THEME OF THE WEEK – Increase our Faith

We continue to read from the Gospel of Luke, and today we see the apostles making a strange request to Jesus: Increase our faith. Jesus does not say yes or no, but points out that even a little faith can do wonders. First of all, let us ask ourselves what faith is or isn't? Faith **IS NOT** just an acknowledgment that God exists, or a knowledge of Scripture or of the doctrines of the Church. Faith is not even simply going to church on Sunday.

Faith is a **RELATIONSHIP**, and as such must be cultivated and nurtured. We may compare it to the love between husband and wife, or between good friends. When a husband says that he believes in his wife, he is not merely acknowledging her existence, he is saying that he loves and trusts her, and that he is putting his whole life at the service of this relationship. In the same way, when we say "I believe in God" on Sundays, we are not just saying that he exists, we are declaring that we open our hearts to a relationship with Him, and commit to listening to His words, receiving his forgiveness and walking in His ways.

How do we live our faith? Is it a living relationship with God or just a cultural factor?

Jesus says that if only we had a little courage (little as a mustard seed) to enter into this relationship with God, we would see wonders happening around us: He uses the paradox of a mulberry tree because these trees have very deep roots and uprooting them is nearly impossible.

If only we allow the Gospel, God's life proposal, into our hearts, we will be to do things we thought were impossible: **forgive** those who wronged us, **rejoice** in other people's happiness, **share** more equally the goods of the earth, **build** a better and fairer society, **end wars** that plague our world and **bring peace** and reconciliation. All this is achievable by taking a little step...entering into a living relationship with God.

What are the Mulberry trees in our own life?

The second part of the Gospel seems to be completely unrelated to the first. On top of this it looks like Jesus is saying that servants, even after a long day of work, deserve nothing and must continue to slave for the master and acknowledge that they are just servants. But did not Jesu in another passage of Luke (12:37) say: *"Blessed are those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. Truly, I say to you, <u>he will dress himself for service and have them recline at table, and he will come and serve them</u>"?*

Jesus is not contradicting himself, he is actually describing the greatest of wonders that faith produces. If we have even al little faith and accept the proposal of his Gospel, we will understand that <u>the greatest joy is **to**</u> <u>**be a servant**</u>. Those who love become servants of the loved ones.

God loved us so much that he became our servant in Jesus Christ. To have faith is to accept this proposal and serve with joy God and one another.

Can you think of ways you can serve God? And one another?

Weekly Reflections 3rd October 2022



A reading from St Luke's Gospel Luke 17:5-10

The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" And the Lord said, "If you had faith like a grain of mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea', and it would obey you.

"Will any one of you who has a servant ploughing or keeping sheep say to him when he has come in from the field, 'Come at once and recline at table'? ⁸ Will he not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me, and dress properly, and serve me while I eat and drink, and afterwards you will eat and drink'? Does he thank the servant because he did what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty.""

Day 1

Our theme this week is 'Increase our Faith". Jesus' closest friends asked him to increase their faith and he replies with the similitude of the mustard seed.

- What do you think faith is? Try to define it in a few words.
- Why did Jesus choose the mustard seed as an example?

Day 3

Jesus says that if we have but a little faith we could uproot a Mulberry tree and order it to plant itself in the sea. Mulberry trees had very deep roots and were considered impossible to uproot. They signify the things we consider impossible to do.

What do you think are the Mulberry trees in our World?
And in your personal life? Day 2 St Francis of Assisi One of the most beloved and venerated saints, St Francis is a model of humility, service and love for every creature.

God our Father, who gave to the world the example of your servant St Francis of Assisi. Teach us to be humble, to serve with joy you and one another, and to cherish and guard the beautiful world you created for us. Amen

Our Lady of the Rosary God, we give you thanks for the gift of the Holy Rosary. Through it, may we contemplate and imitate, with Holy Mary, the mysteries of the life of your son, Jesus. Amen.

Prayer for the Week

Heavenly Father, in your son Jesus Christ you came to be our servant, especially of the poor and rejected. Make us understand that faith in you is not knowing things about you, but accepting your proposal and becoming servants of one another. We ask this through Christ Our Lord. Amen

In the second part of our Gospel, Jesus tells a story about servants in the form of a question. The basic message is that servants must remain servants and not consider themselves masters once they have done their duty.

What do you think that means?
In what way can we become servants of one another?

Am I eligible for free school meals?

You will be able to claim free school meals for your child if you receive one of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have a net income from employment of no more than £7400 per year). For more information on how the government calculates your earnings from employment whilst claiming Universal Credit, please check the "Eligibility under Universal Credit" section below.
- Income Support
- Income based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

TVLP Leadership Conference

On Wednesday 28th September our school was proud to host the TVLP Student Leadership Conference. Students from partners schools, including Eton College, Windsor Boys and Girls, Hershel and Slough & Eton joined some of our Year 13 students to take part in a Dragon's Den style competition whilst learning about skills for leadership.

We were privileged to host Baroness Helena Morrissey who was Lead Non-Executive Director at the Foreign & Commonwealth Office from July 2020. She transferred to Lead Non-Executive Director of the Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office in September 2020 and remained in the role until June 2022.

Helena has over 3 decades' experience in the financial services sector. This includes 15 years as CEO of Newton Investment Management, during which time the firm's assets under management grew from £20 billion to £50 billion. She was also Chair of the Investment Association from 2014 to 2017, the UK investment industry's trade body. She gave the students an insight into life in leadership and the qualities needed to be successful.



The day was a great success and students gained a lot of the experience and connections have been grown between schools in our community.

During the Dragon's Den pitches, students had to present an initiative on how £100 funding could be used to support a local charity. There were some great ideas ranging from homeless solutions to food and energy and poverty that we hope someday will be actioned by these future active citizens.



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

A The diagram shows exactly one third of the shaded area in the original diagram. It is made up of the quadrilateral *UOPX*, together with a sector of the outer circle, *POQ*, where *O* is the centre of the original circle.

Since *P* and *Q* are two of the six points equally spaced around the circle, $\angle POQ = \frac{1}{6} \times 360^\circ = 60^\circ$. The outer circle has radius 2 cm, so the area, in cm², of sector *POQ* is $\frac{1}{6} \times \pi \times 2^2 = \frac{2\pi}{3}$.



Since U and P are also equally spaced, $\angle UOP = 60^\circ$. So $\angle UOX = 30^\circ$. Hence the area of triangle UOX, in cm², is $\frac{1}{2} \times 1 \times 2 \times \sin 30^\circ = \frac{1}{2}$. So the area of quadrilateral UOPX is 1 cm². Therefore the total shaded area, in cm², in the original diagram is $3 \times (\frac{2\pi}{3} + 1) = 2\pi + 3$.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

E The correct answer is a multiple of both 3 and 8, as $24 = 3 \times 8$. Although 100 is a multiple of 4, it is not a multiple of 8. Therefore even multiples of 100 are multiples of 8, but odd multiples are not. This leaves 200, 400 and 600, but of these only 600 is also a multiple of 3. Hence the only option which is a multiple of 24 is 600.

Problem of the week

The diagram shows part of a tessellation of the plane by a quadrilateral.

Khelen wants to colour each quadrilateral in the pattern so that no two quadrilaterals that meet (even at a point) have the same colour.
