THEME OF THE WEEK – Christ the King

The word King reminds us of all the glorious kingdoms of the world: The Assyrian, then overtaken by the Sumerian, then the Persians, Greeks, Romans. All these rose and looked invincible for a while, but then declined and disintegrated remaining history book material. Is there a kingdom and a King we can rely on without fear of disappointment? YES, and that King is Christ, but we often misunderstand what kind of king he is. When Pilate asked Jesus whether he was king, Jesus replied that he was indeed, but that his kingdom was not of this world. Pilate did not understand since Jesus was nothing like Emperor Tiberius. He was just a poor man surrounded by a dozen fishers and a bunch of women. Here are Jesus' regalia:

CORONATION: Earthly monarchs are crowned in majestic places (Cathedrals, Abbeys etc.), amidst tapestry, candles, carpets, and an admiring crowd. **Jesus's coronation happened on Calvary**, a lonely hill just outside the door of Jerusalem, a cursed place where criminals were executed and became a spectacle for fearful and spiteful passers-by.

THRONE: Not St Edwards's chair, not even the Papal throne; **Jesus' throne is the cross**, an instrument of torture and execution, a place that lifts up not to show his majesty, but his humiliating death.

ROBES: Earthly kings wear splendid crimson and golden robes and furs, a sign of the highness of their dignity. **Jesus was naked**, exposed, fragile, despised.

CROWN: The king or queen we are used to seeing wear crowns made of precious metals and precious stones as a symbol of the power they have over territories and countries. **The crown Jesus wore was made of thorns and woven by the cruelty of men. He is king also of those who often turn against him.**

SCEPTRE: At the coronation, the Archbishop of Canterbury addressed monarch saying: *Receive the royal sceptre, the ensign of kingly power!* At its origins the sceptre was a rod the king could use to beat those who disobeyed him, a threatening instrument of power. And Jesus? **He has no sceptre, but his hands are nailed to the cross, he does not strike anyone and does not impose his power with violence, but opens his arms to welcome all those who would come to him...even his enemies!**

CROWD: At coronations, all guests are the mighty ones of the world: Kings and Queens, Presidents, Cardinals, Ambassadors etc. Jesus had two criminals as companions, and a diverse crowd of people commiserating or mocking him. The chief priests, representative of the established religion that killed him, the populace and the soldiers. They all scoffed at him saying: **If he is king let him save himself!**

"Unlocking Belief in All"

This is a reference to one of the temptations the devil put to Jesus in the desert before he began his public ministry: *Prostrate before me and I will give you all the kingdoms of the earth with their authority and glory for they are mine*. (Lk 4:7-7) The devil feared (and fears!) the cross because **it would give birth to a new world and a new kingdom, the kingdom where the greatest is the servant of all**, the kingdom presided over by a **Servant King.** He therefore tries to dissuade Jesus from the cross by offering him an easy way out. **How many times are we tempted to accept the easy way out? Does our heart desire power, public recognition, money, house, influence? If we were in Jesus' shoes, would we accept the devil's offer?**

Jesus always preferred the company of 'losers', those who are despised by the 'righteous' ones: He reveals himself to the shepherds, considered impure, then during his ministry we see him talking to, touching and forgiving sinners, publicans, prostitutes, disabled people who were thought to be cursed by God. Finally, he dies not surrounded by his loved ones, but by two anonymous criminals. **These criminals are representatives of all humanity...of us.** One of them is still longing for the old kingdom, the kingdom where the strong oppresses the weak, the rich prevails over the poor etc. He mocks Jesus trying to get himself saved, but receives only silence from the Lord. The other one understands that the New Kingdom is worth dying for, and asks Jesus to be made part of it...thus becoming the first person to be in heaven with Jesus. **And you? Who is your King and what kingdom do you want to be part of?**

A reading from St Luke's Gospel Luke 23:35-43

And the people stood by, watching, but the rulers scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Christ of God, his Chosen One!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged railed at him, saying, "Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we are receiving the due reward of our deeds; but this man has done nothing wrong." And he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." And he said to him, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Prayer for the Week

Lord Jesus, you are the King of the Universe and our king, but you remind us that yours is a kingdom of service in which the highest is the servant of all. Give us courage to leave behind our dreams of vainglory, and invest our energy in serving you and one another, that at last we may rejoice your presence. Amen







Solution to last Week's Puzzler


E Let the area of the equilateral triangle of side 1 be A. If similar figures have sides which are in the ratio k : 1, then the ratio of their areas is k² : 1. So the areas of the triangles with sides 2, 3, 4 are 4A, 9A, 16A respectively.
So, as shown in the diagram, the total shaded area is 3A + 8A + 15A = 26A. Therefore n = 26.



D Consider options B to E: 1.3542 = 1.354222...; 1.3542 = 1.35424242...; 1.3542 = 1.3542542...; 1.3542 = 1.35423542.... These are all greater than 1.3542, so option A is not correct. The other four options have the same units digit and the first four digits after the decimal point are the same in all. So the largest option is that which has the largest digit five places after the decimal point and this is 1.3542.
