Word of the Week

'Denote'. This is a verb meaning a sign or indication of something.

Denote can also mean to stand as a name or symbol for something.

Idiom of the Week

"A piece of cake."

Meaning: A very easy task or accomplishment.

Origin: Something easily accomplished, as in I had no trouble finding your house-a piece of cake. This expression originated in the Royal Air Force in the late 1930s for an easy mission, and the precise reference is as mysterious as that of the simile easy as pie. Possibly it evokes the easy accomplishment of swallowing a slice of sweet dessert.

Example: "I thought I was going to fail the test, but it turned out to be a piece of cake!"

Theme of the Week - The Beatitudes

This piece of teaching of Jesus is commonly called 'Beatitudes', from the Latin beati, which translates the Greek makàrioi (Blessed/happy are they...). This literary genre, was not invented by Jesus and was a favourite of Ancient Greek literature, where writers would call blessed or happy the person who had wealth, wisdom, a good wife/husband, health, valour in war etc. By the time we get to the Old Testament we already see a radical change. The very first Psalm begins with the words: Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law he meditates day and night. So for Biblical authors, happiness and true fulfilment are not in material things, but rather in a relationship with the Lord and the keeping of His Law.

In our Gospel Jesus takes a step further. For a start he brings his disciples to the top of a hill. Why? High grounds were traditionally considered places where men are closer to God, and which require people to leave behind the plane. Jesus takes his disciples (and us!) away from the noise of the plane because, in order to understand this difficult teaching, they need to leave behind the thinking of the world and its false values.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Who are the poor in spirit? By spirit Scripture means all those internal pushes and pulls that make a person seek security in things such as money, career, house, car, social status etc. Jesus tells us that only those who become poor in spirit, that is who do not keep things for themselves but share them with others, will be part of His kingdom already here on earth.

Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted. Those who mourn are not so much those who suffer a bereavement or adverse conditions in life, but rather those who weep over the pitiful state of a humanity that continues to reject a loving God and gets lost in false promises. It is a pain that springs from love, and Jesus assures us that if we care for the salvation of His people, our love will not go waste.

Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. The meek are not those who passively accept all injustices and injuries done to them in resignation. Psalm 37(8) says: Refrain from anger, and forsake wrath! Fret not yourself; it tends only to evil. Anger and wrath are nor bad in themselves (Jesus was angry when he saw the market in the temple!) they are feelings that God has implanted into us so that we may react when we see injustice. The problem is that human beings have a tendency to let wrath get out of control, and what was ultimately designed for something good, ends up producing violence and destruction.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied. The Greek word is better translated as 'justice'. Nevertheless we must be careful not to mistake God's justice with our own idea of it. In France the guillotine was called *bois de justice* (timbers of justice). This is NOT what justice is the gospel means, and God's justice is not punishing those who did wrong. The justice of God is his plan of love for the world. A world in which we recognise each other as brothers and sisters, in which, through forgiveness, we turn enemies into brethren. A world where nobody starves or doesn't have enough to live with the dignity that belongs to children of God. Jesus promises us that if we desire ardently THIS JUSTICE, we will see it realised.

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy. Mercy is not simply forgiving those who wrong us and taming the drive to exact revenge. God's mercy is shown to us in the parable of the Good Samaritan, who is none other than Jesus itself. This mercy has three components. Firstly it SEES, it is attentive to what happens around, it is not distracted but rather spots immediately the needs of others. Secondly it has COMPASSION, it is inwardly moved by the need of the other and suffers with them. Thirdly it PROVIDES for the needs of the indigent and helpless. Those who show this mercy are in harmony with the heart of God, in which abides love and only love for his children.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. For our Western culture, the heart is the centre of emotions and feelings, but for the Jews (and all Semitic peoples), the heart is the DECISIONAL CENTRE of the person, the place where choices are made (for Jews the centre of emotions are the bowels). What is a pure heart then? We call gold pure when it is not mixed with foreign metals, and we call air pure when it is not contaminated by smoke or pollutants. In the same way, a pure heart is a heart where only God is the one who directs our choices and decisions. By contrast, an impure heart is one where beside God there is a plethora of other false Gods. This heart knows the way to go, but then follows the orders of these false gods, be they pride, money, sex, power, career etc. Only those who keep their hearts empty for God, can make experience of him now, and, one day, see him face to face.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. The original Greek word for 'peacemaker', $eir\acute{e}nopoi\grave{o}s$ (εἰρηνοποιός) appears only here in the New Testament, but was very common in Classical Greek. Many Roman emperors boasted of being 'peacemakers' throughout the empire, but their peace was merely the absence of war, and was imposed through the use of violence and maintained through fear. The peace Jesus is talking about is much wider. The Jewish shalom in fact included all those conditions and goods that make people flourish. The 'peacemaker' Jesus has in mind therefore, is the one who works to create the social, economic, cultural and spiritual conditions for men and women to thrive in peace. These are the children of God, those who show in themselves the real face of the loving Father who wants only the good for his children.

Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. We have been on the mount with Jesus, we have understood his radical proposal of new life, and some of us have welcomed it. Now we have to go back to the plane of our daily lives. How will the world welcome us if we will stick by Jesus' teaching? Jesus says: You will not have an easy life. When they will hear you talking of caring for the last of society, of forgiveness, of marital fidelity and exclusivity, of a heart free of all the things that crowd God out... they will revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account.

And yet, when this happens, we are called to rejoice. Why? **Because ours IS** (not will be) the kingdom of **Heaven.**

The Beatitudes are the Constitution, the *Magna Carta* of the kingdom of God, and if we accept them and live according to them, the Kingdom of God will bloom within us now, and come to full realisation when Christ returns to take his own

Prayer for the Week

Heavenly Father, in Beatitudes you show us your dream for our world, a dream that we have often ignored, neglected and thwarted because of our selfishness Give us courage to empty our hearts from all distractions, and make it the fertile ground where your kingdom blooms and grows. Jesus Through our Lord, Amen.

Day 1

The Beatitudes are the first piece of teaching of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew. Before he begins to speak he brings his disciples on the top of a hill or mount.

 Why do you think he did that? Is there a symbolic value in this?

Day 2

Beatitudes comes from the Latin beatus (blessed/happy). Think of TV programmes and series.

- Who is a happy man/woman according to the world?
- Compare that with the values that Jesus proposes in our Gospel.

Day 3

Even though there is still much poverty around us, generally speaking our society is much wealthier than it was 70 years ago, and yet it is also much unhappier. Many people, young and old, suffer from mental illness, lack of purpose, boredom and desperation.

- Why do you think this is the case?
- Does the Gospel offer a solution to this?

Day 5

In the fifth beatitude Jesus declares happy/blessed those who have a pure heart.

- What do you think a pure heart is?
- How can we achieve one?

Day 4 Presentation of Our Lord



On this feast we remember the day when the Holy Family went to the temple in Jerusalem for the Purification of Mary, and their famous encounter with Simeon. In many Christian traditions people bring candles - the symbol of the Light of Christ- to their church to be blessed by the priest on this day, hence the name Candle Mass.

Assemblies – Theme Holocaust Memorial Day

This week, Mr. Ojakovoh delivered assemblies to pupils, emphasising the significance of Holocaust Memorial Day. Pupils were encouraged to embody the actions of Jesus when He called the disciples in this week's Gospel passage, by identifying those in darkness and bringing them into the light.

UCAS Update - Year 13 - Student Finance

I have had some students concerned about their student finance status as they are unsure as to whether they are considered home or EU students and what this might mean for their tuition fee status. The information provided Student Finance, you may be eligible for help with you living cost and tuition fees as long as you have lived in the UK for 3 years before the start of your university course. You will find more information via the links below. If you university has contacted you regarding higher fees and you believe this to be incorrect, please do contact the university to discuss this with them. Whilst this is the governmental regulation, universities are private institutions and they may have differing policies.

Help with living costs

You may be eligible for help with your living costs if both the following apply:

- you've lived in the UK, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man for 3 years in a row before the <u>first day of the first academic year</u> of your course (apart from temporary absences such as holidays)
- you have settled status

Example

If your course begins on 20 September 2022, you must have lived in the UK since 1 September 2019.



Solution to last Week's Puzzler

C The angles at a point sum to 360° so 75 + z = 360 and y + x = 360. Therefore 75 + z + y + x = 720. The sum of the interior angles of a hexagon is $4 \times 180^{\circ} = 720^{\circ}$. Therefore



Solution to the Break time Teaser:

D Assume that a > b. Then a + b = 7 and a - b = 2. Adding these two equations together gives 2a = 9. So $a = \frac{9}{2}$ and hence $b = 7 - \frac{9}{2} = \frac{14-9}{2} = \frac{5}{2}$. Therefore $a \times b = \frac{9}{2} \times \frac{5}{2} = \frac{45}{4} = 11\frac{1}{4}$.

Hence 75 + x = 27 + 24 + 23 + 26 = 100. So x = 100 - 75 = 25.
