From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope all Year 8 parents found the information for the next steps in Careers, Information and Advice Guidance (Options) accessible and helpful last night. If there are further questions please don't hesitate to contact either Miss Wellesley Davies and / or Miss Araf.

GCSE, A Level, BTEC, Cambridge Nationals and EPQ Gradings

On Thursday Ofqual (the organisation in charge of all Examination Boards) published their conclusions from the recent consultation. Essentially it's a framework for the Exam Boards to follow in setting out the arrangements for each subject for this summer. What happens next is that the Exam Boards now need to inform us of the

procedures we will be required to follow in order to come to a conclusion how to assess the final grades for the children in GCSE, Cambridge Nationals, AS, EPQ, A Level and BTEC qualifications. The Boards will tell us what internal quality assurance mechanisms we'll be required to follow and what the external quality assurances from the boards to the schools will look like (there will be targeted and random checks on schools to ensure procedures and standards are met). We'll also be provided with further unpublished papers, past papers, sample mark schemes and the final grading boundaries and minimum standards to be met for the awarding of grades. We'll have until 18th June to submit all grades in all subjects and qualifications for all of our students.

The basic principles which Ofqual have laid down to the Boards are as follows:

- Teachers must assess their students' performance, only on what content has been delivered to them by their teachers, to determine the grade each student should receive.
- Teachers can use evidence of a student's performance from throughout the course to inform their judgement.
- Teachers should determine the grades as late in the academic year as is practicable, and not confined to a defined window, to enable teaching to continue for as long as possible.
- Schools and colleges should use a broad range of evidence across the taught content to determine the grades before submitting the grades to the exam boards.
- In GCSE and A Level Art and Design, the student's grade must be based on the portfolio only, whether or not it has been completed.
- Overall, it will be no easier or harder for a student to achieve a particular grade this year compared to previous years.

What this means for us at St Joseph's

Essentially it's good news in that we'll have 2 sets of centre assessments (PPE) results behind us before heading into May and whilst we're waiting for confirmation from the Boards, we're pretty confident we'll be able to use these to help support a final Grade for the students in June. Students' grades will be put forward to the Exam Boards based on what they have achieved (and can evidence) and the Boards will then check to see these conform to the standards of qualifications from the past. The past performance of schools will also be taken into consideration to cap national grade inflation. However, as St Joseph's has performed exceptionally highly over the last 6 years you can be assured that the legacy handed down from past pupils means the current students won't be capped in what they will be able to achieve. They now just need to focus on doing it. In the meantime, like last year, please don't contact the teachers about grades until the final grade is given in August. Any attempt to pressure a teacher to change a grade is considered malpractice under the Joint Council of Qualifications (JCQ) Code of Practice 2020.

Furthermore, there'll be a final opportunity for students to secure and earn their best grade in May using the materials that will be provided to us by the Exam Boards (we'll call these the 'May Series'). We don't know yet what that will look like nor do we know the circumstances around which the final assessments will be undertaken but you be assured, as soon as it comes out we'll let you know what it is and what the plan is. Simply put we want the students to have every opportunity to show what they can achieve.

Either way, students of Year 11 and 13 need to continue to come to school right up to and including the 18th June – so please – don't plan any early holidays or time away from school over this period.

We'll be looking closely at the Internal and External Quality Assurance benchmarks and we've already teamed up with 6 other schools in a partnership who between us have matching exam boards in our subjects so that we can ensure rigorous moderation, standardisation and internal quality assurance of student's scripts for our judgements.

Friday 26th February 2021

The DfE has announced that all students return to school from Monday 8th March.

Here is our plan:

We'll get each year group back in one day at a time. It'll take 6 days to test the entire cohort. We'll call
in the students by form group over the day and send them home once they have been tested on the
same day – they won't return until the whole student body have had a test.

We'll send out the details of which students should come in and at what time separately next week.

 Except Year 11 and 13 who after their tests will do the remainder of their centre assessments/ PPE2 in the Hall according to the exam timetable (we'll prioritise those doing the exams in the afternoon of 8th March by getting those students tested in the morning). The plan for testing will look as follows:

- 3. Covid testing at home: Home test kits are arriving for children to take at home after the tests have been completed. We should get our first batch of these between 8th and 15th March. The DfE are asking that children test at home and then enter the result on line or via telephone. We'll show them how to do this when they are tested here at school first.
- 4. We'll continue to remote teach over the period 8th 15th March inclusive and return to face to face lessons from the 16th March onwards.
- 5. From the 16th March onwards we'll rota the students to take the 2nd and 3rd LAT Flow Test (LFT), but this will be in school and over the day and will take some time to do more of this plan in due course.
- 6. In order for these tests to take place, we'll need to have your active consent. We'll send out a text questionnaire and I'm asking if you could complete it in time for 8th March. We'll need 100% returns (either indicating consent/ non consent). Can I thank you in advance for yet another infringement of your time.
- 7. Finally, and more controversially, the government will now require students to wear masks in classrooms whereas previously they only had to wear them whilst moving from classroom to classroom. The government will review this at Easter.

Getting ready for the 8th March

Please do take the time to check to see if the shirts, blouses, and most importantly shoes all still fit the children. It's been 3 months since they were last at school, and as my children's food bill demonstrates beyond comprehension, they keep growing. Can you also ensure that nails, piercings, hairstyles etc. are also in line with the uniform policy which can be found on the school website, as curiously, when we ask them to remove piercings or confiscate them, they often get upset about it.

