Catholic Social Teaching - Peace

Today the world has a profound thirst for peace. In many countries, people are suffering due to wars which, though often forgotten, are always the cause of suffering and poverty." Pope Francis, 20 September 2016

"Inner peace is closely related to care for ecology and for the common good because, lived out authentically, it is reflected in a balanced lifestyle together with a capacity for wonder which takes us to a deeper understanding of life." Pope Francis, Laudato Si', 225

How this half term can you promote Peace in all that you do in St Joseph's and society?

Theme of the Week – I know my sheep

Within a school like ours, the pastoral care given by your Form Tutor, Head of Year or any member of Staff for that matter is the most important aspect of our school life. It's important to know that your teacher cares deeply for you. They want you to be happy and safe in school. They want you to confide in them where needed and know that they will support you not just in your studies but as you move into adult life. So in this week's Gospel, where we see Jesus as the shepherd who knows His sheep, it's important to know that the Latin root word for shepherd is pastor, and it is from this root that springs the church's terminologies and concepts of pastoral care and roles within faith communities. These roles imply a duty of love and care.

In Jesus' day, flocks of sheep were very small and the shepherd knew each sheep by its name. They were a bit like pets. So if you are fortunate to have a pet or have had a pet, you as an owner have cared for them; Take them for walks, fed them when they were hungry, loved them like family. So Jesus as our shepherd is telling us that he will always be there for us when we need him, and that he watches over us and protects us always. The shepherd knows his sheep, and the sheep their shepherd. Complete trust is implicit. The Gospel today makes some sweeping claims — eternal life promised for his sheep, and total protection from anyone who would seek to snatch them away. It finishes up with the declaration that Jesus and God are one.

In what ways are you called to act as a 'shepherd', and to whom? Who are the people who act as shepherds to you? How do they carry out this role? As we place ourselves in the midst of this intimate relationship with Jesus, we might think about the ways in which we 'hear his voice'? Do you have a sense of being called by name? How have you been **Attentive** and **Discerning** in listening to the Lord's voice when He has spoken to you through prayer? What are the other conflicting voices that try to drown him out, and where are they leading us? During the week be **Attentive** and **Discerning** to the needs of people who are in your care.

St Joseph's the Worker Feast Day – Thursday 1st May 2025

Last Thursday, St Joseph's came together to celebrate our Feast Day, St Joseph the Worker. Fr Kevin O Driscoll from Holy Family Parish came into school to celebrate a whole school Mass before we all went out onto the school field for a photo where we spelt out St Joseph's.

We then went out into the community to serve and help others to live out our school mission statement of "Unlocking Belief in All" and demonstrate our school virtues of being: Learned and Wise, Loving and Compassionate, Truthful and eloquent, intentional and prophetic, attentive and discerning, faith-filled and hopeful, curious and active, grateful and generous.

Our staff and students went to either St Anthony's Primary School, St Bernard's' Prep, St Ethelbert's Primary School, Holy Family Primary School, Iqra Primary School, Our Lady Of Peace Primary School, The Riverside Day Nursery in Windsor, a Faith Walk to Eton and Windsor, Oxford House Care Home and Wexham Park Hospital. When in the community, we helped and supported all those we encountered whether through prayer, retreat or conversation; English and Maths, crafts and arts as well as selling cakes for charity. 

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

C Consider triangles MON and MPN. Note that MO = MP = 4 because M is the midpoint of OP, ∠OMN = ∠PMN = 90° because MN is perpendicular to OP, side NM is common to both triangles. So triangles MON and MPN are congruent (SAS). Therefore PN = ON = 8 because ON is a radius of the circle. By Pythagoras' Theorem in triangle OMN, ON° = OM² + MN², so 8² = 4² + MN². Therefore MN² = 8² - 4² = 48. So MN = √48. The perimeter of triangle PNM is PN + NM + MP = 8 + √48 + 4 = 12 + √48. Now 6.5 < √48 < 7, since √42.25 < √48 < √49. So √48 is closer in value to 7 than it is to 6. So 12 + √48 is nearer to 19 than it is to 18.</p>

Solution to the Break-time Teaser:

D Let the five positions in the photograph be numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5. Then the boys may occupy a total of six positions: 1 and 3; 1 and 4; 1 and 5; 2 and 4; 2 and 5; 3 and 5. For each of these positions, the boys may be arranged in two ways as they can interchange places. So there are 12 ways of positioning the boys. For each of these, the girls must be placed in three positions. In each case, the first girl may choose any one of three positions, the second girl may choose either of two positions and then there is just one place remaining for the third girl. So for each arrangement of the two boys there are 3 × 2 × 1 different ways of arranging the three girls. Therefore the total number of line-ups is 12 × 6 = 72.



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


