# Friends of Jesus

Weekly Reflections  
22<sup>nd</sup> March 2026  
5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent



## From the Gospel of John (11:3-7, 17, 20-27, 33b-45)

At that time: The sisters of Lazarus sent to Jesus, saying, 'Lord, he whom you love is ill.' But when Jesus heard it he said, 'This illness does not lead to death. It is for the glory of God, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it.'

Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So, when he heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. Then after this he said to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judea again.'

Now when Jesus came, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. So when Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, but Mary remained seated in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask from God, God will give you.' Jesus said to her, 'Your brother will rise again.' Martha said to him, 'I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?' She said to him, 'Yes, Lord; I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who is coming into the world.'

Jesus was deeply moved in his spirit and greatly troubled. And he said, 'Where have you laid him?' They said to him, 'Lord, come and see.' Jesus wept. So the Jews said, 'See how he loved him!' But some of them said, 'Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man also have kept this man from dying?'

Then Jesus, deeply moved again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay against it. Jesus said, 'Take away the stone.' Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, 'Lord, by this time there will be a smell, for he has been dead four days.' Jesus said to her, 'Did I not tell you that if you believed you would see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. And Jesus lifted up his eyes and said, 'Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this on account of the people standing around, that they may believe that you sent me.' When he had said these things, he cried out with a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out.' The man who had died came out, his hands and feet bound with linen strips, and his face wrapped with a cloth. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, and let him go.'

Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what he did, believed in him.

Lord Jesus,

You came to give us a life of such quality that even death cannot destroy. Remind us of our heavenly destiny, that we may not live our earthly life in selfishness and fear, but in the service of one another.

## Theme of the Week - Friends in Jesus

After reading the Gospel from Sunday, what words or phrases stand out to you most? Why do you think they stand out to you? In the Gospel a number of things happened, what event stands out to you most? Why does it stand out to you? Lastly, we hear of Martha and Mary. Martha who runs to Jesus, states that if Jesus were there her brother would not have died but acknowledges who he is and believes that her brother will rise again in the resurrection. And Mary, who doesn't go to Jesus, but when she does encounter Him states only that her brother would have remained alive if Jesus was with them and then weeps. Who do you think you would be more like? Do you sometimes stop to think about what you believe? When you pray, do you believe that God will answer your prayer? Sometimes, God answers our prayers in a different way to what we were expecting. That can be difficult for us. However, God is always there, loving us and listening to us.

Mary, Martha and Lazarus are sisters and brother and are all friends of Jesus. When Lazarus takes ill, in simple faith the sisters send for Jesus. They are aware of his reputation as a compassionate healer. But Jesus does not respond as expected; he waits until Lazarus is dead before arriving. The onlookers wonder why Jesus had not cured Lazarus before he died. Yet Jesus performs a great wonder- he resurrects Lazarus from the tomb. Some of the witnesses come to a greater faith in Jesus, but others are alarmed.

Of the amazing miracles that Jesus performed during his ministry, this is surely the greatest. It is the one which cemented the enmity of the Jewish leaders against him. It is ironic that by demonstrating that he is the source of life he seals his death sentence.

Lent is a wonderful season to put into perspective our lives, our priorities and to reset our relationship with God especially if we have let it stray. Within the Lord, we have a friend. And Jesus as our friend is someone who never judges us, never lets us down, never wants to hurt us and always has us within his heart. So as we near the end of Lent, remember that you are Jesus' friend. Do something for Jesus to show how much he means to you.




## I Can do Maths

### Solution to last Week's Puzzler



- E** The four angles at point  $S$  include an interior angle of each of an equilateral triangle, a square and a regular pentagon. These are  $60^\circ$ ,  $90^\circ$  and  $108^\circ$  respectively. As the sum of the angles which meet at a point is  $360^\circ$ ,  $\angle TSW$  is  $(360 - (60 + 90 + 108))^\circ = 102^\circ$ . The equilateral triangle and the square have side  $PS$  in common and the square and the regular pentagon have side  $RS$  in common, so the triangle, square and pentagon have equal side-lengths. Therefore  $SW = ST$  and hence triangle  $SWT$  is isosceles. So  $\angle WTS = \angle TWS = \frac{1}{2}(180 - 102)^\circ = 39^\circ$ .




## Solution to the Break-time Teaser:

- B** There are 36 different equally likely possible outcomes  $(a, b)$  for the two dice. The number of these which involve only 1, 2, 4, 5 or 6 is  $5 \times 5 = 25$ . So there are just eleven involving a 3, one of which is  $(3, 3)$ . So the probability that both are 3, given that at least one is 3, is  $\frac{1}{11}$ .

The shape shown is made up of three similar right-angled triangles. The smallest triangle has two sides of side-length 2, as shown.


What is the area of the shape?




