There is something good in everything that is bad. (A silver lining on a cloud is an indication that the sun is behind it.)

Theme of the Week - JOY

Last Sunday we heard about John the Baptist, who based himself at Bethabara, on the Eastern bank of the river Jordan, and preached a baptism of Conversion (change of mind). When Pharisees and Sadducees approached him, he rebuked them sternly because they were coming forward for an external rite but were not prepared to leave behind their wrong understanding of God and religion. He used very strong words: "wrath to come", "every tree which does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown it into the fire", "the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire". Now, we are not scandalised by this type of language, because it was the language of all the old prophets who, when Israel went astray from God, tried to bring them back by instilling fear of chastisement. John the Baptist though, unaware as he may have been, was announcing a really GOOD NEWS. The fire that was about to come to consume the chaff was not a punishment for sinners, but the FIRE OF THE SPIRIT OF GOD which would have transformed sinners by the power of this love shown in Jesus Christ. Are you afraid of God? Do you practice your faith for fear of chastisement or to have a relationship with a loving Father?

This Sunday John is in a different place: in jail. We know from the Jewish historian Josephus that he was imprisoned in the fortress of Machaerus, which was also the palace where King Herod Antipas entertained his illustrious guests. Josephus tells us that he was imprisoned because Herod feared that he would start a rebellion against his rule, while Matthew tells us that it was because John had publicly denounced the immorality of Herod's relationship with his sister-in-law Herodias.

John was in prison but treated with great respect, so much so that he was allowed to receive his disciples. When they informed him about what Jesus was doing, he sent them to ask him whether he was really the Christ. WHY IS HE DOUBTING? We thought he knew Jesus was the Messiah. In two chapters (8 and 9) preceding the one from which our gospel is taken, Jesus heals 10 people. The disciples of John must have told him that this Messiah was very different from the one expected in Israel; no axe or sword or fire to kill the enemies, but only TENDERNESS, COMPASSION, and LOVE for the poor, the sick, the marginalised, all people who were considered cursed by God because of their sins. Jesus ate and drank in their company and was happy to be considered their friend. Do we follow the example of our master or are we enslaved by the cruel, selfish mentality of the world?

These people could not approach God as they were forbidden entry in the temple lest they contaminated it with their sin...but in Jesus GOD GOES TO THEM, touches their suffering with his holy hands and brings to them new life. THIS IS THE REAL JOY, knowing that we are loved by God even when we make mistakes or fall short of our Christian vocation. If John the Baptist could speak to us today, he would say: What sort of Christ are you expecting? I too was expecting a Messiah who would get rid of sinners and reward the good, but I was surprised and disappointed! This Jesus indeed spoke against evil and sin, but sinners...he just loved them and changed them through the fire of his love. If we expect from Christ something that he has not come to bring, like solving our problems with a few miracles, we will be disappointed too! For example, if we pray for peace but then expect it to fall from heaven, we will be disappointed. God gives us his Spirit and his strength, but it is US who have to build peace with our efforts, bringing justice, forgiveness and reconciliation wherever we go, in our family, in our school and in the wider world. The JOY of Christmas is the joy of those who know to be loved so much by a Father who would never give up on them. DO YOU WANT THIS JOY IN YOUR LIFE?

Weekly Reflections 11th December 2022





A reading from the Gospel of St Matthew (Mt 11:2-11)

Now when John heard in prison about the deeds of the Christ, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or shall we look for another?" And Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them. And blessed is the one who is not offended by me."

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds concerning John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? A man dressed in soft clothing? Behold, those who wear soft clothing are in kings' houses. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is he of whom it is written,

"Behold, I send my messenger before your face, who will prepare your way before you."

Truly, I say to you, among those born of women there has arisen no one greater than John the Baptist. Yet the one who is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.

Day 1

John the Baptist, like most Old Testament prophets, was looking forward to the coming of the Messiah (the anointed one of God) so that he could finally kill all evil people and reward the good ones.

 Is this your understanding of God?

Day 2

While he is in prison, his disciples tell John the Baptist about Jesus and what they saw him doing. He is confused and sends them back to him to enquire whether he really is the Messiah.

 Why do you think he wasn't sure?

Day 3 St John of the Cross



A Carmelite friar, Saint Teresa of Ávila persuaded him to pioneer the reform of his order as she had done for the nuns. This was a difficult and dangerous task: he suffered imprisonment and severe punishment at the hands of the Church authorities. He died at the monastery of Ubeda, where the monks had initially treated him as the worst of sinners, but by the time he died they had recognised his sanctity and his funeral was the occasion of a great outburst of enthusiasm.

He is a good example of perseverance in doing good even when hardships come our way!

Prayer for the Week

God for whom we watch and wait, you sent John the Baptist to prepare the way of your Son: give us courage to speak the truth, to hunger for justice, and to suffer for the cause of right, with Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Day 4

Jesus was seen healing
people, spending time with
the poor, the outcasts,
lepers, sinners, and showing
them love and compassion not what people were

Day 5

St Augustine wrote:

You have made us for Yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you.


