From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Carers,

Now that we've completed over 3000 LAT flow tests we're in the position to distribute the home test kits for the students. Thankfully there hasn't been any positive tests in any of the testing we've done. Historically, we've tried to cut out anything that isn't related to our core purpose of great learning and teaching so we're pleased that the advice and guidance from the Department of Education is that students should now test at home twice weekly rather than in school so we've given the students 6 tests each to take them over the next 3 weeks. We'll order more for after Easter.

As we move towards the Easter break and at the time of this Newsletter going to print, we're still waiting for the guidance from the Exam Boards and Department of Education as to what form the final assessments of the public exams will take – but we'll get back to you once we've seen and understood them. Please be assured, we're as ready as we could ever be reasonably expected to be. In anticipation of this we're running extra classes over the Easter break for Year 11 students and Mr Oakley's posting later in this newsletter outlines which days students are required to come into school.

The students have been great in keeping their masks on in lessons despite the uncomfortable nature of it all. To help with this could we ask that the children bring in the masks we bought for them or any other suitable version they have as the spares we hold for lost or broken masks are limited.

We'll be breaking up next week on 1st April, Maundy Thursday, staggering the exit between 12.15pm and 12.30pm for what I hope will be a holy and reflective season of Lent for us all. The message of Easter is of transformation and there can't be more of a need for this message at this time. We'll return on Monday 19th April ready to go.

<u>Theme of the Week – Real Salvation</u>

This Sunday is Palm Sunday. A moment of jubilation and praise before we embark on Holy Week, reminding us of the journey Jesus made to His Cross. The people recognised Jesus as their Saviour; praising God and shouting 'Hosanna!'. Little did they know that only a few days later, that same crowd of people would shout 'crucify Him!', and watch their Saviour die.

The Jews were waiting for a king to lead them against the Romans and make them free again. When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, He was welcomed as this king, but He came as a king of peace and not to bring war.

The Jews had been longing for a great leader, like one of their Kings of old, who would lead them to victory against the Roman invaders. They thought that Jesus might be that leader. At this time of Passover, many Jews gathered in Jerusalem to remember how God had saved them from slavery. This week's reading recommendation can also double as "to watch"! *Private Peaceful* tells the story of two brothers who go off to fight in World War I, and portrays the challenges they face in their relationship as well as those on the Western Front. Suitable for readers 11+, this text was a favourite of Year 8 last year. It has the added bonus of being available to read on the Sora App.

Sticking with the theme of World War I, "1917" is a must watch for our older historians! Portrayed as though filmed in "one shot", this creation shows an excellent representation of what life on the Western Front was like for soldiers, and the conditions which they were fighting in.

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

D We choose units so the outer square has side-length 4, and hence area 16. The unshaded area of the square consists of two congruent triangles of base 3 and height 2. So the area of each unshaded triangle is $\frac{1}{2} \times 3 \times 2 = 3$. Hence the area of the shaded part of the square is $16 - 2 \times 3 = 10$. Therefore the fraction of the square which is shaded is $\frac{10}{16} = \frac{5}{8}$.

Solution to the Break time Teaser:


B For the cube of a positive integer to end in a 5, the integer itself must end in a 5. We note that $5^3 = 125$ and that $15^3 = 3375$. However $25^3 > 20^3 = 8000$ and so $25^3 > 5000$. Therefore there are only two positive cubes less than 5000 which end in the digit 5, namely 125 and 3375.


Design and Technology Department
