Weekly Reflections 17th November 2024 33rd Sunday of Ordinary time





From the Gospel of Mark (13:24-32)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven.

'Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father.'

Catholic Social Teaching - Option for the Poor

A preferential option for the poor means that we think first about the needs of those who are the most vulnerable. Jesus taught that when we feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, look after the sick and visit those imprisoned, we are looking after Him. We work wherever the need is greatest. We refuse to accept the suffering of our brothers and sisters. No one should be beyond reach of the love and support they need "The measure of the greatness of a society is found in the way it treats those most in need, those who have nothing apart from their poverty!"

Theme of the Week – Power from Heaven

Sunday marks the last Sunday in Ordinary time of the liturgical year (year B or II) meaning this is the last reading from Mark's Gospel (during year B, in Ordinary time, we hear mainly from Mark's Gospel apart from certain occasions). The Gospel on Sunday is the final message that Jesus shared with his disciples before His Passion, so it is not surprising that he concentrates on helping them to understand something of the end times.

We need to remember not to try and take the Gospel in a literal sense, but focus on the message that was being conveyed: to live in anticipation of the end of our own life or times and to always make sure we do so with God firmly in our hearts. Jesus tells His disciples to spread the Good News and live in anticipation of the time when God's plan comes to fruition. By using a fig tree as a sign of the coming of summer, Jesus points out to His disciples that they must observe the world around them.

The Gospel tells us the time of salvation is not known for certain. It paints a picture of stressful times and disorder, a time when creation is in flux. And if we read the Psalm from Sunday it points us to the attitude we should adopt in the face of chaos and disorder, and offers us hope, "Preserve me, God, I take refuge in you". The first Christians believed that the end times and Christ's second coming were very close, and it was only after many years when this did not happen that the language of the second coming was mellowed. Recognising the 'signs of the times' and responding in faith to changing circumstances and seeking shelter in God is required of Christians.

Can you reflect on a time when you have experienced chaos and disorder? Or times when you have felt things were happening around you that you could not control? What did this feel like? And if you can't, can you imagine what life is like for those experiencing war at the moment? How must they feel? What words of Jesus stay with you when you are most in need? Why is this? Let us again reflect on our Catholic Social Teaching principle of the 'Preferential Option for the Poor' and where Pope Francis says "The measure of the greatness of a society is found in the way it treats those most in need, those who have nothing apart from their poverty!" so let us use the parable of the fig tree; where and what is the need for society and particularly the poor at the moment? How can you be more **attentive** and **discerning** this week to help those in turmoil or in chaos?



Free School Meals - Am I eligible for Free School Meals?

You will be able to claim Free School Meals for your child if you receive one of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit (provided you have a net income from employment of no more than £7400 per year). For more information on how the government calculates your earnings from employment whilst claiming Universal Credit, please check the "Eligibility under Universal Credit" section below.
- Income Support
- Income based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit


CyberFirst Year 8 Girls Competition 18th - 27th November 2024

The 2024 CyberFirst Girls Competition will see girls across the country try their hand at cracking codes, decrypting messages and solving coding puzzles.

The annual competition is run by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) – a part of GCHQ – and aims to introduce girls aged 12 and 13 to cyber security, with the ultimate goal of increasing diversity in the industry.

With women making up just 17% of the UK's cyber security workforce, it is vital that the next generation of girls is encouraged to explore the opportunities cyber and technology has to offer.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

E The square has sides of length 2π , so its area is $(2\pi)^2 = 4\pi^2$. Each of the four semicircles has radius π , hence the sum of the areas of the semicircles is $4 \times \frac{1}{2} \times \pi \times \pi^2 = 2\pi^3$. Therefore the required area is $2\pi^3 + 4\pi^2 = 2\pi^2(\pi + 2)$.

$$(4 - \frac{1}{4}) \div (2 - \frac{1}{2}) = \frac{15}{4} \div \frac{3}{2} = \frac{15}{4} \times \frac{2}{3} = \frac{5}{2} = 2\frac{1}{2}.$$




