Theme of the Week – Holy Week

There is no Easter without a Good Friday, goes the saying, meaning that before the glory of the Resurrection, our Lord Jesus had to subject himself to a bitter Passion. The narrative of His Passion dominates the liturgy of Palm Sunday, but more poignantly that of Good Friday. What is the meaning of this commemoration, and why are we still celebrating it after 2000 years? The purpose of this liturgy is to show the church (that is US) the attitude that she should have towards the passion and death of Our Lord. The celebration opens with a prostration in silence, to remind us that in order to understand the death of Christ we must be in a state of interior silence, a silence which contemplates and adores, to live the last hours of Jesus with inner concentration, because that event, is decisive for our lives. We lay prostrated before that suffering servant whom Isaiah, centuries before, described in detail, the man of sorrow acquainted with grief, one from whom men hide their faces, the one who has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows, pierced for our transgressions and crushed for our iniquities.

The Gospel accounts of the Passion of the Lord are the most precious treasure which the Church guards and cherishes from the very beginning. Have you ever noticed that these occupy a disproportionate part of each Gospel? Why? Because since the beginning the Passion of our Lord was understood to be the most beautiful manifestation of the love of God. While we listen to it, we understand the real meaning of the words before the washing of feet: having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. TO THE END. Jesus' last words will be: It is finished, which does not mean that's all folks...it means that he has pushed the giving of himself to the uttermost, and full payment for our sins has been done. Nothing could reveal the love of God more than the: the giving of his own son, his only son, his beloved son, on a shameful cross...for us. It is there that the love story between God and us reaches its climax. It is in the failure of Christ that we become victors, because it is in His death that our death is utterly and definitively destroyed! This is why Good Friday is not a funeral, and the Church does not allow us to live it as such, but rather a moving contemplation of the extent of God's love.

After having heard the story of this passion of love, the celebration will continue with the Universal prayer, a great invocation which springs from grateful hearts. We approach the throne of glory and pray, earnestly, for the Church and its Pastors, for our brothers and sisters in Christ, for those to be baptised, for believers of other religions, for non-believers, for the whole world. Filled with the bleeding love of Christ we flood the world with it, we pour it out in prayer over all his creation, on those who know him and those who don't, those who love him, and those who don't, so that the seed of Christ's love may penetrate every heart and produce fruits in our lives, in the Church and in the world.

Then we will kiss the cross: those who have listened to the tale of his death for us, and have gathered in prayer, these people now feel the need to CONFESS their faith to him, to show him their love and affection KISSING that cross, kissing the horrible instrument of torture which the blood of Christ made the instrument of our salvation.

Finally, this union with Christ who gave himself so that we may be freed, will reach its completion when we will gather round the altar. That body is not only given up on the cross as a payment for our sins, but it comes back to us as heavenly food and medicine for immortality. Because the love of God has no limits.

So, dear friends, when the day comes, try to attend the liturgy of Good Friday, and let it enter into your life, let it nurture it, let it console it, let it sustain your faith, let it increase the joy of being redeemed, and let it make you more willing to respond to such great love by BEING that love to the brothers and sisters around you, in your family, in your church, and in your school. A Blessed Easter to you all!

Weekly Reflections 2nd April 2023





Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew (27:26-50)

Then Pilate released for them Barabbas. and having scourged Jesus, delivered him to be crucified. Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole battalion before him. And they stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and twisting together a crown of thorns, they put it on his head and put a reed in his right hand. And kneeling before him, they mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" And they spit on him and took the reed and struck him on the head. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him and led him away to crucify him. As they went out, they found a man of Cyrene, Simon by name. They compelled this man to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall, but when he tasted it, he would not drink it.

And when they had crucified him, they divided his garments among them by casting lots. Then they sat down and kept watch over him there. And over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Then two robbers were crucified with him, one on the right and one on the left. And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." So also the chief priests, with the scribes and elders, mocked him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he desires him. For he said, 'I am the Son of God." And the robbers who were crucified with him also reviled him in the same way. Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour.

And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" And some of the bystanders, hearing it, said, "This man is calling Elijah." And one of them at once ran and took a sponge, filled it with sour wine, and put it on a reed and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." And Jesus cried out again with a loud voice and yielded up his spirit.

Word of the Week

"Terminate."

This is a verb meaning to bring to an end.

"I will terminate any inappropriate behaviour immediately."

"The train terminates at my stop."

"This lesson terminates at 9.45."

Idiom of the Week

"Scrape the bottom of the barrel."

Meaning: To use the worst people or things because that is all that is available or to dig deep into your reserves to give the last you towards something.

Origin: The barrel being referred to is a storage barrel and the scraping is the removal of the last dregs of the contents. The first uses of the expression refer to scraping the barrel as a means of getting every last small piece, so as not to waste any. The earliest example of the 'last dregs/poorest quality' meaning doesn't include the phrase itself but clearly alludes to it. That's in The California newspaper The Chico Enterprise, November 1930: "We all learn sooner or later in life that the barrels of this life all have bottoms that we soon scrape."

Examples:

"Richard is in the team? You really are scraping the bottom of the barrel!"

"We will find the energy to continue working our best until the Easter break by scraping the bottom of the barrel.

In Spanish: « Raspa el fondo del barril. »

In French: « Gratter le fond du baril. »

For Year 12 - Amelia Grigg - Selwyn College Cambridge Visit 27th of April



MFL News










Solution to last Week's Puzzler

B Let the length of the sides of each small square be x. Then the shaded area is $24x^2$. Let the perimeter of the square be divided into eight line segments, each of length y, and four line segments of length z. Some of these are labelled in the diagram. By Pythagoras' Theorem in triangle ABC: $y^2 + y^2 = (5x)^2$, that is $2y^2 = 25x^2$.



So $y = \frac{5}{\sqrt{2}}x = \frac{5\sqrt{2}}{2}x$. Similarly, in the triangle with hypotenuse *CD*: $x^2 + x^2 = z^2$, that is $2x^2 = z^2$. So $z = \sqrt{2}x$. Therefore the length of the side of the large square is $2y + z = 5\sqrt{2}x + \sqrt{2}x = 6\sqrt{2}x$. So the area of the large square is $(6\sqrt{2}x)^2 = 72x^2$. Hence the required fraction is $\frac{24x^2}{72x^2} = \frac{1}{3}$.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

B $1^6 = (1^3)^2$, $3^4 = (3^2)^2$, $4^3 = 64 = 8^2$ and 5^2 are all squares. However, $2^5 = 32$