School Lunches and the Canteen

School lunches will resume from the 16th March. Those students eligible for Free School meals will continue to receive school vouchers up to that date.

<u>Theme of the Week – Real Revelation</u>

Last week, we explored the temptations experienced by the very human nature of Jesus. Today's Gospel passage explores the events of the Transfiguration, which affirms the dual nature of Jesus as both man and God. The word "transfiguration" comes from the Latin roots *trans*- (meaning "across") and *figura* (meaning "form" or "shape"). It thus signifies a change of form or appearance. This duality of nature is often difficult for us to comprehend. However, it is one of the foundational beliefs of the Church. **Christ's Transfiguration aims at strengthening the apostles' faith in anticipation of his suffering and death**: the ascent onto the 'high mountain' prepares for the ascent to Calvary – where he is crucified.

Jesus' appearance changed whilst they were up the high mountain. His clothes became dazzlingly white, and both Old Testament prophets Moses and Elijah appeared alongside him. This is so important because **it linked Jesus with the expectations of the Jewish people**. Moses was the giver of the Law, and Elijah was considered the greatest of all the prophets, looked forward to God's supreme intervention in human affairs (Jesus). The voice from heaven echoed those words spoken at the Baptism of Jesus. The Transfiguration makes us realise that Jesus is not just the son of any god; but that he is the Son of the God of Abraham.

Can you recall an experience, that has revealed another person to you in a completely new light?

Can you recall an experience where you have seen attributes in someone that you had previously been unaware of?

It can be a wonderful experience seeing people in a completely different light. We can realise the hidden talents they possess. Think of the Staff vs. Students football matches that occur every year. There are often several members of staff who participate in these matches who are usually very calm and composed, and not usually associated with high-energy sports. However, when they take to the field, we put aside our former misconceptions of them, and instead we applaud their skills!

A key message in this week's Gospel is to not take people at face value, but to fully appreciate them, and not write them off. Despite spending a lot of time with Jesus, the disciples still had much to learn about him. We can always learn more about the people in our own lives.

During this week, try as a follower of Jesus, to respond to people with greater generosity, forgiveness, acceptance and love.

Online Library

We have recently purchased a subscription to an online library that will provide all the staff and students with access to over 2000 texts. This has been a very difficult year for everyone and reading is an excellent pastime to not only learn about different cultures, ideas and beliefs, but it is also a fantastic way to develop ones' vocabulary and imagination. A recent survey conducted by the BBC suggested that Reading is the number one hobby during lockdown. Book sales have skyrocketed, alongside tablets that provide easy access to online literature streaming. Therefore, why not join in and be a part of this fantastic trend. For many years we have seen a 'dip' in the popularity of reading, for that reason it is vital that we encourage both ourselves and our students to develop a love for reading.

The online library will work in a similar way to a physical library. All the staff and students at St. Joseph's have been provided with an account. When you log-in to your account you can sign books out on loan for a specific amount of time. When the loan period is over the digital copy will be given back to the library. At that point, you can either sign that book out again or choose another text to read.

How do I log-in?


- ✓ You will need to log in via the Sora App: <u>www.soraapp.com</u>
- \checkmark You will be brought to the home page
- ✓ Click on the green box. You will be re-directed to another page where you will need to type in our school: <u>St. Joseph's Catholic High School</u>
- ✓ You will then be brought to a log-in page
- ✓ Please note that your user name and password is the same at your computer log in. For example:

- m.banks (first initial . surname)
- Your password is your St. Joseph's password
- ✓ Once you are logged on you can search for books, sign books out and begin reading
- \checkmark It is important to note that you can access the library on any electronic device

What are you reading?

I am currently Reading *Punching the Air* by Ibi Zoboi and Yousef Salaam. *Punching The Air* centres on Amal Shahid, a Black Muslim teenager who is convicted of a crime he didn't commit – in this instance, assaulting a white boy during an altercation in a gentrifying neighbourhood – and sent to prison. As an art student and poet, Amal had a bright future ahead of him but that one fateful night upends his entire life. Locked up and treated like a criminal, Amal is filled with hopelessness and anger – both at his own misguided decision that put him in the wrong place at the wrong time, and also the biased system that condemned him to a sentence he didn't deserve. Solution to last Week's Puzzler

B Let the squares on the border of the large square have side-length 1. Then the large square has side-length 5 and area 25. Note that 8 of the 16 squares on the border of the large square are shaded. The area of the central region of the large square is 25 - 16 = 9. Three-quarters of this area is shaded.


Therefore, the fraction of the large square which is shaded is $\frac{8 + \frac{3}{4} \times 9}{25} = \frac{32 + 27}{100} = \frac{59}{100}$. So 59% of the large square is shaded.

Each week, the science department will be recommending for you something to watch/read/listen to.

Something to watch: My Octopus Teacher (Netflix) The documentary maker Craig Foster decided that he would dive, every day, in a cold, underwater kelp forest near his home in Cape Town, South Africa. It was on one such dive that he encountered a common octopus that was hiding from sharks. Watching behaviour so complex and mesmerising gave Foster an idea: for the next year, he visited the octopus and tracked her movements. Over time, the octopus responded, greeted him, even played with him, and so Foster began to map the common ground that exists between two wildly different forms of intelligence.



Something to read: Can wildfires cool the climate? Wildfires have captured headlines around the globe in




