God has united

Weekly Reflections 6th October 2024 27th Sunday in Ordinary





From the Gospel of Mark (10:2-16)

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.

Catholic Social Teaching - The Common Good Catholic Social Teaching - Common Good

Our actions have an impact on everyone. When we make decisions, we should consider the good of all.

The common good is about respecting the rights and responsibilities of all people and leaving no one behind.

"Beside the good of the individual, there is a good that is linked to living in society: the common good. It is the good of 'all of us'...To desire the common good and strive towards it is a requirement of justice and charity."

Pope Benedict XVI, Caritas in Veritate, 7

We work to build a world where everyone, including the earth, can flourish. Ultimately, no one can truly flourish if another person is hungry, lost or abandoned, nor can humankind flourish while our common home is degraded and exploited for the good of the few.

Theme of the Week – God has United

The theme of this week is 'God has United' and in the readings from Sunday, they focus on the commitment of God to our human partnership and the health for all of creation. In the 1st reading from Genesis, it is impressed upon us that God created woman and man in a relationship with one another and not one being greater or better than the other. We are locked in partnership as co-inhabitants of God's creation. This co-habitation is a permanent relationship and interrelationship that each of us has to work at if it is going to be productive and flourish. In the Gospel, Jesus speaks similarly about commitment to one another and to all people, a commitment to the common humanity that binds us all together. This relationship needs commitment by all of us to make it work. The kind of commitment that Jesus had for the people of his time.

Can you list all the qualities that you think are components of a strong relationship? When you look at those words, I'm sure they all illustrate respect. And God illustrates the blessed nature of humanity by emphasizing the importance of cooperative endeavour, and respect being a huge part of this. When the Gospel was written, many women, if divorced, would have been left homeless, destitute and with no money. Jesus in his teaching was protecting women of his time from men who used divorce for their own benefit. Jesus illustrates to the disciples and to us the need to protect those who may end up with nothing; equality of women and man is stressed upon us because we are united by God.

We are made in the image and likeness of God. Pope Francis beautifully said "Giving more importance to the adjective rather than the noun, this is not good. We are all human beings and have dignity. It does not matter who you are or how you live your life, you do not lose your dignity." And it is this that we must ask ourselves, how do we show human dignity to another? Our common humanity requires that we respect and uphold the dignity of each and every individual. Everything else flows from this dignity. How do we reflect this divine care for creation and our common humanity in the everyday moments of our lives?

This term, we are focusing on the Catholic Social Teaching principle of the Common Good but how can we show the Common Good in showing dignity to one another as well as the Common Good of looking after God's creation? How can you be more

Eloquent and **Truthful** in what we say to ourselves, others and the relationships we have showing commitment and being truly united in God?

As a Catholic community, making the virtues known in everyday conversations will allow us to live out the teachings of Christ. Serving God and one another through the development of love, charity and relationships throughout the whole year allows us to show this. Our Virtues of being: Learned and Wise, Loving and Compassionate, eloquent and truthful, intentional and prophetic, attentive and discerning, faith-filled and hopeful, curious and active, grateful and generous are closely aligned to the Catholic Social Teaching Principles of the Church. This will allow us to listen and learn from the Church and enact it in our actions to one another.

On a day-to-day basis we will lead by example:

- **Human Dignity Compassionate and Loving** by showing respect to another and building strong relationships with our teachers and peers.
- **Human Dignity Learned and Wise** by unlocking our belief in All in our own abilities and striving to be the best we can in our learning.

Throughout each half term, we will also promote a focus to the following principles and how they link to our school virtues:


SPANISH Week A & FRENCH Week B

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

D Assume that a > b. Then a + b = 7 and a - b = 2. Adding these two equations together gives 2a = 9. So $a = \frac{9}{7}$ and hence $b = 7 - \frac{9}{7} = \frac{14-9}{7} = \frac{5}{7}$. Therefore $a \times b = \frac{9}{2} \times \frac{5}{2} = \frac{45}{4} = 11\frac{1}{2}$.

Solution to the Break-time Teaser:

Consider options B to E: 1.3542 = 1.354222...; 1.3542 = 1.35424242...; 1.3542 = 1.3542542...; These are all greater than 1.3542, so option A is not correct. The other four options have the same units digit and the first four digits after the decimal point are the same in all. So the largest option is that which has the largest digit five places after the decimal point and this is 1.3542.





Physical Geography – Student Photo Competition from the Geographical Association



The theme of the competition is 'The Power of Physical Geography'.

This year's competition challenges you to discover evidence of the power of physical geography. When out and about, capture it in a photograph, explain why, and how your example illustrates the power of physical geography in an accompanying title and caption (up to 250 words).

It is easy to think that 'big' or 'mighty' are the only expressions of the power of physical geography. But, when you realise that power is the ability to create changes by exerting a force, then it is easy to recognise power operating at different scales of magnitude and time. For example, it becomes possible to understand how weathering of 'solid' rock breaking down into fragments (and, depending on the process, these might be microscopic grains or massive boulders) is an illustration of the power of physical geography – the surface of the Earth is changed.

Good evidence of this sort of the power of physical geography can be found as easily in local or urban settings as in more grand and distant locations. When you see a mighty mountain chain you are looking at the power of physical geography, but to demonstrate this you would need to find some evidence that illustrates how it was lifted up, e.g. crumpled, folded and stacked strata.

These are just two of many examples that you could discover to show the power of physical geography and explain how it shapes the character of the land and shifts waves, winds, and water in the oceans and atmosphere. The photograph needs to be accompanied with its (precise) location, a title and a caption of up to 250 words that 'show and tell' the physical geography, describing the focus of your example and explaining how it shows the power of physical geography. The entry form has a template created for you to do this. The link for this is below.
