Theme of the Week – Jesus the Gate

The fourth Sunday of Easter is always dedicated to **Jesus the Good Shepherd**. This image was so dear to early Christians that already in the 3rd century we see many Christian burial stones depicting Jesus as a Shepherd. By doing this people were basically saying that in the most difficult moment of death they still trusted Jesus to bring them to the new pastures of heaven. (Psalm 23: *The Lord is my Shepherd…even though I walk in the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil!*).

In this week's Gospel Jesus puts to his audience a sort of riddle, talking about the **gate of the sheep** and thieves and brigands who try to enter the sheepfold by stealth rather than through the gate. Oftentimes we have interpreted this story as a reference to Jesus keeping the sheep safe in the sheepfold, but the real meaning of the riddle is rather shocking, so much so that when the scribes and Pharisees understood it, they were determined to kill Jesus.

The word that we translate 'sheepfold' (*aule* in Greek) in reality means 'enclosed space', 'precinct' and was used mostly to indicate the **enclosed precincts of the Temple of Jerusalem** or **the house of the High Priest**. Jesus is referring to the fact that His sheep are kept prisoners in the enclosures of an established religion which has twisted the relationship with God and reduced it to a 'tit-for-tat': You obey God's law, offer sacrifices and prayers, and God will bless you. If not, you will be cursed and perish. The temple of Jerusalem was a place where sheep were sold and bought, exploited and eventually killed. Jesus is saying that the time has come for His sheep to be liberated from every enclosure that keeps them from the freedom God intended for his children.

Let's have a look at some of these enclosures: One, as Jesus pointed out, could be the WRONG UNDERSTANDING OF RELIGION as a series of external practices aimed at winning God's favour and securing prosperity for our lives. God wants us to have a relationship with Him, not to use Him as our life insurance or, even worse, please Him out of fear for his chastisements. The new pastures mentioned in the Gospel are something similar to the Garden of Eden, where Adam and Eve before the fall walked and lived rejoicing in the presence of God. Another enclosure could be **IDOLATRY**. This seems like a big word, but idolatry is, simply put, making something other than God the most important thing in our lives, the thing that influences all our decisions: money, career, power, pleasure. When we fall into these enclosures we may have the impression to be free when in fact we are enslaved to the very false god we have chosen. REGRET, REMORSE and GUILT too can become an imprisoning enclosure: These sentiments are good when they prepare us for acknowledging our wrongdoing, repenting, and starting over, but can become a dangerous dead end when we become incapable of accepting the forgiveness of God, ourselves and other people and precipitate in spiral of self-loathing and self-beating. This is not the freedom we were created for!All the false ideals and people who wish to exploit their brothers and sisters by confining them into one of these enclosures are thieves and brigands, says Jesus. They do not want the good of the sheep, but to use them for their own gain and satisfaction.

So, Jesus is the **GATE** through which we pass to be liberated and taken to the new pastures, and his Gospel is His **CALL**, but who is the **GATEKEEPER** he mentions, the one who lets Him in? It is our **CONSCIENCE**. In most cases the human conscience knows instinctively what is true and good and what is bad and damaging. The conscience listens to the words of Jesus and knows immediately that His message is good, it frees, brings healing, life and transforms people. How many times we ourselves have made this experience when listening to an illuminating sermon or reading the Scriptures. Human beings are **WELL MADE**, and their hearts are naturally predisposed to welcome God's proposal of happiness. Sometimes, though, thieves and brigands with their false ideals introduce themselves into the sheepfold and do all they can to keep people imprisoned in whatever enclosure they propose.

If we look at ourselves, what is the enclosure or enclosures that keep us prisoners and unhappy? Whatever they are, Jesus has come to destroy them and take us to the open pastures of His Kingdom, where we will not only have life, but have it in abundance.

Jesus the Gate

From the Gospel according to John (10:1-10)

Jesus said: 'I tell you most solemnly, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate, but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. The one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the flock; the gatekeeper lets him in, the sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out. When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice. They never follow a stranger but run away from him: they do not recognise the voice of strangers.'

Jesus told them this parable but they failed to understand what he meant by telling it to them.

- So Jesus spoke to them again:
- 'I tell you most solemnly,
- I am the gate of the sheepfold.
- All others who have come
- are thieves and brigands;
- but the sheep took no notice of them.

I am the gate.

Anyone who enters through me will be safe:

he will go freely in and out

and be sure of finding pasture.

The thief comes

only to steal and kill and destroy.

I have come

so that they may have life and have it to the full."

Day 1

She joined the Third Order of the Dominicans and spent the rest of her life caring for the poor and sick, bringing peace between families and in the church, and enjoying such an intimate relation with Jesus that she was allowed to partake in the suffering of His crucifixion through invisible wounds. A Day With Doug Lemov – STCAT conference – Monday 24th April

On Monday's INSET day earlier this week, St Joseph's was delighted to host the inaugural St Thomas Catholic Academies Trust (STCAT) conference for all of the teachers across the schools within our Trust. Our keynote speaker was internationally renowned educational researcher, writer and practitioner Doug Lemov, author of *Teach Like A Champion* and other significant publications, which influence British teaching and training on a daily basis. With just over 500 delegates from our Trust present, this meant that 0.1% of the entirety of teachers in England were in attendance. Whilst normally this might appear to be an inconsequential statistic, in reality this reflects how our staff can go out and influence over 8000 children in our family of schools with some of the most cutting-edge practice and are equipped with the research behind them. The event has created a real buzz around St Joseph's and our entire family of schools this week, and we are continuing to work on how best to incorporate Doug Lemov's work into our day to day lessons and interactions with our students to give them the best deal possible.

Do you know? Raising multilingual or bilingual children is a long-term commitment. To make multilingualism work for your child and family, there are things you can do each day and might need to think about over the long term. These things include: sticking with your heritage language, even when there's pressure to choose English reminding yourself that using your heritage language helps to strengthen family bonds using your heritage language to play games, read books, cook food and do other fun things that make it positive for your child making sure your child gets plenty of chances to hear and use their heritage language Children who grow up in a family where parents have only limited English do better at learning English in school if they keep speaking their heritage languages at home. That is because a solid base in their first language makes it easier for them to learn a second one.
