From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Thank you again for the quite incredible support you've shown the staff here at the school. We honestly couldn't do it without your support. In a term where most schools talked of simply surviving I honestly feel we've moved forward despite all the external reasons why we shouldn't. The students of Years 11-13 have simply been amazing at the end of this term in their exams, both those in school in the hall and those who had the added difficulty of having to start them via Post Office

delivery service. We've understood through your communication that many of the papers arrived later than we desired (and there's still a few yet to reach you), please do simply return the completed papers as soon as you can. Our new Year 7 have bedded in well, become fully immersed into what it is to be a part of this school community and have proven to be a year to watch for the future in the best possible sense. Thank you for all of your communication over this term – we understand this hasn't been easy when family members haven't been well and where there's been occasion for great anxiety in families at home – we take and talk of the inspiration we gain here from you. Finally, a very long and overdue thank you to our Local Academy Committee Members (perhaps better known as our local Governors) who have done a fantastic job in ensuring the school has been safe to open for all staff and students and been 100% behind driving forward the standards we now wish all the children here to experience and benefit from.

When we return

The Autumn Series of Exams will be in progress. We've only a handful of students involved but we'd like them to know we're wishing them all the best in their preparations over the half term.

What if.....

The Prime Minister makes the decision we're extending half term for 2 weeks over the half term? If that happens – we'll finish our half term first as normal. Then, in the event that it overlaps into the time we would have returned to school we'll go live teaching on Microsoft teams until we return. Your son/daughter can access their account via their email address. We'll teach according to the regular timetable set down in school from 8.30am – 3pm. Needless to say, we'll confirm all of this via email and *Schoolcomms* (text message) and the school website.

Advanced notice

Next half term we have a number of significant events coming up.

<u>PPE (mock) Results morning</u>: This is the morning where we release the results of the PPE exams to the students, in the Hall as if it was the real results. We've pushed this back a week to 10th November for Year 11 and Year 13 to allow for later returns of exams that have been posted for their return and the inevitable 72 hour quarantine rules before teachers are allowed to mark them after they arrived.

Year 11 Parents' Evening 10th December and Year 12 Parents' Evening 26th November.

We suggesting that this will take place over Microsoft Teams. Your son/daughter will sign up to time slots with their subject tutor/form tutor etc who will then call you on your child's email address through Microsoft teams account. It's our expectation that all parents should be involved in discussions around the children's progress. We trial led this over the summer lockdown and it worked surprisingly well for other year groups. I should say at this point that given the time schedule, we'll have to keep to time slots available – please don't be offended by hard stops so that others won't be left waiting.

<u>Sixth Form Open Evening</u> (Scheduled for 12th November) will be a virtual event (as will all the Sixth Forms in Slough this year). The second part of the virtual Open Evening will be posted on the website today and will include the Sixth Form.

Year 11-12 Taster day 24th November will take place. On this day the Year 12&13 take a study day break (the subject tutors load them up with work) and Year 11 come in to study for a number of

lessons available to study in the Sixth Form in Business Dress Code. We're planning on this still taking place as normal.

<u>School Christmas Festival of Carols</u>: Is most likely to be a virtual affair this year. We'll start filming early in anticipation of this being the case – particularly with the current strong restrictions around music and singing.

<u>Christmas Dinner Day</u> – possibly one of the best days in the Autumn term will pose a number of logistical problems for us. However, suffice to say at this stage that, we're determined it'll still go ahead – we're working through all the permutations at the moment.

Theme of the Week - All Saints

During the Feast of All Saints, we remember those men and women who have lived heroic Gospel-inspired lives and have been recognised by the Church. This feast reminds us of our ultimate goal: to be with God. We can replicate the behaviour of these Saints by examining *The Beatitudes*.

This week's Gospel reading is taken from the *Sermon on the Mount*. The list is known as '*The Beatitudes*'. If we split this word into two parts, Jesus is effectively telling us about the "attitudes that we should be". The underlying sentiment is that even if we suffer now and embody humility, we will be rewarded in heaven.

This is demonstrated well in Roald Dahl's classic novel, *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. Charlie's family have such a capacity for sharing, and the bond between Charlie and his grandparents is particularly strong. He is as **willing to sacrifice things** for his grandparents as they are for him. They are reliant upon one another because they have very little. However, **their mutual dependence is a catalyst for love and generosity**. They find joy in their relationships, even if they don't know where their next meal is coming from. Charlie enters the factory with four children who are rather selfish and self-centred. Charlie remains humble and is eventually rewarded when Willy Wonka gives him the factory.

