Theme of the Week - Give glory to God

In the Gospel on Sunday we a hear of a Samaritan meeting Jesus. We previously heard of the Good Samarian last academic year (the Gospel from Sunday 13th July, 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time). And the Samaritans were a group with both a Jewish and pagan heritage. Although they revered Yahweh (a Hebrew name for God) as did the Jews, their faith was not the common Judaism of that day, hence Samaritans were looked down upon. And in the Gospel reading from Sunday, it is the Samaritan (the person seen not to have the fullest, truest faith) who recognised the work of God. Just like when it was the Good Samaritan who actioned the true love of God by attending to the hurt and wounded. In addition to this, the Samaritan was one of 10 who also suffered from leprosy. Lepers suffered not just through the disease but they were cast out from their homes and communities. Jesus however took pity on all who came to him for healing.

Leprosy was seen to be a punishment for sin. So in the Gospel we see two groups despised at the time, the Samaritans and those with leprosy. However, God choses to heal the 'foreigner', this one who was a leper but also a Samaritan 'Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' - Here the recognition of God's power through Jesus extends to all, Jew and non-Jew alike. The Samaritan was not the only one who had faith, but his gratitude sets him apart from the others, and Jesus upholds him as an example. This gospel reading is so fitting for today, because Jesus was travelling between the border of Galilee and Samaria; borders can often represent division. And today, wars are fought over borders, and again division is seen!

God's grace and healing does not confine itself to one given group. Sometimes we must also cross boundaries to obtain healing; and healing brings new life, which is completely dependent on faith. Have you experienced the pain of being excluded or treated as an outsider? During this week, reflect on where the barriers are in your own life, the things that cut you off from others. Be Active and Curious towards breaking down one of these barriers this week.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 17: 11-19

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was passing along between Samaria and Galilee. And as he entered a village, he was met by ten lepers, who stood at a distance and lifted up their voices, saying, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us.' When he saw them he said to them, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went they were cleansed. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks. Now he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus answered, 'Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine? Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' And he said to him, 'Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well.'



Any young person can do their DofE. Achieving an Award isn't a competition or about being first. It's all about setting personal challenges and pushing personal boundaries.

Logging your Child's Absences and Appointments

Dear Parents/Carers,

We kindly remind you of the following procedures for reporting your child's absence to ensure smooth communication and accurate record-keeping:

- Absences must be reported exclusively via ClassCharts.
- Absences should be reported by 8:00am on the day of absence.
- For medical and health appointments:
 - o Please notify us in advance via ClassCharts.
 - o Upload supporting documentation (e.g., proof of appointment).
 - Absences without proof will be marked as unauthorised.
- For other types of absence requests:
 - o Follow the same ClassCharts reporting procedure.
 - Supporting information may be required (e.g., full outbound and inbound flight details, including booking dates, for travel abroad).
 - o If additional information is needed, the school will contact you directly.
- Please refrain from emailing the school office (office@st-josephs.slough.sch.uk) or your child's teachers directly about absences.
 - All absence notifications must be submitted to the Attendance Officer via ClassCharts to be processed correctly.

Homework

"The importance of homework to educational achievement cannot be denied. If pupils receive appropriate homework and do it on a regular basis over a five-year period, they will, in effect, be receiving the equivalent of at least one additional year of full-time education" 'Improving Secondary schools'

At St Joseph, we believe that homework is important to:

- Prepare for, consolidate and embed work covered in lessons to support learning;
- Encourage responsibility for, and ownership of, learning through 'flipped learning' activities;
- Enhance study skills e.g. planning, time management and self-discipline;
- Broaden and extend the school curriculum;
- Engage parental co-operation and support;

Tips to help support your child with homework:

- Regularly check Classcharts, ask them to show you completed homework against ClassCharts assignment.
- Create a homework schedule: A schedule can help your child stay organized and keep track of what's due.
- Choose a homework area: Pick a dedicated place for homework and gather the necessary supplies.
- Limit distractions: Turn off electronics and put away cell phones to help your child focus.
- **Motivate** your child: Alternate motivators, such as "homework then computer" or "homework then a favourite video". Use positive words of encouragement when your child is working well

Homework Expectation

Each subject gives specific guidance to students regarding homework expectations. Below are the minimum general homework expectations.

Key Stage 3

- Maths, English, Science, RE once per week for 10 -30 mins
- History, Geography, MFL, History, Art, Computing, Music, Technology, Drama fortnightly 10-30min

Key Stage 4

• All subjects once per week for 30 mins

Key Stage 5 (Flipped Learning)

- Sixth Form students are required to match every hour of lesson time with an hour of independent study outside of the classroom.
- Flipped homework should form the basis of the tasks, enabling students to prepare for their next lessons and use their knowledge to develop deeper understanding and practice the associated skills.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

The product of the first three numbers is equal to the product of the last three numbers, so $x \times 120 \times 496 = 496 \times 360 \times 48$. Hence, $x \times 120 = 360 \times 48$.

So
$$x = \frac{360 \times 48}{120} = 3 \times 48 = 144$$
.

Solution to the Break-time Teaser:

Let the number of dogs on Jane's farm be n. Then at the start of the week there were $\frac{3n}{5}$ cats. After 32 cats but no dogs arrived, the ratio became 5: 3, so $\frac{3n}{5} + 32 = \frac{5n}{3}$.

Multiplying throughout by 15: 9n + 480 = 25n. Therefore 16n = 480, that is n = 30. So there are 30 dogs on Jane's farm.

Aims


- 1) To appreciate nature and its resources.
