From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Guardians,

It's been another good week in the school, thank you for all your support once again. We're pleased to announce (all things going smoothly this weekend) a new look website being launched on Monday 28th September. We'll have the virtual Open Evening videos placed on it later in the week as filming has finally completed this afternoon and editing is taking place as I type this now. Do let us know how you find it and how user friendly it is. The new website was the product of parent feedback through one of our surveys – I hope this helps you find what you need to know.

Travel in and out of school:

Whilst we're proactively supporting health and fitness – and consequently cycling to school - we've had several issues around safety with students bringing in e-Scooters including one accident on the road this academic year already so we're asking parents to be aware that:

- The usage of e-Scooters to and from our school **is not permitted**. It is currently illegal to ride them on public roads, cycle paths or footpaths.
- Pupils must wear face masks when travelling on all forms of public transport.
- Various bus services are currently being run that are specifically provided for school children only, please check with your local bus service for details. A letter from Slough BC is attached to this letter to help with planning school links.
- Please can those who cycle to and from school do this responsibly, sticking to cycle paths where available and being both, aware of and responsible for, fellow commuters.

<u>Theme of the Week – Obedience</u>

In this week's gospel, we learn about the two sons. They are both asked to work in the vineyard for the day. The first refuses, but later, thinks better of it and goes. The second agrees to work, but ended up not going. Jesus asks the chief priests and the elders of the people which son did the father's will. They agree that the first son did.

One of the underlying messages of this parable is that **our actions speak louder than our words**. It is not the conventionally religious who outwardly exhibit right talk and rituals who will enter the kingdom of heaven, but those who carry out God's will by their actions. Prostitutes and tax collectors are often bracketed together because they were considered 'sinners'. But these are the ones who accepted and believed in Jesus and experienced a change of heart and life.

Jesus' parables are always designed to challenge us to examine our own responses to God. The chief priests to whom this parable was directed were failing to recognise the reality of the situation.

Have there been times when you too have been in this position?

Times when you have said you were going to do something and not done it?

How did you feel in breaking your promise?

Have you failed to do something when you knew that you should act?

As you consider your response to the demands that being a follower of Jesus calls you to in your day to day experiences, can you identify what the 'no' moments of the last few days have been?

What were the 'yes' moments?

This week, we could consider changing our negative responses; remembering that Jesus is always ready to give us another chance to put things right.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

Answer: 32

First round: 💢 2 💢 4 ... only even numbers left

Second round: X 4 🕱 8 ... only multiples of 4 left

Third round: 💥 8 🎉 16 ... only multiples of 8 left

Fourth round: Only multiples of 16 will be left

Fifth round: Only multiples of 32 will be left. 32 is the only multiple of 32 under 50, so 32 is the last number left.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:

D First note that $AB = \sqrt{13}$, $AC = \sqrt{26}$, $AD = \sqrt{17}$ and $AE = \sqrt{13}$. Thus AB = AE. Note also that $BC = \sqrt{13}$ and $CE = \sqrt{13}$. Therefore *ABCE* is a rhombus. Finally, $BE = \sqrt{26}$, so *ABCE* is a rhombus with two equal diagonals and hence is a square. So (3,5) is the odd point out.

Problem of the week

Instead of taking the numbers on either side of your starting number, investigate what happens if you take the numbers two above and two below your starting number and then work out the difference between their squares...
