Word of the Week

Idiom of the Week

"When pigs fly"

Meaning: At a point in time that will never come to pass. (Used to show scepticism or cynicism over some hypothetical situation or outcome.)

Origin: Equating the flight of pigs with something impossible dates from the early 1600s, when several writers alleged that pigs fly with their tails forward. The idiom is also put as pigs may fly.

Example: "I might wake up early to clean my room—when pigs fly."

Theme of the Week – Salt & Light

Last week Jesus brought us on the mount and gave us the Beatitudes, the proposal of a new life in a new kingdom. Some of us recognised the value of this new life and accepted the proposal. Now it's time to get back to the plane, where we will inevitably live among people who have values that are in sheer contrast with those of the Gospel. Our temptation, and the temptation of all Christians throughout the ages, would be that of living a righteous life but privately, seeking our own conversion, devotion and perfection in a personal way. Will that be enough for Jesus? **ABSOLUTELY NOT!** In this week's Gospel he says clearly that as Christians we have a mission to fulfil, and that **faith is not private but communal**.

Jesus tells his disciples that they must be **SALT** and **LIGHT**. What does he mean? **SALT** was a very precious resource in the ancient world, so much so that labourers were often paid with it (hence the word salary from the Latin *sal* = salt). Palestine was a great exporter of salt, which was gathered from the waters of the Dead Sea. The main purposes of salt were two: **FIRSTLY** it was used to **give flavour** to food. In the Old Testament salt came to represent that divine wisdom which gives meaning to things. It is not a coincidence that the Book of Leviticus prescribes that all sacrifices ought to be seasoned with salt, as it was a sign of covenant between God and his people. This is what St Paul meant when he wrote: "Let your conversation be always full of grace, **seasoned with salt**, so that you may know how to answer everyone" (Col. 4:6). **As Christians we are salt in the sense that our faith, as it mingles with the world, brings taste and meaning into our lives and the lives of those around us.** Joys and sorrows, success and failure, hopes and fears make sense when they are seasoned with the salt of divine wisdom. **SECONDLY** salt was used to preserve food which, in the absence of refrigeration, would otherwise decay quickly. In a spiritual sense, the **Christian is called to be the salt which surrounds and preserves human beings from morally decaying** in the hostile environment of a world where the heat of competition, immorality, and violence, and the bacteria of money, success, dominance and power do their best to destroy people and dispose of them as they would a piece of decayed meat.

LIGHT in the Bible is always associated with God and therefore good. It was the first thing created by God in Genesis, and something which God surrounded himself with, as we read in Psalm 104:2 You are clothed with splendour and majesty, covering yourself with light as with a garment. For the Jews, the light par excellence was the Word of God, the Torah. In psalm 119:105 we read Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path. We can understand how scandalised they must have been when Jesus said I am the light of the world, comparing himself to the word of God, but it is even more remarkable that in our Gospel he should say that WE TOO ARE LIGHT FOR THE WORLD.

Light fulfils three major roles: **FIRSTLY** it **gives life to living creatures**. The Disciples of Christ are light in the sense that through the witness of their life and with the power of the Gospel they can communicate life to their brothers and sisters who are at risk of not growing because they place themselves in the shade, away from their heavenly Father. **SECONDLY** as light Christians are able to **show to their brethren the way to go**, because the journey to God is much happier and gives much more joy when we walk together – after all, two weeks ago Jesus sent us to e 'fishers of men', that is to rescue our brethren from the darkness of death. **THIRDLY**, Christians possess that divine light which **reveals all the dangers** that can jeopardise this journey: the cliffs of pride, the traps of envy, the maze of despair, and the quick sands of uncontrolled pleasures.

If we think that the Beatitudes are the right proposal for a true humanity and we want to have a go at living according to them, it is now time to get back to the plane of our daily lives. Down there many unhappy people are craving to hear words that would bring them joy, purpose, and ultimately a life of such quality that not even death will be able to destroy. So, **LET YOUR LIGHT SO SHINE BEFORE MEN, THAT THEY MAY SEE YOUR GOOD WORKS AND GLORIFY YOUR FATHER IN HEAVEN.**

A reading from the Gospel of St Matthew (5:13-16)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You are the salt of the earth. But if salt becomes tasteless, what can make it salty again? It is good for nothing, and can only be thrown out to be trampled underfoot by men.

"You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven."

Day 3 St Josephina Bakhita 1868-1947



Josephina Bakhita was a Sudanese-Italian nun who lived in Italy after having been a victim of the slave trade in her native Sudan. As a slave she suffered all sorts of abuse and humiliation, but the transfiguring love of Christ made her able to forgive all the wrong she had received, and made her an apostle of reconciliation. When she was once asked what she would do if she met her captors, she replied: If I were to meet those who kidnapped me, and even those who tortured me, I would kneel and kiss their hands. For, if these things had not happened, I would not have been a Christian and a religious today. She was made a saint in AD 2000, the first black woman to receive this honour in the modern era.

