

'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me.

'Anyone who welcomes a prophet will have a prophet's reward; and anyone who welcomes a holy man will have a holy man's reward.

'If anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is a disciple, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.'

Maria was born to peasants in the Marche, Italy. When her father died the family became destitute and were forced to work as hired labourers around the country. While working at Le Ferriere, in Lazio, they were sharing a house with another family, the Serenellis. One day 20-years-old Alessandro Serenelli saw Maria alone and, threatening her with an awl, tried to rape her. She resisted fiercely saying "it's a sin!" and tried to flee, but Alessandro caught her and stabbed her. While she was dying in hospital, Maria forgave Alessandro, who was apprehended and sentenced to 30 years in jail. Alessandro (pictured above) was converted by her forgiveness, and, after his release, spent the rest of his life in penitence and prayer in a Franciscan monastery.

Even in her last moments, Maria was COMPASSIONATE AND LOVING

Caritas Northampton is responsible for the promotion, establishment and support of various social outreach projects within the diocese. One of their current outreach programmes is to establish parish dementia support groups within the diocese. There is currently over 944,000 people in the UK with dementia and our diocese has some of the highest levels within the UK (E.g. Northampton has 8200 suffers) and it is estimated that 1 in 3 of us will become carers for someone with dementia in our lifetime. We already have a successful pilot scheme running supporting 120+ sufferers and their families and providing a valuable service to the community. To be able to mirror this success in our parishes we will be holding a 'Carbs for Caritas' event as part of the Becket festival. This will take place on Friday, 7<sup>th</sup> July 6.30pm – 9.00pm with all proceeds going towards this project. The event will consist of a range of delicious Italian food along with a friends and family quiz where you will have the opportunity to win a range of great prizes. #### Food Bank Fundraiser: Hog Roast and Bingo Fun!

The St Thomas Centre foodbank has been open since 2020 helping local families in need and now supports over 76 families a week by ensuring they have the necessary food and toiletries. They have a dedicated team of volunteers and are self-funded. All proceeds raised from this Hog Roast and Family Bingo event will go directly to the food bank to purchase much needed supplies.

This event will be held in the St Thomas Centre and start directly at 7pm, after the 6pm vigil Mass at the Cathedral, and costs £10 per adult and £5 per child. The Hog Roast will include crackling, apple sauce and stuffing in a roll, leaf salad and coleslaw and is from Sergeants butchers. There will be an adult and family bingo run side by side so that everyone can join in with some fantastic prizes. There will also be a raffle and spot the difference during the break. 

E.g. Subsequent to signing Erling Haaland, Manchester City won their first major treble.




#### Idiom of the Week

e.g. "Don't follow his Twitter, he's a true keyboard warrior."





Some lovely lights finally came together, as year 9 creatively designed shades to complement the adjustable designer inspired frame. Well done year 9








Year 10 food students are on their trip today to London to see and sample some of the delights of sustaiable streetfood. We look forward to hearing about their adventures.


