From The Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Guardians.

We knew when it came it would be a challenging time. As with every other school in the locality this week we had our first student who tested positive. Consequently, we've had to self-isolate 86 students that have been in the proximity of the student this week – all of whom are fit, healthy and without symptoms – in the best interests of everyone's safety and in line with current government guidelines. However, it's never an easy discussion for those on the receiving end of such news. I just want to say a thank you to all parents and guardians for making what could have been a difficult situation a lot more straight forward to manage with the amazing support you've given us over the last few days. What's kept us all together has been the commitment of a collective mindset that together we'll ensure the right thing is done over simply doing things right. The reality of the next

year will probably mean that there may be an ongoing rotation of this kind of disruption and its fair to project that this is the sort of thing we'll have to live with over the next year or so. With that in mind:

Here's what we're doing for those children who are in isolation.

- Currently this only involves Years 11-13. We've started streaming a number of live Microsoft lessons for Year 11-13 in a number of subjects. These occurred this week in Maths, Geography, RE, Sociology, Psychology, Music and Spanish. The tutors will email the students in advance. Students have been able to 'dial in' and participate through the chat option. In one Maths class 96 questions were raised and answered by those isolating from home.
- For those children who are undertaking PPE exams over this and next week, we're sending
 the work home. The children need to undertake these exams in exam conditions and then
 return the work either by hand to the school or by post so that we can mark it ready to be
 given back with the rest of the Year group (please clearly mark the packaging "PPE papers").
- All work that the teachers do in class (for example Power Points and other electronic resources) are being uploaded onto the specific class file so that all the children regardless of being in or not can access the work.

A number of the staff who also have had to isolate are running their classes from home directly into the classroom – for example, this happened today in English, Business Studies and Media Studies.

Please do remind the students to:

- 1. Remain in their Year groups particularly coming and going from school (we're aware that poses impossible issues for those with siblings)
- 2. Encourage children to keep washing their hands when coming home and leaving for school
- 3. Wear masks on public transport
- 4. Practice social distancing where possible

Finally, apologies for any confusion over next Friday. Next Friday 16th October is now a normal school day. It had been previously scheduled as an Inset day, with all the schools in the Deanery, to focus on the spirituality of Catholic Schools in the locality. However, with the restrictions being as they are, this will not go ahead and it felt right to put that day to more teaching and learning rather than a further day for training. Half term commences from Monday 19th October for 2 weeks and the children return on 2nd November (week 2 on the children's timetable).

Theme of the Week - Relying on God

In this week's Gospel, we see Jesus continue speaking in parables about the kingdom of heaven. The wedding banquet is used as a symbol for heaven and the king represents God. The feast symbolises abundance provided by God for all who accept the invitation.

Since Jewish wedding celebrations often lasted as long as a week, the time commitment by the invited guests for such a lengthy participation makes their refusal a little easier to understand, and their response to kill the messengers echoes last week's Gospel.

The reaction of the king might seem rather extreme. However, the unprepared guest represents how **we could be unprepared for heaven**. Not wearing the correct attire is symbolic of not meeting the 'entry requirements' for heaven: repentance of our sins, faith in God and to live a life pleasing to God.

The fact that "many" are called implies that it's not intended to be a restricted number. The invite went out. However, some guests refused to come, and others wanted to come but didn't want to make the sacrifices required of being a Christian.

The second reading this week is from Philippians. It emphasises the need for complete reliance on God. It is worth remembering that St. Paul spent time in prison for his beliefs. He says how **throughout all life's trials**, **God has always provided for him** – no matter what condition he was living in, or what trials he was going through. God was always there to take care of his needs.

We are all invited to trust and rely on God. To live a life for Him and with Him; trusting Him with our futures.

The question is: do we accept this invitation?

What are the things that prevent you from responding fully to this invitation?

Solution to last Week's Puzzler

Working out the height after each time it hits the ground

First time: $\frac{3}{5}$ of 125 cm = 125 \div 5×3 = 25×3 = 75 cm.

Second time: $\frac{3}{5}$ of 75 cm= 75÷5×3 = 15×3 = 45 cm.

Third time: $\frac{3}{5}$ of 45 cm= $45 \div 5 \times 3 = 9 \times 3 = 27$ cm.

Working out the height after each time it hits the ground using 3s and 5s

 $125 = 5 \times 5 \times 5$

First time: $\frac{3}{5}$ of 125 is $3\times5\times5$

Second time: $\frac{3}{5}$ of $3\times5\times5$ is $3\times3\times5$

Third time: $\frac{3}{5}$ of $3\times3\times5$ is $3\times3\times3=27$ cm.
