Theme of the Week - Serving God

Around the school you will see signs reflecting the different Catholic Social Teaching Principles of the Church. Can you name each principle? There are seven in total? On each poster, at the bottom, a question is posed to us, what would you do? What is the right choice to make in a given scenario. On one of the posters the question is, someone has dropped £20 on the floor and this is the only money they have to feed themselves for the week, what do you do? We are called to be honest when serving God. Jesus knew that we would often be tested about being honest in our everyday lives. Being honest is a choice we make every day. God wants to be sure that we can be trusted with the most precious treasure of all when we serve Him.

In the Gospel reading from Sunday, wealth was thought to be a sign of God's favour and blessing, so Jesus' words would have been challenging to his audience when he said you cannot serve God and money. Let us reflect on this with the Catholic Social Teaching Principle of Stewardship. We must recognise that we (the whole world) are stewards trusted to use and administer God given resources and be Learned and Wise when doing so. We can't serve God if we use these resources for ourselves! Jesus' teaching gives insight into the ways of God and ultimately the choice that we each have to make regarding our priorities and how we treat our world. How Learned and Wise are we in how we deal with what has been given to us.

We again are being invited (like the first theme of the week for this year) in Sunday's Gospel to consider our priorities in a new light. How we use our money and world has implications for us and all around us. There is nothing wrong with seeking money or using resources in the world, we need it to survive. However, does your attitude to money and how much you have affect your decisions and the way you live your life? How does it affect or reflect your attitude to God? How we use the world, is there elements of greed? Are our priorities ones that Jesus would approve of? This week can you be more Learned in the teachings Jesus gives us and then act wisely to make a conscious effort to make use of a resource you have - time, money or talent - to make life better for someone in need.

Weekly Reflections 21st September 2025 25th Week in Ordinary Time



A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 16: 1-13

At that time: Jesus said to the disciples, 'There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were brought to him that this man was wasting his possessions. And he called him and said to him, "What is this that I hear about you? Turn in the account of your management, for you can no longer be manager." And the manager said to himself, "What shall I do, since my master is taking the management away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do, so that when I am removed from management, people may receive me into their houses." So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he said to the first, "How much do you owe my master?" He said, "A hundred measures of oil." He said to him, "Take your bill, and sit down quickly and write fifty." Then he said to another, "And how much do you owe?" He said, "A hundred measures of wheat." He said to him, "Take your bill and write eighty." The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness. For the sons of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than the sons of light.' And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous wealth, so that when it fails they may receive you into the eternal dwellings.

'One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. If then you have not been faithful with the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own? No servant can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.'

Yours was the way of service, compassion and reconciliation. Despite rejection of so many, you saw the best in people, the good, the worth that others overlooked. Allow us to be honest with ourselves so we can truly follow in your footsteps.

EAL NEWS

(English as an Additional Language)

NEW ARRIVALS: Learning English as an additional language

The multilingualism of our EAL students enriches our school and our community. To become fully competent in the use of curriculum/academic English is a long process; students require long-term support. Having a home language other than English is not a learning difficulty.

Please inform us if your child has access to another language or if English is an additional language for them.

All new arrivals, including the Year 7 cohort, are assessed and assigned an EAL code to represent their competency in accordance with the statutory measure of English Language Proficiency as instructed by the DfE. This five-stage scale of English proficiency maps the progress from beginner to fluent users of English and the codes are as follows:

- Code A. New to English
- Code B. Early acquisition
- Code C. Developing competence
- Code D. Competent
- Code E. Fluent

By assessing students on arrival, we are able to put the necessary interventions in place as soon as possible in order to provide the best start for the student.

We will:

- Give students suspected of having language difficulties an initial assessment
- Provide small group English acquisition intervention where appropriate
- Monitor language acquisition and adjust the level of support appropriately.

Homework

"The importance of homework to educational achievement cannot be denied. If pupils receive appropriate homework and do it on a regular basis over a five-year period, they will, in effect, be receiving the equivalent of at least one additional year of full-time education" 'Improving Secondary schools'

At St Joseph, we believe that homework is important to:

- Prepare for, consolidate and embed work covered in lessons to support learning;
- Encourage responsibility for, and ownership of, learning through 'flipped learning' activities;
- Enhance study skills e.g. planning, time management and self-discipline;
- Broaden and extend the school curriculum;
- Engage parental co-operation and support;

Tips to help support your child with homework:

- Regularly check **Classcharts**, ask them to show you completed homework against ClassCharts assignment.
- Create a homework schedule: A schedule can help your child stay organized and keep track of what's due.
- Choose a homework area: Pick a dedicated place for homework and gather the necessary supplies.
- Limit distractions: Turn off electronics and put away cell phones to help your child focus.
- **Motivate** your child: Alternate motivators, such as "homework then computer" or "homework then a favourite video". Use positive words of encouragement when your child is working well

Homework Expectation

Each subject gives specific guidance to students regarding homework expectations. Below are the minimum general homework expectations.

Key Stage 3

- Maths, English, Science, RE once per week for 10 -30 mins
- History, Geography, MFL, History, Art, Computing, Music, Technology, Drama fortnightly 10-30min

Key Stage 4

• All subjects once per week for 30 mins

Key Stage 5 (Flipped Learning)

- Sixth Form students are required to match every hour of lesson time with an hour of independent study outside of the classroom.
- Flipped homework should form the basis of the tasks, enabling students to prepare for their next lessons and use their knowledge to develop deeper understanding and practice the associated skills.

Students Spread Joy in Sustainability Elective: A Lesson in Compassion and Global Stewardship





Solution to last Week's Puzzler

The sum of the interior angles of a quadrilateral is 360°. So the smallest angle in the quadrilateral is $3 \times \frac{360^{\circ}}{3+4+5+6} = 60^{\circ}$ and the largest angle is $6 \times \frac{360^{\circ}}{3+4+5+6} = 120^{\circ}$. Hence the required difference is 60°.


Solution to the Break-time Teaser:

Let the ages of Alice, Bob, Clare, Dan and Eve be a, b, c, d, e respectively. So, for example, b + c = 40 and d + e = 44. Adding these gives b+c+d+e=84. We are also told that a+b+c+d+e=105. The difference between these equations shows that a = 105 - 84 = 21. Hence b = 39 - 21 = 18 and, similarly, c = 40 - 18 = 22, d = 38 - 22 = 16and e = 44 - 16 = 28. So Dan is the youngest.
