

## **Absence**

## <u>In His Name</u>

'In His Name' is a beautiful theme for our week. Jesus says in the Gospel "no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me". The name of Jesus has strength and authority in it. Again within the Gospel reading, Jesus talks about those "who have faith". It takes faith and trust to ask for help sometimes, but when we ask Jesus for help, He is always there to listen.

#### Grammar Problem of last week - solution

However, there are some spelling rules for suffixes. What is the rule can you draw from the examples below?

Root Word	Suffix	New Word
Achieve	-able	Achievable
Care	-er	Carer



Solution! For root words ending in 'e', you drop the e and add the suffix

#### **Grammar Problem of this week!**

Generally, we use the rule 'i' before 'e', when spelling. That is to say, with words that contain I and an E next to each other, the I generally comes before the E. Examples of this are **belief** and **thief**.

Here are five exceptions: **receive**, **eight**, **neighbour** and **science** – can you develop a rule to help you remember to exceptions to this rule? *Answers next week!*

## <u>School Vaccinations – Nasal Flu Vaccine and COVID-19 vaccination</u>

The school-aged immunisation team will be visiting St Josephs on **Monday 1**<sup>st</sup> **November 2021** to offer nasal flu to students in years 7-11 and a single dose of the Pfizer/ BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine to students in years 8-11. We plan to co-administer these vaccines within the same session (if consent is obtained for both).

Due to the recent announcement of the COVID-19 programme to students in years 12-15 we are still awaiting a number of guidance documents before we can start administering the COVID-19 vaccine. If this guidance is not received in advance of your planned session date we will not be able to safely co-administer both COVID-19 and flu, therefore we would just administer nasal flu to all eligible students in years 7-11.

To prepare for the delivery of one or both of the above programmes parents need to gain consent. A separate consent form must be completed for each jab.

## St Joseph's Mission to Thailand to support the Father Ray Foundation





The Father Ray Foundation in Pattaya, Thailand, provides a home, an education, nutritious meals, medical assistance and the opportunity for children and students to reach their full potential and become independent and decent members of society.

In the pictures above you can see just one aspect of how the Father Ray Foundation has changed the lives of many children: from an unsafe barren desert to a smooth safe playground. Another example of the work that the Father Ray Foundation has done is in setting up the Pattaya Redemptorist Technological College for People with Disabilities. In Thailand, Buddhism is the biggest religion and karma is a main tenet of Buddhism. This means you do good things and good things will come back to you.; but this also means innocent children that are born with disabilities are blamed for their ailments. As a result, society shuns them and they are often deprived of love, comfort and a fair chance in life. This is where the Father Ray Foundation has stepped in to care for these children. Education, accommodation, meals and health care free of charge are provided and the students are guaranteed employment when they graduate.

This is one of the many reasons why our school has been working with the Father Ray Foundation for several years.

In order to help the Father Ray Foundation carry out life changing work, every year a dozen or so students are selected from 6th Form to volunteer and help the Father Ray Foundation in Thailand.

The students fundraise to pay for the cost of the trip and donations to the charity. ### Solution to last Week's Puzzler


By train, the distance in miles of the second sign from Edinburgh is  $200 - 3\frac{1}{2}$ . This sign is halfway between London and Edinburgh, so the distance in miles between the two cities is  $2(200 - 3\frac{1}{2}) = 400 - 7 = 393$ .

## Solution to the Break time Teaser:

The difference between the given options and 1 is  $\frac{1}{8}$ ,  $\frac{1}{7}$ ,  $\frac{1}{10}$ ,  $\frac{1}{11}$  and  $\frac{1}{10}$  respectively. As  $\frac{1}{11}$  is the smallest of these fractions,  $\frac{10}{11}$  is closest to 1.
