Word of the Week

Idiom of the Week

Meaning: When we say that something happens once in a blue moon, what we mean is that it happens very rarely.

Example: "Once in a blue moon I go to the cinema, only when there's a film I really, really want to see."

Theme of the Week - The Lamb of God

While the three synoptic gospels (Mark, Matthew and Luke) present John the Baptist as a forerunner, or one who announces the coming of someone important, John the evangelist characterises him as a **witness**. In fact the word 'witness' occurs twice in our gospel. What is a witness? One who attests that something really happened (for example a wedding, a crime, etc.).

The gospel begins with the words 'The next day'. What happened the previous day? A delegation of priests and Levites (the guards of the temple) was sent down to Bethabara to question John on who he was and what he was doing. John immediately answered that he was not the Messiah, and that they had nothing to fear from him. The fact that the Levites were involved may suggest that they were ready to arrest him.

The day after this visit John sees Jesus walking towards him and erupted in this beautiful profession of faith: Look! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. A LAMB, why? The mind of those who heard John probably went back to two instances in the Bible where a lamb is mentioned. Firstly the Paschal Lamb of Exodus, where God commands Moses to instruct the people of Israel to slaughter a Lamb and put its blood on doorposts, so that the destructing angel may pass by and spare the people of the house. (This is the origin of the word Passover, as the angel 'passed over' the doors of the Hebrews). A second place is Isaiah 53, where the Suffering Servant of God is described as being like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is dumb. The Lamb is the symbol of purity, meekness, tenderness and fragility. It is very significant that John should point the Messiah and refer to him as a LAMB. Israel was expecting a Saviour, but not in the form of a Lamb, but rather THE LION OF JUDAH (Genesis 49:9), a roaring king in the line of David who would subdue all the earth and reign forever.

What does this lamb do? He takes away (literally sweep away) the sin of the world. What is this sin? It is the innate tendency of human being to establish themselves through violence, oppression, selfishness, accumulation of goods, misuse of the gifts of God etc. The Lamb has come to free us of all these things, but how? Imagine a village where all the villagers wore dirty clothes. After a while they get used to that sight and consider those dirty clothes normal. One day a man comes to the village with shining white clothes. What would they do? They see with their eyes that that is the ideal, that's what their clothes are supposed to look like! How will they react? In two possible ways. Some will go to this man and ask how they can make their own clothes white and clean, but the majority will reject that man, criticise him, revile him, tell him that he must leave the village and that they don't need him because he reminds them of their dirt, and they are fine as they are.

THIS IS EXACLTY WHAT JESUS DID WITH US. He came as a meek lamb in a world of ravenous wolves. He came as peace in a world that normalises violence, as forgiveness in a world of revenge, as a giver in a world of selfishness, as purity in an immoral world. John tells us LOOK! THE LAMB OF GOD WHO DOES AWAY WITH THE SIN OF THE WORLD BY PROPOSING TO YOU A NEW WAY OF BEING MEN AND WOMEN. If we want to be disciples of Jesus, we cannot shy away from becoming lambs ourselves, after all, this is the meaning of the Eucharist. When the body of Christ is lifted, the priest echoes John's words: Behold the Lamb of God that takes away the sins of the word, blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb. Jesus offer himself in Holy communion, so that by receiving him we assimilate his life, and make a step forward in the exciting journey of becoming Lambs in a world of wolves.

Our call as Christians is to be witnesses to this Lamb of God with our own lives. Jesus once told his disciples: Behold, I send you out as sheep (or lambs) among wolves. He wants us to be just like him, meek and humble of heart, because this is the most powerful witness we can give to the world, and because nothing can overcome sin apart from **LOVE.**

Weekly Reflections 15th January 2023





A reading from the Gospel of St John (1:29-34)

The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks before me, for he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but for this I came baptizing with water, that he might be revealed to Israel."

And John bore witness, "I saw the Spirit descend as a dove from heaven, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him; but he who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God."

Day 1

While Matthew, Mark and Luke present John the Baptist as a 'forerunner', or one who prepares the way, John the Evangelist focuses on him as a **WITNESS** to the true light that was Jesus.



One day God revealed to St Anthony that there was a doctor in the town who was as holy as he was. The doctor gave to the poor whatever he had beyond his needs, and therefore everyday he prayed surrounded by the angels.

The meaning of this story is that in order to live a life pleasing to God we don't necessarily need to become monks and go live in the desert in prayer and fasting. If we love God and our neighbour by being attentive to their needs, we too can pray daily surrounded by the angels of God!





Solution to last Week's Puzzler

E Let the area of the equilateral triangle of side 1 be A. If similar figures have sides which are in the ratio k: 1, then the ratio of their areas is k^2 : 1. So the areas of the triangles with sides 2, 3, 4 are 4A, 9A, 16A respectively.




So, as shown in the diagram, the total shaded area is 3A + 8A + 15A = 26A. Therefore n = 26.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

D The sum of the interior angles of a quadrilateral is 360°. So the smallest angle in the quadrilateral is $3 \times \frac{360^{\circ}}{3+4+5+6} = 60^{\circ}$ and the largest angle is $6 \times \frac{360^{\circ}}{3+4+5+6} = 120^{\circ}$. Hence the required difference is 60° .


