From the Gospel of Matthew 16: 13-19

Catholic Social Teaching - Stewardship

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it." Genesis 2:15. We are guardians of God's creation, living sustainably and enhancing the wellbeing of our planet. Caring for the earth is integral to our task of tackling the scandal of global poverty, vulnerability, inequality, injustice and exclusion. Stewardship is all about caring for the many gifts that God has given to us. These include our environment, our own talents and other resources. The late Pope Francis said "Humanity still has the ability to work together in building our common home" Laudato Si' 13 and "...the world we have received also belongs to those who will follow us."

Theme of the Week – St Peter and St Paul

On Sunday, we celebrated the Solemnity of St Peter and St Paul. Apart from All Saints Day and the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, where both are Holy Days of Obligation, this is the only other Holy Day of Obligation given over to Saints. The earliest Roman Calendar recorded goes back to 350AD and it stated then that the 29th June should be given over to celebrate St Peter and St Paul. So, we may ask why, why are these two men so special to the Church? It is because these two men are known as pillars of the Church. Peter, the shepherd, who governed from his chair in Rome was the first Pope of the Church. Whereas Paul, the Apostle, went out across nations to spread the news of Christianity through his letters and visits. These two men are the great early leaders of the Church.

This Solemnity reminds us of the need for diversity in vocations and ministries within the church. Neither of these two leaders could have achieved what they did without the help and assistance of numerous other women and men beside them. We can also imagine the difficulties, uncertainty and fear they may have come across when spreading the Good News of Christ. It is important then to acknowledge what was asked to Peter in Caesarea Philippi, "Who do you say I am?" (Matthew 16:13-15), Like Peter, we are called to a profound personal encounter with Christ, a revelation that transcends mere opinion. This intimate knowledge of Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God" must be the bedrock of our faith. Throughout their vocation the two men showed remarkable hope and love.

Your decisions, rooted in Christ, have eternal significance for us as a school community and what we example. Embrace this profound responsibility with joy and courage, knowing that the "gates of the underworld shall never prevail against..." a school built on such a foundation. As we continue our pilgrimage in this Jubilee year, how can you be more **Faith-Filled** and **Hopeful** just as St Peter and St Paul were?

Year 12 Geography Field Trip to Walthamstow Wetlands

Our Year 12 Geography students recently enjoyed an engaging and insightful field trip to Walthamstow Wetlands, where they explored the impact of invasive species on local ecosystems. As part of their AQA A-Level Geography fieldwork, students investigated real-world examples of environmental change and developed essential geographical skills, including data collection, analysis and collaborative enquiry.

In a spirit of academic partnership and community, our students worked alongside peers from St Michael's School in Aylesbury. The collaboration encouraged mutual learning and positive social interaction, reflecting the *principles of Catholic Social Teaching* — especially *stewardship of the environment* and *solidarity across school communities*.

The day was both educational and enjoyable, deepening students' understanding of key course content while reminding us of our shared responsibility to care for creation.













Geography Club

The Geography Club has been venturing into the fascinating world of Antarctica! Our recent activities allowed students to virtually step inside the innovative Halley VI Research Station, offering a unique perspective on life and work in this remote and extreme environment. We also engaged in practical challenges, learning how to layer up correctly for the Antarctic cold and understanding the detailed process of preparing for an expedition; from health checks and specialised training to getting passports and packing for the journey south. These virtual experiences provided an excellent insight into the incredible planning and resilience required for polar research!

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

D The diagram shows that a triangle whose area is one quarter of that of the square may be divided into four congruent triangles, one of which is the shaded triangle. So the required fraction is $\frac{1}{4} \times \frac{1}{4} = \frac{1}{16}$.



Solution to the Break-time Teaser:

A The mean of p and q is 13. Therefore $p+q=2\times13=26$. Similarly, $q+r=2\times16=32$ and $r+p=2\times7=14$. Adding these three equations gives 2p+2q+2r=26+32+14=72. Hence p+q+r=36. So the mean of p, q and r is $\frac{p+q+r}{3}=\frac{36}{3}=12$.


