THEME OF THE WEEK – The Lord is Compassion and Love

The theme for our week is 'The Lord is Compassion and Love' which comes from Psalm...This theme fits well with the message from the Gospel reading from St Luke's Gospel, about the nurturing, care and attention the gardener gives to the fig tree.

We too are like the fig tree, we need nurturing, care and attention but most importantly love, in order to grow and to flourish. It is the Lord who desires this for us, and offers us compassion and love. Jesus is talking about repenting within the Gospel reading, if only we repent and turn back to Him, He is there waiting for us to receive us with open arms. As we continue this journey of Lent, it can be a challenge to keep up our Lent promises, those things we have chosen to fast from during these 40 days. One saint we can take great inspiration from is Mary our mother, the mother of Jesus. This week we celebrate the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, that moment when Mary is greeted by the Angel Gabriel who announces to her that she is going to have a baby, and to name him Jesus. Mary in that moment, a moment of great uncertainty and anxiety says "yes". And from that time and for the rest of her life, she persevered, walked alongside her son Jesus, and continues now interceding with and for us.

Who is it who inspires you? What is it about them that you can take inspiration from?

Reflecting on the theme for this week, think about what your relationship with the Lord is like. Have you felt His compassion and love? Have you spent time listening to Him in stillness and silence? Have you noticed the promptings in your heart and have you had the courage to respond?

Weekly Reflections 21st March 2022



A reading from St Luke's Gospel

Luke 13:1-9

Now there were some present at that time who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mixed with their sacrifices. Jesus answered, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans because they suffered this way? I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too will all perish. Or those eighteen who died when the tower in Siloam fell on them—do you think they were guiltier than all the others living in Jerusalem? I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too kill all perish. Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree growing in his vineyard, and he went to look for fruit on it but did not find any. So he said to the man who took care of the vineyard, 'For three years now I've been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and haven't found any. Cut it down! Why should it use up the soil?" "Sir,' the man replied, 'leave it alone for one more year, and I'll dig around it and fertilize it. If it bears fruit next year, fine! If not, then cut it down.""

Day 1

The Gospel reading this week comes from St Luke, and it sounds a bit harsh in the way Jesus is speaking. But it's the parable that He tells that helps us understand Jesus' teaching. He wants us to repent, to be sorry for our wrong decisions. But we need to not judge others, we too need to be merciful just as God is merciful. The parable is about giving time, another chance. When we repent and ask for forgiveness, we are given another chance. Jesus never gets tired of giving us another chance, we must always try again and give others another chance too. Is there anyone you need to forgive? How can you show mercy to others?

Day 4

"Strive with holy perseverance" As we continue on this journey through Lent, let us pray for 'perseverance' to keep going, to keep up our Lent promises. Simply turn to the Lord and say to Him; "I pray for holy perseverance today. Amen."

Day 2

'The Lord is Compassion and Love' - This is our theme for the week, as we hear of Jesus' teaching in the Gospel about giving others another chance, the example of the fig tree giving it the love, care and attention it needs to grow. Jesus gives us what we need to grow, His love, care and attention. We need to be open to His love, and to listen to Him carefully. Can you think of an example of someone who has shown compassion and love?

How can you be more compassionate and loving to others, especially those who are lonely or feel marginalised?



Day 5 Jesus, bless what you have given, feed our souls with bread from heaven; guide and lead us all the way, in all that we may do and say. Amen.

Lombeh immediately began to improve. Now, aged five, Lombeh is a lively and energetic little girl, who can't believe the stories her mother tells her about when she was a baby.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

C The perimeter of each rectangle is $2 \times (3 + 1)$ cm = 8 cm. The total perimeter, in cm, of the separate rectangles is therefore $100 \times 8 = 800$. When two rectangles are placed together at a "join" in the pattern, there is an overlap of length 1 cm and the total perimeter is reduced by 2 cm. In the complete pattern there are 99 joins and hence its perimeter, in cm, is $800 - 99 \times 2 = 800 - 198 = 602$.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

E Let the output from the function machine be *n*. Then the input is $((n + 10) \times 3 + 10) \times 3 = 3(3n + 30 + 10) = 9n + 120$. The smallest positive integer input occurs when n = 1. Therefore the smallest possible positive integer which Iris could have input so that the output is also a positive integer is $9 \times 1 + 120 = 129$.
