A reading from 5t Luke's Gospel Luke 3:10-18

And the crowds asked him [John], "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the strap of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

'Hands down' questioning practice in class

Following on from my note to you a few weeks ago, I just wanted to follow up regarding our 'hands down' questioning practice in class. Students have adapted very positively to this approach but in some instances there have been a few questions arising which I wanted to address.

- The 'hands down' approach is a strategy to be used by teachers when asking questions we are giving students tome to consider responses and then directly asking individuals for answers, as opposed to simply taking answers from students with their hands up. We use a range of techniques to ensure that all students are involved over the course of a lesson.
- A few students have raised the concern that they feel they aren't meant to put their hands up to **ask** questions. This is not the case. We strongly encourage students to ask questions as it is a vital part of their learning process and it also gives teachers a clear idea of how well the lesson content has been taught.

It would be greatly appreciated if you could take a moment to check with your daughter/son to ask about this approach to questioning and ensure there are no misunderstandings. Teachers at school will also be clarifying this over the next few days and we will be continuing with this strategy after the Christmas holidays.

Speaking of Christmas, I'd like to take this opportunity to wish you all a happy, holy and restful Christmas.

Reading Tests

We will be conducting a second round of online reading tests towards the end of January. This is just to give you an early indication of our intentions and a more fixed date will be provided shortly. This will mean that we can see the progress that our students have made with their reading skills and this will give us an up to date reading age. As with the autumn test, all students (as well as teachers and parents) will receive the personalised reading test feedback sheet, with personalised strategies to support and challenge our students. We will have a final test in the summer so that students can celebrate the progress that they have made throughout the year.

Form time Reading Programme – Feedback

Our Year 7-10 students have been engaged in reading novels during their form time. This year we have dedicated 20 minutes a day to this, resulting in our students reading 4 novels by the end of this year (potentially 30 by the time they leave us in Year 13!). 



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

D The first four expressions expand to $x^2 - 1$; $x^2 - \frac{1}{4}$; $x^2 - \frac{1}{9}$; $x^2 - \frac{1}{16}$ respectively. Note that $\frac{1}{16} < \frac{1}{9} < \frac{1}{4} < 1$. Therefore the least value is $x^2 - \frac{1}{16}$, that is $(x + \frac{1}{4})(x - \frac{1}{4})$. This result is irrespective of the value of x.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:


A Note that $9 \times 11 \times 13 \times 15 \times 17$ is a multiple of 9. Therefore the sum of its digits is also a multiple of 9. The sum of the digits of '3*n*8185' equals 25 + n. So n = 2, since 27 is a multiple of 9.
