Theme of the Week - Christ the Universal King

In this week's Gospel, we see the Son of Man compared to a shepherd; separating the sheep from the goats. He will return in glory to gather his people from all the nations of the world.

The sheep represent the virtuous people who gave food to the hungry, clothed the naked, visited people in jail and the sick in hospital. The goats represent those who do not do these good deeds.

When I teach our pupils about this parable, I am regularly met with the same question: "but Sir, does this mean that if I don't visit people in jail then I'm going to go to hell?". The answer to this question is obviously, "no". There is a common theme that runs through this parable of selfishness and selflessness. Jesus is giving us examples of how to be selfless in order to be judged worthy of a place in God's kingdom. We can be selfless in a variety of ways. However, if we live a life that is predominantly selfish, we are, as Jesus said, neglecting his command.

Sheep and goats were mixed together in Middle Eastern flocks. This is interesting, since people in our time are thrown together in a mixture of good and bad. Matthew sets out the principles of judgement and clearly indicates the fate of each group. Being a shepherd in ancient times was seen as a lowly occupation. They were mostly hired men who felt no responsibility for the sheep. Jesus refers to himself as the Good Shepherd who knows his sheep and cares for them with authority and care.

During the past few weeks, we have been encouraged to be prepared, to be alert and use our gifts well. Today we get the bottom line: we are to be judged worthy of a place in God's kingdom. What counts is how we have served those in need, and how we have recognised Christ in each other.

How do you respond to those in need?

Can you recall an experience of having someone respond to a need of our own?

Did it change your attitude to helping others?

The Church has always worked in areas of social justice and help for the poor, the needy and the sick. Are there ways that you and your family might become more involved?

Do you express your faith in a variety of ways?

How do we feed the hungry in our society today? During this next month, think about how you can **prepare a brilliant Christmas hamper** for those in need.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

Answer: P + Q + R + S = 16

Subtracting

0 + 1 + 9 + 6 = 16

Adding

$$P+2 \ 0 \ R+1 \ 0 = 8 \ Q \ 0 \ S$$

so $R+1 = 10$ ie. $R = 9$, $Q = 1$ and $P = 6$, $S = 0$
 $9 + 1 + 6 + 0 = 16$

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

B The positive sums of cubes less than the largest option, 36, are $0^3 + 1^3 = 1$; $1^3 + 2^3 = 1 + 8 = 9$ and $2^3 + 3^3 = 8 + 27 = 35$. Hence the correct answer is 9.

A kite is made by joining two congruent isosceles triangles, as shown.