Apprenticeships and the World of Work

It is the time of year when students in Year 13 will be thinking about their next steps into the world of work. In school, we will be running a World of Work mentoring programme that gives students key information and guidance to support them with their applications. This will include CV writing, interview tips, how & where to look for work as well as labour market information.

Two resources that students and parents will find useful are the following:

UCAS Update – Offers and Accommodation

I have been very impressed by the year group's organisation in getting their UCAS applications in early and this has meant that many of our students have received all of their university offers. This is a strong position to be in and my advice would be to make the Firm and Insurance choice soon so that that students can begin to book their accommodation, giving them an advantage in getting the halls of residence that they really want. Some universities take longer than others to respond – this is normal. Please see some key information below:

1. Accommodation - the first step is to consider what type of accommodation your university offers and this will be on their webpage (here is Portsmouth's, for example: https://www.port.ac.uk/student-life/accommodation). You may need to book accommodation with your firm and insurance choice universities and many will start to take bookings from February (many will also have deadlines - again, the best thing is to check with the university). You will likely need to pay a deposit to secure both places (firm and insurance) and check if this is refundable, I have only heard of a few instances where they are not. Often, you choose accommodation based on preferences and so, if you are slow to act, you may not get your first choice.

Once you've had decisions back from all your choices, you'll be given a date in which you need to reply. If you do not reply, the offer will be withdrawn. This may be some time in May or June but,

to the point above, if you wait until this time you will be competing with others who may have secured their first choice accommodation.

IMPORTANT - there are two types of choices. They are:

Firm: this is your first choice – the place you want to go to most. If you accept a conditional offer and meet the conditions, you'll have a confirmed place here. This should be an aspirational choice in terms of entry requirements.

Insurance: this is the choice students should would want if they didn't meet the conditions of their firm choice. If this is a conditional offer, they'd need to meet the conditions for their place to be confirmed. This must not be the same entry requirement as their first choice, because if they don't get choice 1, they won't get choice 2. This should be a lower requirement but a place they are happy attending (students were asked to thoroughly research all choices). Therefore, it is a better bet than clearing. Whilst clearing is a useful choice, it is not the best choice because students will not have thoroughly research this choice of university and it has to be a place they are happy to study for 3-7 years, at a cost of £9k per year.

Application to St Joseph's Sixth Form

We are really excited to say that the Sixth Form Application Opened on Monday the 30th of January and you can apply via our web page here: https://www.st-josephs.slough.sch.uk/sixth-form/joining-us/apply/. We have held meetings with all of our Year 11 students and there is a real buzz around application. Many students have already applied via the link, which is excellent to see and so these applications will, of course, be processed.

This is an initial indication of subject choices so that we can tailor our curriculum to this cohort's particular needs. Criminology currently does feature on the form but this will be able to be selected at a later date if the uptake from the upcoming taster process is positive. Students are not beholden to these choices and may change them at a later date (even upon enrolment).

TVLP NEWS

On Friday 3rd February, Miss Boland took eight Year 10 students to the TVLP writing workshop.

Students were privileged to meet and learn from Delia Jarrett-Macauley. Delia Jarrett-Macauley (DMS, Ph.D., FRSA) is an accomplished writer, academic and broadcaster with a career spanning over 30 years. Her impressive body of work is held in high regard both nationally and internationally. She is the youngest daughter of Sierra Leonean parents, is a novelist, biographer, academic and broadcaster. Her first novel, Moses, Citizen & Me, received the 2005 Orwell Prize for political writing.

Dee is a multi-disciplinary scholar in history, literature and cultural politics, Delia has held fellowships at the University of Warwick, the LSE and the Women's Library in London. She has devised, taught and examined a range of undergraduates and postgraduates courses at the Universities of Kent, London and Middlesex. Delia began her university teaching career in 1989 by running the first black women's studies courses on the MA in Women's Studies at the University of Kent; she later published an anthology based on that programme of work. She also devised and led the Arts Management Programme at Birkbeck College, London.

Our students were given the opportunity to create their own poems and works of creativity and have developed skills of scholarship, collaboration and disciplinary writing. A particular shout-out to Nicola Szuba, Itohan and MJ Visitacion who bravely stood up to read passages and ask questions within the session to a large audience.



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

D Let the ages of Alice, Bob, Clare, Dan and Eve be a, b, c, d, e respectively. So, for example, b + c = 40 and d + e = 44. Adding these gives b+c+d+e=84. We are also told that a+b+c+d+e=105. The difference between these equations shows that a = 105 - 84 = 21. Hence b = 39 - 21 = 18 and, similarly, c = 40 - 18 = 22, d = 38 - 22 = 16and e = 44 - 16 = 28. So Dan is the youngest.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

C The smallest possible range of four positive integers is 3. Let these integers be n, n+1, n+2, n+3. For the mean of these four integers to equal 2017, we have $\frac{n+n+1+n+2+n+3}{4}$ = 2017, that is $n = 2015\frac{1}{2}$. So the smallest possible range is not 3. However, note that the integers 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019 have mean 2017 and range 4. So the smallest possible range of the integers is 4.


A kite is made by joining two congruent isosceles triangles, as shown.
