## From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Carers,

With so many restrictions around what the children can do inside and particularly outside of school we've been trying to think through what we can do to create some memories of what is a pretty restrictive time for many of our students.

The **Remembrance Service** earlier this week was the first of its kind we've done at the school and even with the timings of the day and the split break times we managed to include all students in it. With Year 11 and Year 7 on their respective playgrounds The Last Post was played live and prayers

offered by the students. It was a moving service and I'd like to say how respectful our students were throughout the occasion, giving the ceremony its due gravity.

Likewise the **Duke of Edinburgh Silver Award** took place in the school grounds and from what I saw it was thoroughly entertaining as well as a great learning experience – my take home memory being watching one of the students boil up their baked beans for dinner. We all learn!

These are testing times for all our students and staff with Covid seemingly all around the school in the locality. We're painfully aware that a number of schools around us have unfortunately had to undergo partial closures and send considerable numbers of students home to self-isolate. Inevitably such measures in the locality will impact on the students in different ways. Please do keep in contact with us if you know that there is a strain on your child. We've been fortunate to team up with a counselling service named *Number 22* who are providing a service for our children over the next 12 months.

Meanwhile we've a number of practical measures in the school now in place to help minimise the risk of the virus coming into the school. All students were provided with a cloth mask (free of charge) on Monday. Please do reinforce to the students that they are required to wear them in the buildings where social distancing between other year groups is difficult. Effectively this means the children (and staff) are required to wear them in the corridors and buildings in transition from lesson to lesson, before during and after school. This is as a direct implication of the current Tier restrictions that came into force on the 5<sup>th</sup> November and I have to make it clear that, unless there is a medical exception, it is now a requirement that students follow these rules and I ask for your support in this. If your son or daughter has a medical condition that exempts them from wearing a mask, please help us by sending through the relevant medical supporting paperwork from your GP. Thank you in advance for your help with all of this.

Whilst we will always be open for applications from our students they do need to formally apply. In recent years we've had a significant number of external students apply as our Sixth Form consistently performs amongst the highest locally and nationally when compared to all other post 16 institutions – but we've had to limit the number to 100 per year group as the school is, quite frankly, bursting at the seams.

Finally, have a great weekend and thanks once again for all your support without which we could do nothing.

## Theme of the Week - God-given Talents

Matthew is giving us instructions on how we should act whilst we wait for the return of Jesus. The absent landowner has given his servants a fortune, and on his return they must show that they had followed his instructions and invested wisely.

The Jewish talent was a coin that contained more than 43,000g of silver. A substantial sum of money which at that time would have bought an ox. Absent landlords were common in Jesus' time. The coins in the story were not equally distributed. We are each endowed with different 'talents' so that we can work together generously and share our abilities. **We each have responsibility for every one of our gifts** – to use them rightly is to share in the joy of God's kingdom.

It is always tempting to look at other people's talents and gifts and consider them more valuable than our own. But today's Gospel challenges us to reflect on the God-given gifts that we have. Perhaps we don't value them hugely. But we must use them wisely, generously, and for the benefit of others. Jesus, after all, praised the servants for *using* their talents and not just for *having* them.

It can be very daunting using our talents. However, they can have a huge impact on others who benefit from them. I was very apprehensive about picking up the trumpet for the first time in ten years, and putting myself 'out there'. But it was an honour to play 'The Last Post' in our Remembrance Service, during such an important occasion.




## Year 10 News


## **Black History Competition**



In first place, was Roksana Lydzinska in 7C:





#### Solution to last Week's Puzzler

Let a,b,c,d,e,f be the numbers in the squares shown. Then the sum of the numbers in the four lines is  $1+2+3+\ldots+9+b+n+e$  since each of the numbers in the corner squares appears in exactly one row and one column. So  $45+b+n+e=4\times13=52$ , that is b+n+e=7. Hence b,n,e are 1,2,4 in some order.



If b=2 then a=2; if b=4 then a=0. Both cases are impossible, so b=1 and a=3.

This means that n=2 or n=4. However, if n=2 then c=10, so n=4 and c=8.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

As part of your child's ICT GCSE, where students are studying the course OCR Level 1/2 Cambridge National Certificate in Creative iMedia, they are to complete 3 controlled assessment units.

With the current COVID-19 disruption, students have missed 30+ hours that they require to complete the coursework units. These have to be completed under controlled conditions in school. We therefore require your child to attend **compulsory after school sessions on Wednesdays and Fridays** 3-4pm as well as **Monday period 5 when they have PE**.

Week 2 Monday period 5 - 11X PE - CP1

Wednesday afterschool 3-4pm - All Year 11 iMedia students - CP2


