The Shortlist - a list of books of general importance for a holistic personal development

This is a list of books that are generally influential but you may also find them in the subject specific sections. You may wonder why is important to read them, if you do not study those subjects? It is important to have a holistic (well-rounded) general understanding of key concepts and ideas that weave and span across several subjects and areas of interest. The top universities are looking for well-read students and those who can converse around a range of topics of current affairs and general knowledge. It also helps to provide the backdrop and wider context into which many subjects will fit. E.g. a strong understanding of Marxism will support learning in sociology, philosophy, business studies, economics and history as it has come to shape the world we live in today.
