15th March 2026
4th Sunday of Lent



From the Gospel of John John 9:1, 6-9, 13-17, 34-38

At that time: As Jesus passed by, he saw a man blind from birth. He spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva. Then he anointed the man's eyes with the mud and said to him, 'Go, wash in the pool of Siloam' (which means Sent). So he went and washed and came back seeing.

The neighbours and those who had seen him before as a beggar were saying, 'Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'It is he.' Others said, 'No, but he is like him.' He kept saying, 'I am the man.'

They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. So the Pharisees again asked him how he had received his sight. And he said to them, 'He put mud on my eyes, and I washed, and I see.' Some of the Pharisees said, 'This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath.' But others said, 'How can a man who is a sinner do such signs?' And there was a division among them. So they said again to the blind man, 'What do you say about him, since he has opened your eyes?' He said, 'He is a prophet.' They answered him, 'You were born in utter sin, and would you teach us?' And they cast him out.

Jesus heard that they had cast him out, and having found him he said, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' He answered, 'And who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?' Jesus said to him, 'You have seen him, and it is he who is speaking to you.' He said, 'Lord, I believe', and he worshipped him.

Have you ever seen someone going through a hard time and assumed it was "their own fault"? Or they did something to cause their own problems?" How does Jesus' perspective change the way we should look at people facing challenges?

When have you felt pressured by your peers or "the crowd" to change your story or hide what you believe? How can you find the courage to speak your truth like the man in the Gospel?

Theme of the Week - Healing

When we fall into the trap of thinking people "deserve" their struggles, we create a wall of judgement that stops us from actually helping. Jesus' perspective flips this script: instead

of looking to find someone to blame, he looks ahead to see how a situation can be changed. In schools it is quite easy to find situations to gossip about others, such as: why someone failed a test, lost a friendship, or got into trouble—this teaching challenges us to replace questions such as "Who messed up?" with "How can I show God's love here?" "Why did they stop being friends with them" to "How can I be compassionate and loving and be there for someone else?" By shifting from a mindset of punishment to one of purpose, we stop seeing people as "problems" and start seeing them as individuals who deserve the same grace we hope for when we are the ones struggling.

In schools, "the crowd or groups of students" often act like the Pharisees, demanding that you fall in line with their version of the truth or risk being "cast out." The formerly blind man faced intense pressure from people with more power, education, and social status than him, yet he refused to back down from his story to please them. He didn't need a PhD in theology to stand his ground; he simply relied on his own lived experience: **"I was blind, now I see."** This teaches us that courage doesn't always require having all the answers or winning a complex argument. Instead, it's about the integrity of staying true to what you know is right, even when it's socially inconvenient. When you feel pressured to hide your beliefs or stay silent to fit in, remember that your personal story of growth and change is your most powerful tool. Standing by your integrity might lead to temporary rejection, but as the man discovered, it ultimately clears the path to a deeper, more authentic connection with yourself and with God. In a high school environment, being "cast out" is one of the most painful experiences a person can face—it's the modern-day equivalent of being "cancelled" or ghosted by the entire group. This passage shows us a powerful side of Jesus: he doesn't just perform a miracle and walk away; he tracks the man down *after* the community rejects him. While the "powerful" people saw the man as a nuisance or a sinner, Jesus saw him as someone worth pursuing. Following Jesus' example means having the "social eyes" to notice who is sitting alone at lunch, who has been removed from the group chat, or who is being whispered about in the hallways. Reaching out doesn't just help that person; it breaks the power of a toxic social culture. It shows that you value human dignity more than social status. **How can you follow Jesus' example by reaching out to those who have been rejected by the group and being loving and compassionate to them?**





Solution to last Week's Puzzler



- E** Let the output from the function machine be n .
Then the input is $((n + 10) \times 3 + 10) \times 3 = 3(3n + 30 + 10) = 9n + 120$.

A The circumference of the circle is $2\pi \times 6 = 12\pi$.


So the area of the sector shown is $\frac{10}{12\pi} \times \pi \times 6^2 = \frac{10 \times 36}{12} = 30$.