Perhaps it is true that those in material poverty – like Charlie's family and the far too many people in our world who are denied the basics of life – show a stronger sense of being "poor in spirit". They exhibit that total dependence on God because they have very little else to rely on. And God will reward their dependence by giving them the kingdom of heaven.

Charlie manages to create an atmosphere of selflessness and humility. These are attractive qualities that the Saints embodied throughout their lives.

Choose one of the beatitudes and seek to live it out this week.

Seek to be humble, seek to be pure, seek to be merciful. In order to find true blessing, we must seek Jesus and his ways.

Geography News

We have had many exciting lessons in Geography this week. 8C have been learning about the formation of headlands and bays, and headland erosion (cracks, caves, arch, stack, stump). To support their studies, Miss WD had students making headland landforms out of play-doh- we had some excellent creativity from some of the students! Coastal studies are an important strand of Geography learning, which students recall and build upon in each key stage from 3-5. So it is amazing to see students grasp these concepts so early on!

In Year 12 students have been planning group proposals for the 'Earth Shot' Prize. The Earthshot Prize is the most ambitious and prestigious of its kind – designed to incentivise change and help to repair our planet over the next ten years.

Taking inspiration from President John F. Kennedy's Moonshot which united millions of people around an organising goal to put man on the moon and catalysed the development of new technology in the 1960s, The Earthshot Prize is centred around five 'Earthshots' – simple but ambitious goals for our planet which, if achieved by 2030, will improve life for us all, for generations to come. Prince William, who is an ambassador for this initiative, has said: "The Earth is at a tipping point and we face a stark choice: either we continue as we are and irreparably damage our planet, or we remember our unique power as human beings and our continual ability to lead, innovate and problem-solve. People can achieve great things. The next ten years present us with one of our greatest tests – a decade of action to repair the Earth."



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

$$(2x+3y-20)+(4x+5y-72)=6x+8y-92$$
 and

$$(5x - 2y + 38) + (x - 4y + 108) = 6x - 6y + 146$$

These two results must both equal the same value.

And since 6x is in both expressions, contributing the same to each expression whatever its actual value, 8y-92 must match 146-6y

from which it follows that 14y=238 with y=17

x can then be found with a similar approach:

$$(2x + 3y - 20) + (5x - 2y + 38) = 7x + y + 18$$

$$(4x + 5y - 72) + (x - 4y + 108) = 5x + y + 36$$

And since 7x + y + 18 matches the value of 5x + y + 36, x must be 9



I'm really looking forward to seeing you all after the break for another brilliant half term. If there's anything you need from me, please feel free to contact me via email or Microsoft teams.



UCAS update for Year 13 – currently, the summer exam series will start on 7 June 2021 and end on 2 July for almost all AS/A-levels and GCSEs. Vocational and technical qualifications will also be moved back. Also, A-Level results day will be 24 August 2021 – in short most exams are currently set to go ahead but later in the term so that we have more time to ensure the impact of lockdown is mitigated. Therefore, I believe our students should continue to be bold in aspiration when it comes to choosing their university courses. To help them with this, UCAS have produced the following resource:

These virtual exhibitions are opportunities for students to speak to universities and colleges, and to get dedicated personal statement advice.

UCAS say there have been no substantial rise in deferrals from last year's Year 13 cohort to this year, which could have limited spaces. Further, many universities are planning to raise their capacity. In addition, our school is in a very good place whereby we have limited disruption by online learning/catch up sessions and so I urge our students to continue to aim high.

Super Curricular Reading Sixth Form – in form time each Tuesday, students are given time to read something that will extend their learning and boost their vocabulary set. This should be a book from the reading list, a novel or an academic style magazine linked to their courses. There are some students who are regularly not bringing books to this session, could I ask that they do so. We have bought books for students who receive the bursary and we are able to do so for all of those that receive it.

Sixth Form Uniform – in order to prepare students for the world of work, we ask that students in the sixth form dress smartly. Could I ask that all sixth form students have a blazer and that jumpers are of a smart, office-style nature (i.e. not think knit, roll necks or overly baggy).
